

viduals, firms and monetary institutions, whose business system has been expanded to the level of the inflated and artificial processes going on around them. While the process is expansive and upward everybody revels in the insatiation; and the speedy realization of immense wealth hurries them on to the employment of every available means to the end they propose, until in the very rivalry of folly and frenzy they precipitate the catastrophe and then clamor for succor and support. But with that moment the truth is brought home to all, and there is nothing on which to rely for substantial aid. Nothing!—no, we correct that word. There is something, but it is only the proposition that real values bear to the nominal—the substantial to the artificial—the adequate to the inflated. In the midst of trial the banks are looked to for relief. Relief. Why, they are already in comparative wild excess, and to relieve is only to go on further in the same broad and limitless expanse of error. It then becomes a question who shall stand in the convulsive test. The banks have to take their chances of payment from the merchants and interests whose policy they have subverted, and to that extent they are exposed to the storm. Perplexed in the extreme, they are afraid to enlarge their liabilities while their assets are becoming daily more precarious. They cannot strengthen the one by enlarging the other. The time is past, or at least too critical for that; and in their own defense they are driven to that stringency of action which brings down the whole weight of the burden upon those who must bear it, the banks themselves (taking their chance to stand or fall in the ultimate crisis and extremity of the hour. Such is the general view of the subject as it presents itself to our apprehension, and as it must be regarded by the people at large. But of this there are points, and facts, and practices for special consideration, of the utmost importance.

THE ATLANTIC TELEGRAPH.—It is stated in the English papers that an engineering firm have expressed their readiness to undertake to lay the Atlantic cable for a stated price, with the aid of government vessels, taking all the risk. They engage that the cable shall be laid from Ireland to Newfoundland by June or July next, or they will claim no recompense, and they will pay to the company the entire cost of the cable. In the event of the cable being laid before June the stipulated price to be increased at so much per month for each month gained. It was stated in the foreign news, published on Saturday, that the cable was to be landed from the U. S. frigate Niagara and stored at Plymouth dock. Capt.
