## STIFF PRIMARY BATTLE FACED BY DEMOCRATS

Are Drawn Lines Hardest Factional Fight In Generations

Withdrawal Dead Line Passes Without Rumored Filing By Dr. Byrd

On the stroke of 12 midnight, the time for withdrawal—as well as entry—of State-wide candidates expired and left the Democratic lists calling for "first and second choice" voting not only on the Governorship but for the Comptentiarship and normal but for the Comptrollership and nomination for Attorney General.
