## TWO NEW AIDES

Norman Polski And Preston A. Pairo, Jr., Appointed

Anselm Sodaro, State's attorney, yesterday announced the appointment of two new assistants and elevated J. Harold Grady, former FBI agent and assistant prosecutor for nearly eight years, to the deputy State's attorney position.

Mr. Sodaro created a new title—that of executive assistant—for William H. Maynard, veteran prosecutor, who had served as deputy for many years. Mr. Maynard, who is 68, has been a prosecutor in the Baltimore office for 28 years.

Assistants Re-appointed

The two new assistants approved yesterday by the judges of the Supreme Bench are Preston A. Pairo, Jr., and Norman Polski.

One will fill a vacancy created by the resignation of M. Peter Moser, and the other was appointed to fill a new position allowed the prosecuting staff.

Mr. Sodaro also announced that all of his remaining assistants have been appointed to new four-year terms, beginning January 3.

They are, in addition to Mr. Maynard and Mr. Grady, John C. Weiss, Saul A. Harris, James F. Price, Edwin A. Gehring, Joseph

G. Koutz, Julius A. Romano, James W. Murphy, J. Robert Brown, Edward F. Borgerding, George H. Rosedom, James O'C. Gentry and Thomas C. Nugent.

Mr. Polski is 30, married and lives at 3330 Clarks lane. He graduated from Baltimore City College in 1942, and received a part of his pre-legal education at the University of Baltimore before enlisting in the Naval Air Corps.

After receiving a commission as ensign in 1944, he served on active duty in the Pacific theater, taking part in the securing of Iwo Jima and the invasion of Okinawa. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and three gold stars for heroism.

Upon his discharge, he re-entered the University of Baltimore in 1946, and subsequently was awarded a law degree from the law school in 1950.

### Took Part in Crime Probe

Mr. Polski served in the Office of Price Stabilization, and in 1951 was named assistant counsel to the Senate Crime Committee under the chairmanship of former Senator Herbert R. O'Connor.

Following his duties there, Mr. Polski became chief counsel of the export control and policy committee of the United States Senate, and subsequently became trial attorney for the Bureau of Foreign Commerce of the Department of Commerce.

Mr. Pairo is 27, married and lives at 900 Cooks lane. He com-

pleted high school at the Boy's Latin School, and then enlisted in the Navy at the age of 17, serving on a destroyer.

### Served in Legislature

Later, he attended the University of Baltimore pre-law and law schools, graduating in 1951. While attending the university, Mr. Pairo was employed as a law clerk in the office of the City Solicitor of Baltimore.

Admitted to the bar in 1951, Mr. Pairo since has been engaged in private law practice with his father.

He has served in the House of Delegates since 1950.

The new deputy State's attorney is a graduate of Loyola College and the University of Maryland Law School. Mr. Grady, who was appointed to the prosecuting office by the late J. Bernard Wells, is 37 years old and the father of three children.
