

DEMOCRATS TAKE ALL BUT 4 OFFICES IN PRINCE GEORGES

Win the Control of County
Commission, but Lose
One Legislator.

REPUBLICAN ELECTED REGISTRAR OF WILLS

Gambrill Given 6,133 Votes
to 4,869 for Mudd;
Latimer Victor.

The Democrats took every office save four in Prince Georges county, according to complete but unofficial returns. They wrested control of the county commission from the Republicans, but dropped one of their solid delegation in the State legislature.

William T. Davis, Republican candidate for registrar of wills, defeated Edward A. Fuller, Democrat, 6,026 votes to 4,786.

Edward L. Latimer, Republican, with 5,663 votes, was successful in the race for county surveyor over Roy T. Fowkes, Democrat, who received 4,625, and William A. Duvall, Republican, with 5,394, defeated J. August Miller, Democrat, who with 4,867, polled the lowest vote of the Democratic candidates for the county commission.

Frank Small, jr., was the successful Republican candidate for the house of delegates, receiving 5,285 votes.

The four Democrats elected to the county commission were: Harry M. Bowen, 6,424; Brice Bowie, 6,721; Theodore B. Middleton, 5,092, and George W. Waters, jr., 6,058. The losing commission candidates were, besides, Miller, Newman G. Dudrow, 4,609; G. E. Lancaster, 3,890; Omar C. Strawn, 4,362, and Thomas M. Underwood, 4,231.

Gambrill Leads Mudd.

Prince Georges county gave Gambrill 6,133 votes and Mudd 4,869.

Mrs. Eva C. Chase, of Riverdale, first woman's candidate for a State office and seeking the office of the clerk of the court of appeals, was defeated in her own county, receiving 4,736 votes, against 5,691 for James A. Young.

For clerk, circuit court—John M. Bowie (Republican), 3,785; Summerfield D. Hall (Democrat), 6,424.

For State's attorney—Alan Bowie, Democrat, 5,471; J. Frank Parran, Republican, 5,433.

For State senator—James P. Curley, Republican, 3,973; Lansdale G. Sasscer, Democrat, 7,051.

For sheriff—Charles S. Early, Democrat, 6,631; Thomas H. Garrison, Republican, 5,145.

For county treasurer—William H. Brooke, Republican, 4,196; R. Ernest Smith, Democrat, 6,534.

For judges orphans' court (3)—Thomas L. Coffron, Republican, 4,442; Mrs. Mary E. Morley, Republican, 4,745; the Rev. Edgar Smith, Republican, 4,679; Philip G. Miller, Democrat, 5,585; John A. Schultz, Democrat, 5,538; Millard D. Thorne, Democrat, 5,682.

The four successful Democratic candidates for the house of delegates were J. Guy Bell, 5,802; Burton A. Ford, 6,118; William F. Keys, 5,321, and Henry L. Morris, 5,286.
