VOLUNTEERS WANTED

FOR THE

1st Eastern Shore Regiment

OF

HOME GUARD.

I HAVE been authorized by the War Depart-
ment at Washington to have enrolled and
mustered into the service of the United States a
Regiment of Infantry to act as a

HOME GUARD,

AND TO BE STATIONED ON THE
Eastern Shore of Maryland.

The purpose of the movement is to repel in-
vasion, to preserve the peace and good order in
our midst and to protect the rights of all, and aid
in the enforcement of the laws.

As it has been asserted, with a view of de-
feating the movement, that the Administration
intend ordering the troops away from home as
soon as they are mustered in, I would remark
that the Secretary of War expressly pledges that
they "shall be stationed on the Eastern Shore of
Maryland" and used only for "Home Protec-
tion." I state this fact for the benefit of those
who are willing to do all they can for their coun-
try in its present peril, but whose circumstances
are such as prevents their going abroad. The
necessity of this movement must be apparent to
every candid and considerate mind. We are al-
ready threatened by the enemies of the country.
At any moment we are liable to have civil war
in our midst. In times of Revolution no one
can tell into what peril a single day may place
us. It behooves us to prepare, and be ready for
any emergency, ere it be too late. It is high
time that Marylanders were armed and prepared
to protect themselves against adventuring Rebels.
The time of Enlistment will be three years, or
until the end of the War.

A COMPANY

consists, when full, of one Captain, Two Lieu-
tenants, One First Sergeant, Four Sergeants,
Eight Corporals, Two Musicians, One Waggoner,
and Eighty-two Privates.

Each Company will select its own officers,
subject to the approval of the War Department.

The Company will be mustered into service as
soon as it numbers Eighty-six men. But must
afterwards be raised to One Hundred.

THE PAY

allowed for a Captain is Sixty dollars, four ra-
tions (or \$36,00) per month and one servant.—
Of First Lieutenant is Fifty dollars, four rations,
per month and one servant. Of Second Lieut-
enant is Forty-five dollars, four rations per
month, and one servant. Cadet, Twenty-four
dollars per month. First Sergeant, Twenty-dollars
per month. Sergeant, Seventeen dollars per
month. Corporal, Fifteen dollars per month.—
Those officers who have no rations mentioned
above in their pay, are allowed one ration, or nine
dollars per month for board, and three dollars per
month for clothing. The same allowances are
also made to Privates.

Each soldier is entitled to a bounty of One
Hundred dollars when discharged from service.

THE DISPOSITION OF THE TROOPS.

As many inquiries have been made concerning
the disposition of the companies, I would remark
that the Government pays each man for his full
time, and assumes that he will give the whole of
his time to the service. But it is the evident
written intention of the Government to afford se-
curity to the homes of us all. To accomplish
this it would appear to be necessary to keep each
company stationed in the neighborhood in which
it was organized, as much as possible. Each
company must be on muster every day. The
whole force, it is contemplated, will be brought
together at stated periods—say once in a month
or oftener, as the exigency of the times and the
public service may require. It is designated, I
presume to let each company protect its own
homes and neighborhood, in the main.

Such is the outline of the plan and its object.
It will be modified as events and welfare of our
people may demand. The details of the move-
ment will be left to the commanding officer of
the forces upon the Shore. For further particu-
