Big Water Loss At Frederick. Frederick, Md., Feb. 20.—City Engi-

neer Emory C. Crum told Mayor Fraley and the Board of Aldermen at a meeting last night that leaky mains and defective joints were causing a loss of approximately 800,000 gallons of water a day. He recommended that the city spend 30,000 for water meters, which he said, would cost consumers no more than the present rate for all the water needed and would put a check to the waste that was apparent in most of the homes and business establishments of the city.
