

DAVID R. HOWARD'S BURIAL TOMORROW

Confederate Veteran Was
Descendant Of Pioneer
Baltimore Family.

LOST LEG IN CIVIL WAR

Was Retired Flour Merchant.
Lived At 939 St. Paul Street
For Sixty Years.

Funeral services for **David** Ridgely **Howard**, 83-year-old Confederate veteran, who died early yesterday at his home, will be conducted at 3 P. M. tomorrow at the residence, 939 St. Paul street. Burial will be in Greenmount Cemetery.

Mr. Howard was a descendant of the **Howard** family in Baltimore, whose founders came here in the seventeenth century. He was a grandson of John Eager **Howard**, Revolutionary War hero and Governor of Maryland, and for whom John, Eager and **Howard** streets were named.

Joined Southern Forces.

At the outbreak of the Civil War **Mr. Howard** became interested in the cause of the South and joined the Confederate Army. He became a member of the old First Maryland Regiment, which later was merged with the Second Maryland Regiment. He was wounded July 5, 1863, at Culp's Hill, in the Battle of Gettysburg.

On April 19, 1864, in the fighting around Petersburg, he again was wounded, this injury resulting in the amputation of a leg. **Mr. Howard** then was taken to a war hospital in Richmond, where he stayed for practically the remainder of the war.

Was In Flour Business.

Mr. Howard was never married. He retired from the flour business about fifteen years ago.

He had lived at his St. Paul street home for sixty years. A nephew, William Ross **Howard**, is the nearest surviving relative.
