

NATIONAL UNIVERSITY BEGINS NEW SEASON

Classes in Full Swing, Students Turn Attention to Social Activities.

MORE COURSES LISTED

With classes in full swing after the Christmas holidays, and no examinations in immediate prospect, National University students are turning their attention to social activities. The first social meeting at the institution to be held in the new year was the luncheon of the Cy Press Club, Thursday, at the University Women's Club, 1634 I street northwest.

Tickets have been placed on sale for the annual War College smoker, given by the senior class of the National University law school. This is to take place Wednesday, January 18, at L'Aiglon, according to Robert W. McCullough, president of the senior class.

Grades for the past quarter are being prepared and will be forwarded to students as soon as possible, according to an announcement made at the registrar's office. This work is expected to be completed during the present week. Grades will be forwarded by mail to all students or they may be learned by personal application at the registrar's office.

A number of new students have registered at National University for the present quarter and registration still is continuing, it is announced. Several new courses are being offered in the school of economics and government. These are French, under the direction of Prof. Henry Lazard, born and educated in France, and at present an attache of the Argentine Embassy; and a new course in accountancy under the direction of Dr. Joseph Zucker.

In the school of economics and government, National University offers a complete and comprehensive course in economics as well as in the history and application of modern governmental institutions.

Among the courses offered are American Government, under Prof. Fred P. Myers, foundations of government, under Dr. Charles Pergler, comparative government, also under Dr. Pergler and a number of courses in history, economics, sociology and other subjects.

In addition, the following courses may be taken up by those interested in the study of government and its evolution: Municipal corporations, government contracts and claims, international claims, international law, interstate commerce law, modern civil law, jurisprudence and legal history, Roman law, constitutional law, historical survey of common law, Federal tax laws, Federal Trade Commission and trusts and monopolies.
