

*The Condemned Men in Fort McHenry.*—It will be recollected that the Military Commission which recently held its sessions in this city tried and found guilty Wm. H. Rogers, of Baltimore; John R. H. Embert, of Delaware; Braxton Lynn, of Maryland, and Samuel B. Herne, of Delaware, of the charge of being rebel spies, blockade runners, &c. These parties were condemned to be hung on Monday next, and the sentence approved by the commander of the Middle Department. Since their conviction they have been closely confined in Fort McHenry, and a number of influential citizens have interested themselves in their behalf with the President. These efforts, it was understood in the city last evening, have been successful. The President, after having patiently listened to the testimony brought to bear in their respective cases, it is currently rumored, yesterday granted a full pardon to Rogers, and commuted the punishment of the other three to imprisonment.

*Internal Revenue Tax.*—All persons in the Second Congressional District, which includes the first seven wards of the city, who shall have failed to pay their United States taxes after the 1st day of September, will have ten per cent added thereto, and upon service of notice twenty cents additional, and mileage at five cents per mile. They are subject moreover to immediate distraint and sale, and for non payment of license to fine and imprisonment. The collector has no discretion under the law, which is imperative.
