

MAYOR AND PARTY FAIR GUESTS TODAY

To Take Part In Baltimore
Day Ceremonies At New
York Exposition

1,205 Tall Cedars, On Two-
Day Excursion, Plan To
Attend Pageant

Led by Mayor Jackson and Richard C. O'Connell, President of the City Council, a small group of Baltimoreans left yesterday afternoon for New York, where they will take part today in Baltimore Day ceremonies at the World's Fair.

The Mayor's official party occupied a special car attached to the regular 5.51 P. M. train leaving Mount Royal Station.

At 7 o'clock this morning a special train will leave the same station with excursionists, who will attend the exercises and go sight-seeing before returning to the city in the evening.

1,205 Tall Cedars Leave

Yesterday afternoon three special trains left Camden Station carrying 1,205 Tall Cedars of Baltimore for New York. The Tall Cedars, on a two-day excursion, will attend the Baltimore pageant today.

The group, headed by Walter A. McClean, will return to Baltimore tomorrow night.

The Baltimore Day program will begin with an official call by the fair officials this morning at Mr. Jackson's hotel. After a visit to Mayor LaGuardia's summer city hall on Long Island, the party will proceed to the fair grounds.

A special train will be given the party by fair officials at Perylon Hall.
