

The citizens of Baltimore, together with the military, public officers, members of the several faculties of the University, the Grand Lodge of Maryland, and the masonic fraternity, yesterday afternoon formed in procession to pay the last tribute of respect to the remains of WILLIAM H. WINDER, according to arrangements previously published. We do not recollect on any former similar occasion so large an assemblage of citizens, as attended the ceremonies; and we never saw sorrow more generally depicted on the countenances of a community than was observed on this occasion. The spectators of the melancholy scene, surpassed in numbers anything we ever witnessed in Baltimore; every house from the dwelling of the deceased to the burying ground was occupied, and the street was literally crowded--full to overflowing. There was one thing that deserves special notice: not a single accident, nor the slightest confusion, to disturb the scene, or cause delay, occurred, and the marshals and managers of the ceremonies deserve much praise for the ability with which the procession was conducted.
