

# RESIGNATION SUBMITTED

## Grady Letter Accepted By Board Of Estimates

Mayor Grady submitted his resignation to the Board of Estimates yesterday and it will be effective at noon today. He will take a seat on the Supreme Bench tomorrow.

In his letter of resignation, the Mayor said he wished to express his "profound gratitude to the people of the city of Baltimore for the privilege of having served as Mayor." **DEC 6 1962**

He also said the experience had been "rewarding and illuminating," and added that the thought the board "has accomplished many worthwhile things for the city" during his term.

### Graham Remained Seated

Philip H. Goodman, who will move up from president of the City Council to Mayor today, said he was convinced Mr. Grady "will make a great judge."

He praised the board, after a fashion, for its work during the Grady term. "Basically, we carried on an honest Administration."

Mr. Goodman said the board operated "with every bit of sincerity at our command."

Mayor Grady shook hands with the other four board members, each of whom stood except Dr. R. Walter Graham, Jr., the comptroller. Dr. Graham has opposed Mayor Grady's leaving office because it will permit Mr. Goodman to move in.
