Success of Kilpatrick's Raid - Destruc-Success of Kilpatrick's Raid-Destruction of the Macon Railroad.

Circumati, August 26 - The Cazette has received a special dispatch from Atlanta, which says that Gen. Kilpatrick has destroyed the Macon railroad in two places, tearing up about fourteen miles of track. He also captured and burned a train of supplies belonging to the rebels on rowe to Atlanta. On his return he met the rebels in strong force and totally defeated them, capturing four stands of colors, six cannon, and two hundred prisoners. Afterwards he met another force of rebels who pressed him so heavily that he was obliged to abandon all but two guas, and most of the prisoners. He made an entire circuit of Atlanta, and reached Decatur with 100 men. He inflicted severe damage on the rebei communications.

THE CHICAGO CONVENTION.

A Very Large Attendance—Hotels and Houses Full—Outside Delegations Camping Out-Canvass for Candidates—East and West for McClellan.
Chicago, Ill., August 27.—The crowd attracted to the Convention to assemble on Monday is already great, and will swell to an immense proportion if one half of the numbers reported to be on their way come in. Although the hotel accommodations of this city are extensive, it has been found necessary to resort to the principal residences here for the accommodation of the numberless parties arriving. Last night numbers of persons were turned away from private houses and the hotels, because there was no place left in which to put them. Outside delegations have made arrangements to campout.

All the regular delegates to the Democratic Convention are now in, and the canvass on the Presidential candidate grows lively—

All the regular detegates to the Democratic Convention are now in, and the canvass on the Presidential candidate grows lively—But two names are prominently mentioned—Gen McClellan and Horatio Seymour. The latter says he is not and will not be a candidate. His name is being used by a gentleman of prominence of his own and several Western States, Fernando Wood, who is reported to say that Governor Seymour will be more acceptable to those he represents than Gen. McClellan. This nevertheless is denied by detegates from both the Eastern and Western States, who claim to be consistent and edinest peace men.

General McClellan appears to have a large majority of the delegates in the West as well as in the East.

The friends of General McClellan expect his nomination as early as the first or second formal bullot. The Ohio delegation is reported to be about equally divided in its choice. The disagreement between the contesting Kentucky delegation has not been adjusted, and will probably go to the Convention for a decision. The New York delegation held their first meeting for consultation this afterneon. General McClellan undoubtedly has a reliable majority among them.

The Constitutional Union men are now organizing their Mass Convention. The object of this Convention seems to be to recommend, rather than to nominate, Gen. McClellan to the Democratic Convention.

New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa and Minnesota, with two or three of the New England States, are claimed as certain for McClellan. Some of these States, however, do not vote as a unit.

The guerillas were then driven out of the town, without any loss on our side.

Decline in Gold.

New York, Aug. 27.—Gold opened to day at 233, and sold down as fow as 245; it afterwards rallied, the closing sale at 40 clock being at 245%. This decline is said to have been caused by a rungor that a gentleman from Georgia had arrived in Washington for the purpose of learning upon what basis the United States government will treat with the State of Georgia for readmission into the Union. This rumor is believed in Wall street.

Gendlemen:—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th, addressed to me in New York.

If your letter were in effect an appeal only to my own sentimeats in favor of a reamion of parties, I should not hesitate to renounce my personal views, but would be entirely ready to defer to the public opinion which your names represent.

But the conditions are no longer the same as when I expressed my readiness to retire in the event of a coatingency which might have occurred at Battimore. Having now definitely accepted the Cleveland nomination, I have not the right to act independently of the truly patiotic and earnest parky who conferred that honor upon me. In any event, it would be necessary first to consult with them. It might, besides, have only the effect still further to unsettle the public mind, and defeat the objects you have in view, if we sould disorganize first before proceeding to organize something better.

To this end I suggest that a direct effort be made to obtain an immediate understanding between the supperters of the Baltimore and Cleveland nominations, in order that the friends of both may coalesce and units upon an early day for holding such a convention as you propose. A really popular Convention, upon a broad Great Storm in the West.

Columbus, Ohio, August 26.—A storm raged here with the greatest fury this afternoon.—Trees were uprooted, and the streets of the city flooded with water.

Louisville, August 26.—A henvy storm of wind and rain prevaited here all day. Startling peals of thunder and the most vivid lightnings were its accompaniments. The steeple of the Rev. Dr. Laubeatte's church was it jured, and several other buildings damaged. A larger quantity of water fell than was ever known before to fall in a single day. The train from Nashville was delayed an hour and a kalf, coming part of the way with water up to the car axies.

Cincinnati, August 27.—A tremendous storm occurred here yesterday. The rain fell in torrents, accompanied by thunder and lightning. The effects of the storm were very severe.

The Indianapolis and Cincinnati train which leit here yesterday afternoon was blown off the track within thirteen miles of Lawrenceburg, and the cars tumbled down an embankment twelve feet high.

No details of the disaster have been received, but it is reported that from twenty to thirty persons were wounded; none are reported killed. The train contained a number of delegates for Chicago, but it is stated that none were injured.

vention as you propose. I am satisfied that I do not assume too much in saying that my friends will unite heartily in such a movement.

A really popular Convention, upon a broad and liberal basis, so that it could be regarded as convocation in mass of the people, and not the work of politicians, would command public confidence. Such a Convention, acting in the large and liberal spirit in which it was called without the consideration of persons or politicial ciques, and without reference to bygone situations, rising to the level of the occasion, and taking the conditions of the country as they present themselves to day, could safely be trusted to propose such a policy and name such a man as should and undoubtedly would receive the cordial and united support of the patriotic masses of the people. To the great body of these, so far as my information allows me to form any opinion, I think that the following propositions would be acceptable:

1. Respect for the practical liberty and the constitutional rights and dignity of the citizen. 2. The maintenance of the dignity of the United States in their relations to foreign powers. 3. The re-establishment of the Union by peace if it is possible, by war if the employment of peaceful measures cannot be made to succeed.

Much has been said of late about peace, and you will therefore excuse me if I say here what I understand by it. For me, peace signifies the integral re-establishment of the Union without slavery, because slavery is the source of all our political dissensions, and because the institution itself is condemned by the enlightened and liberal spirit of the age. These are to me the essential conditions of peace. If it is practicable to attain this result, it would not be paying too dearly for it—taking into consideration the material strength which the South has been permitted to acquire by the conduct of the war—to make concessions upon some points of secondary importance, such as that of maying all indemnity for their slaves to those who have remained in a sort

be a gain to reduce it simply to a question of money.

If in spite of all these efforts to spare the South humiliation or losses of capital likely to be too severely felt, the political chiefs who direct the South persist in war, then the policy of the Convention should be to pronounce in that case for war with all the force and energy of the nation. For peace, upon any terms, and merely because it is reace—a peace recognizing a North and a South—would not bring about a stable equilibrium. It would only prepare the way for new strangles, and for a condition of disastrous anarchy.

The paramount question is the Union. By peace, if it can be had on homorable and right terms—by war, if the political leaders who are directing the South insist upon war.

The situation of our country is unquestionally critical. It demands the devotion and the patriotism of all men who really love their country, and it is one of those moments when all personal aspirations should vanish in the face of the great questions of principle and national existence which are at stake.

Sheridan, in a dispatch of that date, reports to the War Department that the enemy have disappeared from his front, falling back to Smithfield, and the indications were that they were leaving the Shenandoah Valley. A few feints had been made by cavalry to cross the river at Williamsport, but there was no the river at Williamsport, but there was no

the river at Williamsport, but there is strength shown.
Advices received in Washington from the Upper Potomac report that on Friday the rebels shelled Williamsport from the opposite side of the river, doing considerable damage to the houses, but without interior any citizens.

Richmond papers of Saturday received by General Grant, state that Fort Morgan, Mobile Bay, is in possession of the Union forces, but whether it was blown up or evacuated was not known.

One of the most determined and desperate battles of the war is announced by Secretary Stanton in an official bulletin to have been fought last Thorsday afternoon south of Reams's Station, on the Weldon Railroad General Hancock, who held the position, was attacked by the enemy several times during the day, and repulsed them each time until half past five in the afternoon, when the enemy made a combined attack on his centre and left. The fighting was continued until dark, and resulted in the enemy being held in check.

On Friday morning it was ascertained from safe-guards who remained on the batle-field until after day-light that the enemy had withdrawn, leaving their dead and wounded on the ground. The details of the fight are given in dispatches from Generals Grant and Meade, in one of which the latter says that all the wounded had been brought off the field, but the dead were unburied, and that Gen. Greg had been instructed to send to the field and bury the dead. A dispatch from General Grant, dated at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon, says the Union forces hold the Weldon railroad, that the loss of the enemy for the last two weeks the loss of the enemy for the last two weeks will amount to about ten thousand, and that his army has lost heavily, but mostly in captured, when the enemy gained tempora y advantages.

The Latest War News. CAPTURE OF FORT MORGAN Rebels Retreating from the Valley of Virginia

Official Dispatch from Sec'ry Stanton

Washington. August 28, 1894.—To Major General Dra: A dispatch from Gen. Grant just received, states that the Richmond papers of Saturday, 27th inst., unnounce that Fort Morgan is in our possession. It is not stated whether the fort was surrendered, or whether it was blown up. Another dispatch gives the following extract from the Richmond Examiner of yesterday:

"Fort Morgan is in the enemy's possession. Whether blown up or evacuated is not known."

General Sheridan, in a dispatch dated yesterday (Saturday) at half past 2 P M., reports, "The enemy leit my front last night, falling back to Smithfield or Middleburg. We captured one hundred and one prisoners yesterday, and inflicted a loss of one hundred and fifty killed and wounded. There have been a few feints to cross the river by cavalry at Williamsport, but there was no strength shown. The indications to-day are that they will fall back out of the Valley. Other reports state that the enemy is leaving the Shenandoah Valley."

Nothing has been received from Gen. Sheridan for two days.

FROM THE UPPER POTOMAC.

The Rebel Movements—The Shelling of Williamsport, Md.

Washington, August 28—A letter received here to day from the Upper Potomac says the rebels, in cavalry force, were last seen at Cherry Run, eleven miles west of Hagerstown, on Friday. The mail stage arrived at the latter place from Hancock, a distance of about twenty-four miles, on the night of that day.

The shelling of Williamsport by the enemy, from the opposite side of the river on Friday, did no injury to the citizens, but the houses were some what injured.

New York, Aug. 25.—The dispatch from cavalry headquariers, dated Saturday night, states that no rebels have yet crossed the Potomac, and all is quiet at Shepperdstown, Williamsport and Hagerstown.

A Harper's Ferry dispatch to the Herald, dated Saturday, states that a careful reconnoises note made that morning developed the fact that the rebels had withdrawn from our front during the preceding night. Our cavalry pushed on and occupied Charlestown without meeting any enemy.

The opinion prevails that Grant's recent movements have necessitated the recalling of Early to Richmond, while some conjecture that he intends crossing into Maryland at Shepherdstown or Williamsport.

From the Army of the Potomac.

Washington, August 28th.—A letter from the Aimy of the Potomac dated yesterday, says that the portion of the line of the Weldon railroad was recaptured by the rebels in Thursday's engagament and extends from Reem's Station about 3 miles northwardly. The road had, however, been previously entirely destroyed, and cannot be of any use to the enemy while we continue to hold the portion on the north, and between that and Petersburg. The latter is securely in our possession.

Everything was quiet along the entire front at the last accounts, with the exception of occasional picket firing. Both parties were engaged burying their dead and caring for their wounded.

Shipmen's of Cotton—The Recent Raid in Memphis—Killtd and Wounded.
Cairo, August 26th.—General Washburne has is sued an order permitting all cotton now at Memphis to be shipped to the North, also establishing supply stores in the district of West Tennessee.

The best estimates place our loss in the recent raid on Memphis at fifteen killed; fifty wounded, and one hundred and forty missing, the latter including eighty nine citizens. The raiders are said to have had two hundred and thirty missing. General Washburne has is sued an order complimenting the officers and men of the Memphis militia for their prompt and soldierly conduct in defending the city against Forrest.

Ford has only a small force, and is evidently prepared to make a rapid retreat if necessary.

Maryland Constitutional Convention.

Annapolis, August 27, 1864.

The Convention met at 10 o'clock, fitty-eight members present, and Hon. H. H. Goldsborough in the chair.

Mr. Abbott submitted the following, which lies over under the rules of the Convention:

"Resolved, That in view of the uncertain condition of affairs in this State, owing to the possibility of an invasion by the public enemy, which may interfere with the expression of the popular will on the day to be fixed for voting on this Constitution, that this Convention, when it adjourns without day, will be adjourned subject to the call of the President, and, in case of the death or disqualification of the president (H. H. Goldsborough, Frederick Scaley, of Frederick county, Joseph B. Pugh, of Cecil county, Henry Stockbridge, of Baltimore city, William T. Purnell, of Worcester county, be and they are hereby authorized, in the order in which they are named, to act as president and call the Convention together."

Mr. Audoun offered the following section, to be added to the article on the Orphans' Courts.

The Added to the article on the Orphans' Courts:

"Sec. — It shall be the duty of the judges of the several Orphans' Courts of this State, before they shall proceed to bind any negroes as apprentices, to administer to the party to whom he or she is to be bound, the same oath as prescribed for voters by this Constitution, in the article on the elective framchise, and upon the refusal of the said party to take and subscribe to said oath the said courts shall hold the person sorefusing to be an unsuitable person to have charge of such negro, and the fact of such oath having been taken by the party to whom such negro has been bound shall be expressed in the indenture."

It was adopted by a strict party vote.

Mr. Stirling submitted the following:

"Sec. — Any person who shall, after this Constitution shall have gone into effect, detain in slavery any person emancipated by the provisions of this Constitution, shall, on conviction, be fined not less than \$500 nor more than \$5,000, or be imprisoned not more than \$5,000, or be imprisoned not more than five years, and any of the judges of this State shall discharge on habous corpus any person so detained in slavery."

This section was adopted by a strict party wote. Mr. Hodson refused to vote, and the President so ordered it to be entered upon the journal.

Section 32 of the report provided that the salary of each of the judges of the courts of Baltimore should be \$3,500 per annum.

Mr. Abbott moved to insert \$3,000.

After considerable discussion Mr. Abbott's motion prevailed.

The majority of the committee on Provisions and Oreinances, made a long report, embracing among other provisions, the right of soldiers in the field to vote for or against the new Constitution, for President, members of Congress. &c. The report also directs that the Governor shall, within five days after the adjournment of the Convention, crder an election to be held on the 12th of October, for the adoption or rejection of the new Constitution.

The minority of the committee made a report protesting against the right of the soldier to vote in the field, and also against voters being required to take the oath prescribed in the Constitution.

The Convention adjourned till Monday.

The Right to Levy Water Taxes - A Legal Opinion—
Water Mains - The Dome of the Capital - Parade of Clerks - Concert at the President's Grounds—
Visit of Odd Mellows to Baltimore, &c.

The corporation attorney, Joseph H. Bradley, Esq., has given to the water board his legal opinion in reference to the act passed by the councils June 30, 1864, providing for a more thorough distribution of Potomac water throughout the city of Washington. He holds that under the acts of Congress the water board have not the power to "evy" and collect taxes for water mains or fire plugs, but that the city corporation itself has the power to "evy" such taxes. The councils followed the very words of the act of Congress of March 3, 1863, and levied, in the fourth section of the act of June 20, a tax for the water mains, but in the 5th section of their act they have departed from that course and undertaken to delegate the power to the water board to "levy" the tax for fire plugs authorized by the second section of the act of Congress before mentioned. In that, is Mr. Bradley's judgment, they have entirely transcended their power, and the grant to the water board is void. The rule he takes to be inflexibly fixed, that where a power to levy a tax is given it must be exercised by the person or body to whom it is given, and not by any agent or appointee of such person or body corporate.

In regard to appoint water mains, Mr. Bradley decides that the original act of Congress giving the people and corporation the advantage of the Potomac water, conferred a general discretionary power on the corporation over the subject of laying such mains, and the subsequentact of March 3, 1863, gives a distinct power, which is not discretionary, but is mandatory, and one which the corporation over the subject of laying such mains, and the subsequentact of the real estate, &c. Mr. Bradley says:

"There is no inconsistency between these powers. They may well stand together. If so, they must be take

be defeated."

Under the corporation act of June 20, 1861, Mr. B. says the powers of the water board are ministerial only, with authority to prescribe rules and regulations. They are to take charge of the mains after they have been ordered by the corporate authorities, either under their discretionary power, or on the application of the owners of the real estate, and to see to their being laid, and to the distribution of the water therefrom. They have no power to say what mains shall be laid, or when, or where. That is reserved to the councils.

The Price of Coal.
The public has lately been much exercised on the subject of the very high price of all articles that enter into household consumption, but in no one article so much as the price of coal. As much has been said in the papers of the day in regard thereto, permit me to give to the public a few facts and figures. We will take the Wilksbarre coal region, from which come the largest quantity of coal coasumed in our city and vicinity, embracing the Baltimore Company's mines and other similar coals.

what would be a fair price for the coal at re-tail. I must, however, deprecate the course pursued by parties who attempt to enlighten the public by declamation against combina-tions and monopolies, and charge the ad-vanced price in coal to these imaginary com-

tions and monopolies, and charge the advanced price in coal to these imaginary cominations.

A newspaper article would be entirely too short to explain the real cause. I therefore leave it to the good sense of the reader. But one thing I will say, that the high price of coal in the city is not owing to the want of competition here. New York, Philadelphia and the East are the competitors for the purchase of the Pennsylvania coal. At the present writing New York is in the market and offering boatmen a beaus, and paying \$7 per ton freight, while the freight to Baltimore is \$5.33. The effect of the clamor against monopolists has certainly lessened the quantity of coal that otherwise would have been sold, and thereby lessened the means of the dealer to purchase a supply for the coming winter. If the parties referred to will go to work earnestly, raise capital, secure yard room, and have a large quantity of coal brought to Baltimore, and then enter into competition with the dealers, they will become real philanthropists, benefiting the public at large, and the poor in particular. But, by all means, let them not prevent a single ton of coal being brought to market, no matter by whom.

MESSES. EDITORS: The recent movement of our people, in mass meeting assembled, toresist the extortionate price demanded by our city traders for coal, has already had the good effect of bringing down the price over

No wonder that our people were indignant at the enormous charges.
