

Colored Woman Dies Alone.

Patrolman Philly Gauley, of the Western district, discovered the lifeless body of Marla King, an aged colored woman, in the rear of the second story of her home, 420 King street, yesterday morning about 10 o'clock. The woman, who lived in the house alone, had evidently been dead for several hours. Coroner Wiltshire gave a certificate of death due to paralysis of the heart. So far as is known the woman had no relatives living in this city. Late yesterday afternoon the body was taken in charge by Mr. James B. Hines, 5 Clay street.

Books For Policemen.
