

# HIKERS TAKE CARDINAL BY BOLD STROKE

Failing To Make An Appointment, "Gen." Jones Leads "Army" Upon Prelate.

## GRACIOUS WELCOME SPOILS "WAR" SPEECH

His Eminence Receives "Votes For Women" Flag, But Says He Is Not Converted To Cause.

"Gen." Rosalie Jones and her army marched to the Cardinal's home this morning and presented the prelate with a "Votes for Women" flag.

Then they walked to the City Hall and gave a flag to Acting Mayor Hubert.

Next they hiked to the Emerson and handed flags to the Jovians with whom they lunched.

The Cardinal said he appreciated the visit, but was not converted.

The Acting Mayor said he enjoyed seeing the hikers, but his political convictions were unshakened.

### Jovians Non-Committal.

Mr. Jovians said they were glad to hear the honors of acting as hosts to the marchers, but were not willing to commit themselves as a body to the cause.

Failing in an attempt earlier in the morning to make an appointment with the Cardinal for the visit, "General" Jones left the Stafford at 10 o'clock with the entire army, stating she would at least pass by the Cardinal's residence.

On reaching Mulberry street the temptation was so great that she turned in at the Cardinal's residence and rang the door bell.

The "army" followed with a corps of photographers and reporters. Seeing that the front room was too small to hold the large crowd the attendants at once set to work to open the connecting doors and threw the two rooms into one.

### Presented To Cardinal.

After a few minutes the Cardinal entered. The honor of introducing the "General" fell to a local "war correspondent." With smiles His Eminence accepted the outstretched hand of the "General" and invited the "army" to be seated.

The "General," adopting her well-known military pose, presented His Eminence with a "Votes for Women" flag. Then, either the excitement curtailed her courage, or the Cardinal's affable manner, caused her to lose some of her oratorical ability on this of all occasions.

"We have come to call on you, Cardinal," began the "General" in a very feeble voice, "to present you with this flag and hope you will join us in our fight for women's rights."

With the last few words the "General's" voice mounted to its regular tone, and the day was saved.

Holding the flag, the Cardinal smilingly replied:

"This is quite an honor, ladies, I assure you, in calling upon me. I admire your persistence and hope the Legislature's hearts will be soft and not as hard as the earth you have tread over nor the stones you have stumbled over in your long journey. I am sure you deserve a long rest. Who is your Secretary of War?"

"Miss Freeman," answered "General" Jones.

Miss Freeman was presented to the Cardinal. The Cardinal, shaking hands with several of the suffragists, walked to the door, bidding the "army" farewell.

"Are you now ready to commit yourself to the suffragists' cause," the Cardinal was asked by a reporter.

"No, not yet," answered His Eminence.

The "General" was very much elated over the Cardinal's speech.

## Moving On The City Hall.

The "army" moved down Charles to Baltimore street, then to Calvert, up to the Postoffice portico. When the "General" was on the verge of entering some one told her the mistake.

Then the army marched down Lexington street, and this time arrived at the Mayor's office.

First to greet the "General" was Robert E. Lee, secretary to the Mayor, who invited the army in the Mayor's reception-room. On Mayor Preston being absent from the city, Acting Mayor John Hubert accepted a message presented by "General" Jones from the Mayor of Wilmington, and surrounded by several officials of the Mayor's office, delivered a speech of welcome to the army on behalf of the city.

"I wish to extend to you the greetings of the city of Baltimore, said Mr. Hubert, "and sincerely hope your stay in this city will be a pleasant one. I am sure you are very tired after your long journey and hope you find rest in our city."

## Flags And Letter Presented.

The "General" presented Mr. Hubert and several attaches of the Mayor's office with flags.

Mr. Hubert presented the following letter of "General" Jones to Mayor Geo. P. McCeney of Laurel:

Dear Mr. Mayor—I beg to extend to you and your people, through the courtesy of Gen. Rosalie Jones, the greetings of the city of Baltimore.

General Jones called on me this morning with her army, and I write to commend them to your favorable consideration.

Baltimore has had the pleasure of entertaining the suffragist pilgrims.
