

ALVA TYSON IN HOSPITAL

Former Magistrate In Serious Condition At Maryland General.

Alva H. Tyson, of Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, former police magistrate at the Northwestern Police Station, and one of the closest friends of the late Governor Crothers, is lying seriously ill from spinal paralysis in the Maryland General Hospital.

Mr. Tyson entered the institution a week ago. His condition instead of showing improvement has grown rapidly worse. A few days ago Mrs. Tyson and her son Allan took up their quarters in the hospital, and have been constantly at his bedside.

For the past year and a half Mr. Tyson has been in poor health. About two weeks ago he suffered a severe attack of rheumatism. A specialist was called in and he ordered his removal to the hospital.
