ORROCK LINEAGE AND ARMS

The Name Is A Very Ancient One, Occurring In Early Scottish History And Works On Heraldry.

The record of the births of the children of John and Susannah (Hammond) Orrick are to be found in the parish register of St. Margaret's Church, Anne Arundel county. They are as follows: (1) Rachel Orrick, born in November, 1720, married William Hopkins; (2) John Orrick, born February 20, 1722, married Caroline Hammond; (3) Nicholas Orrick, born May 1, 1725, died February 1, 1781, married, first, Hannah Cromwell, and, second, Mary Bell; (4) Nathan Orrick, born September 4, 1727, died in 1733; (5) Thomas Orrick, born June 8, 1732, died in 1733; (6) Rebecca Orrick, born on September 14, 1733, married Mr. Murray and had issue; (7) Catharine Orrick, born August 19, 1736, married Mr. Hall, had issue; (8) Charles Orrick, of Howard county, born February 28, 1738, ensign in Revolutionary War, married Rebecca Stewart; (9) Sarah Orrick, born April 3, 1741, married, first, Mr. Chilton, and, second, Mr. Douglass, had issue; (10) Susannah Orrick, born January 9, 1743, married Mr. Sullivan, had issue.

John Orrick died in 1749. He left to his son, Nicholas Orrick, 100 acres in Baltimore county called Rich Neck, and another 150 acres in Baltimore county called William's Lock. James Orrick, of Anne Arundel county, born in 1688, son of James and Mary Orrick, must have died after 1717, since his will is signed on that date. He married Priscilla Raley. Their children were: (a) Mary Orrick and (b) Ezekiel Orrick. In his recent book, Mr. Joshua Warfield states that William Ridgely 3d married, in 1728, Mary Orrick, daughter of James and Priscilla (Raley) Orrick. It appears by the will of Anthony Raley, of South River, 1710, his daughter, Priscilla Orrick, came into possession of Beetonson's Adventure, on South river, which tract was taken up by Edward Beetonson and his wife, Lydia Watkins.

By the will of James Orrick, his daughter, Mary Orrick, inherited one-third of his estate. Her mother, widow of James Orrick, also inherited one-third and married Abraham Woodward, son of William Woodward, of London. The children of William and Mary (Orrick) Ridgely were William, Nicholas, John, Henry, Greenbury, Priscilla Griffith, Jane Woodward, Mary Pumphrey, Sophia Pumphrey and Ann Rigby. The descendants of Rachel Orrick, eldest daughter of John and Susanna (Hammond) Orrick, and William Hopkins can be found in the Thomas Book, page 352, and also in an article on the Husbinald family published in the Maryland Heraldry of The Sun, December 24, 1906.

William Hopkins was the son of Gerard and Margaret (Johns) Hopkins. William Hopkins was a Friend and Rachel Orrick an Episcopalian. It was agreed between them that the boys should go with their father to meeting and the daughter accompany their mother to church. However, all the children finally became Friends. Susanna Hopkins, daughter of William and Rachel (Orrick) H. Hopkins, married George Mason, of Virginia, and became exceedingly active in the Friends' meetings. She was a highly cultivated woman, and a model mother to her children. Her children were: (1) Elizabeth, born April 1, 1758, died November 28, 1784, who married, July 21, 1779, Nicholas Ruxton Moore, issue: (a) John Ruxton Moore, (b) Caroline Moore, (c) Hammond Moore. All died in infancy. (2) John Moore, born March 29, 1760.

Both children of Caroline Hammond Orrick died in infancy. In an extract from her will, dated 1793, after giving her son-in-law, Nicholas Ruxton Moore, a life interest in about 400 acres of land in Anne Arundel county, she disposes of them, after her death, as follows: "To the seven following described persons—that is to say, to the eldest daughter of Rachel Hopkins, the eldest daughter of Rebecca Murray, the eldest daughter of Catharine Hall, the eldest daughter of Susannah Sullivan, the eldest daughter of Sarah Chilton, latterly called Sarah Douglas, also the eldest daughter of Ann Stevenson, which she had to her first husband, Joseph Cromwell, and the eighth of Clarissa Brooks, say the eldest daughter of Ann Stevenson, all of the said Clarissa, all of whom are the descendants of John and Susanna Orrick, of Anne Arundel county, who formerly occupied the said lands." The Clarissa Orrick mentioned married Dr. Samuel Allen Brooks. Their daughter, Clarissa Brooks, married Samuel Richards. Their son, Allen Richards, of Frederick county, Maryland, was the father of George H. Richards, of Columbia, Pa.

As the Orricks were large landowners in Scotland, so their descendants, the Orricks of Lord Baltimore's Colony, quickly became possessed of large estates in Maryland. They intermarried with the Cromwells, Worthingtons, Hammonds, Stevensons, all landed gentry of Maryland, and those who removed to Virginia also married well and became prosperous planters, possessed of valuable land and many slaves. Capt. Nicholas Orrick commanded Baltimore county troops and was a zealous churchman, and down the line of descent the Orricks are found men of peace in the communities where their lives were cast, honored citizens, men of wealth, yet ready to fight for the liberty of their country or the rights of their State when either had need of their strength.

Nathan Orrick, son of John and Susannah (Hammond) Orrick, was a man of prominence and highly esteemed in Baltimore county, where he resided. He was three times vestryman of Old St. Thomas Church, Garrison Forest, and in 1756 commanded the troop of Baltimore county, with 13 children: (a) Margaret Orrick, born November 23, 1758, Rev. Sater Stevenson; (2) John Orrick, born July 12, 1752, died January 15, 1753; (3) John Orrick (our second son), born October 30, 1753, died November 4, 1810, married Sarah Merryman and had 13 children; (4) Margaret Orrick, born November 23, 1755, married Job Smith; (5) Susan Orrick, born August 24, 1757, married, January 7, 1784, Abalnon Butler; (6) Nicholas Orrick, born April 5, 1759, died July 9, 1822, married Mary Pendleton and had 12 children; (7) Sarah Orrick, born April 18, 1761, married Mr. Jackson; (8) Charles Orrick, born November 21, 1762, died June 18, 1833, married, first, Catharine Davenport, and, second, Ann Campbell.

Hannah Cromwell Orrick, wife of Capt. Nicholas Orrick, died December 2, 1762. Capt. Nicholas Orrick married, March 16, 1769, his second wife, Mary Bell. Their children were: (9) William Orrick, born February 25, 1770, died in 1804, and (10) Sydney Orrick, born July 13, 1771, died in 1825, both of whom died unmarried.

Hannah (Cromwell) Orrick was descended from Richard Cromwell, of Baltimore county, Maryland. According to the Maryland Archives, Richard Cromwell was appointed one of the Justices of Baltimore county July 30, 1696. He was appointed one of the commissioners for the better division of Baltimore and Anne Arundel counties. He settled in Maryland on the south side of the Patuxent river and October 10, 1670, he and his brother William received a patent for 300 acres of land

called Cromwell's Adventure. Prior to 1700 and his brother had patented between 5,000 and 6,000 acres of land. Richard Cromwell, Sr., married Elizabeth Besson and he died prior to 1717. His children were: (1) John Cromwell, (2) Richard Cromwell, (3) Hannah Cromwell, of Anne Arundel county, married Hannah Rattenburg, who was born October 31, 1704, died November 23, 1775. Their children were: (1) Hannah Cromwell, who was the first wife of Capt. Nicholas Orrick; (2) Margaret Cromwell; (3) John Cromwell; (4) Anne Cromwell, married Thomas Sheredine.

John Cromwell was an extensive landowner, whose property included Cromwell's Park, Cromwell's Chance, Cromwell's Addition and Hunting Ridge. His will was probated May 9, 1734, and his lands were to be equally divided among his children after the death of his wife. Hannah Besson, mother of Hannah Cromwell, first wife of Capt. Nicholas Orrick, was a daughter of Margaret and John Rattenburg, and was born in 1703, died in 1775. Her first husband was Capt. John Cromwell. At his death she married, in 1734, William Worthington, son of Worthington and Helen Hammond and grandson of Rebecca (Larkin) Lightfoot and Col. Thomas Hammond. Her daughter, Hannah Cromwell, married Capt. Nicholas Orrick, who was first cousin of William Worthington. Several members of the two families of Hannah (Rattenburg) Cromwell Worthington had the same names, namely, Hannah, Ann, John, Henry, two sons, John Cromwell and John Worthington, married sisters. John Cromwell married Elizabeth Todd and John Worthington married Mary Todd. The funeral sermon of Hannah (Rattenburg) Cromwell Worthington was preached by Rev. Sater Stevenson, at that time (1775) Ann Orrick Cromwell, wife of Joseph Cromwell.

Nicholas Orrick, born April 5, 1759, second son of Nicholas and Hannah (Cromwell) Orrick, married Mary Pendleton, and had seven sons and five daughters. In 1792 he was elected justice of the peace for Berkeley county, West Virginia, and in 1807 was appointed Sheriff and served one term. He sold part of his estate in Berkeley county, West Virginia, and moved to what is now Morgan county, West Virginia, where he was associated in business with James Rumsey. It is claimed that Rumsey was the real inventor of the steamboat and that he lived in what is Rumsey's boat when it made its final trip.

Nicholas Orrick died at Berkeley Springs prior to 1820, leaving a widow, six sons and five daughters. All married and had families, except two sons. Most of them died West. The will of Nicholas Orrick was made and probated prior to the year 1820, but neither the will nor any trace of it can be found at the present time, except what appears from the following deed: "A deed of release was made by Cromwell Orrick, executor of Nicholas Orrick, deceased, bearing the date the 28th day of May, 1833, to Casper Weaver.

Nicholas Orrick is buried in what is known as the Old English Burying Ground, in Berkeley Springs, Morgan county, W. Va. His son, Cromwell Orrick, and several members of his family are buried adjoinment. In 1904 Mr. Henry A. Orrick had the body of his father, Lieut. John Orrick, moved to Baltimore.

Nicholas Orrick and Mary Pendleton were married February 3, 1783. Their children were: (1) William Pendleton Orrick, born April 24, 1789, died 1850; (2) James Orrick, born October 4, 1791, died 1804; (3) Cromwell Orrick, born August 25, 1793, died 1856; (4) Elizabeth Orrick, born October 29, 1795, died 1847, married 12 children; (5) Charles Orrick, born October 6, 1797, died 1851, married 12 children; (6) Benjamin Orrick, born March 25, 1800; (7) Susan Pendleton Orrick, born November 25, 1802, died 1869, married John Taylor; (8) John Orrick, born January 12, 1805; (9) Charles Orrick, born February 15, 1807, died 1845; (10) Lucy A. Orrick, born June 10, 1809, died 1849, married George Grimes; (11) Francis Virginia Orrick, born September 28, 1811; (12) Philip Pendleton Orrick, born October 20, 1813.

Cromwell Orrick, born August 25, 1793, third son of Nicholas and Mary (Pendleton) Orrick, married, January 25, 1810, Mary Johnson, daughter of Peter Johnson, and had the following children: (1) Rosannah Orrick, born November 12, 1817, died 1841, married Joseph Tidball; (2) Louise Orrick, born December 18, 1819, died 1859, married, October 29, 1839, Charles A. Swann; (3) Edward Orrick, born January 18, 1822, died 1847; (4) John J. Orrick, born January 15, 1824, died in infancy; (5) Mary Orrick, born December 15, 1825, married, July 2, 1845, Charles H. Locher; (6) Henry Clay Orrick, born January 22, 1828, died 1847; (7) Mary Elizabeth Orrick, born April 21, 1830; (8) Capt. John Orrick, born November 30, 1832, died 1893; (9) Lucy Augusta Orrick, born July 29, 1843, died 1853, married, in 1856, Henry S. Locher; (10) Nicholas Cromwell Orrick, born October 27, 1836, died 1897, married, January, 1863, Mary Semmes.

Capt. Johnson Orrick, born November 10, 1822, was an officer of the Thirty-third Virginia Infantry, Confederate States Army, who was killed in battle at Morantown, Va., June 24, 1863. Capt. Johnson Orrick married, November 5, 1853, Margaret A. Cooke, born May 26, 1824, who was the daughter of John Thomas Cooke, of Jefferson county, Virginia, and his wife, Sophia Washington Albert. The children of Captain Johnson and Margaret A. (Cooke) Orrick are: (1) Henry Albert Orrick, of Baltimore; (2) Mary Johnson Orrick; (3) Sophie Albert Orrick. Mr. Henry Albert Orrick, son of Capt. Johnson and Margaret A. (Cooke) Orrick, is one of the most prominent bankers of Baltimore, and in 1903 was president of the Baltimore Stock Exchange. He is a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, the Maryland and Merchants' Club, of the Country Club and of the Elbridge Fox and Great Spring Valley Hunt Clubs. Mr. Orrick married, Martha Burroughs Leveing; they have three sons: (1) Johnson Orrick; (2) Henry Albert Orrick; (3) William Henry De Courcy Wright Orrick, and one daughter: (4) Louise Wright Orrick. Charles Orrick, born November 21, 1762, died 1833, was the second son of Nicholas

and Hannah (Cromwell) Orrick. He married first, January 2, 1787, Catherine Davenport, youngest daughter of Abraham and Mary (Semmes) Davenport, of Jefferson county. She died in 1804 and Charles Orrick married second, in 1806, Anne Campbell, by whom he had six children: (1) Charles Orrick, was a sailor in his youth and was captured during the Revolution while on his way to France by a British frigate and held a prisoner in New York harbor by the British until after the war. He settled in Berkeley county, West Virginia, and was elected justice of the peace in 1798 and re-elected in 1801. He was appointed by the Governor of Virginia sheriff of Berkeley county in 1813 and 1814.

The name of the children of Charles and Catherine (Davenport) Orrick, taken from the family Bible of James Campbell, are as follows: (1) John Orrick, born March 14, 1788, died May 24, 1804; (2) George Orrick, born July 14, 1789, died at Winchester, Va.; (3) Nicholas Orrick, born September 22, 1790, never married; (4) Mary Orrick, born December 19, 1801. She married James Harlan and moved to Kentucky and had a large family of children. Some of her descendants live in Springfield, Ill.; (5) Margaret Orrick, born April 29, 1793, died February 13, 1876. She married Barton Campbell, of Berkeley county, West Virginia, and had five daughters and four sons. None of the daughters married; the sons married and had two children each; (6) Samuel Davenport Orrick, born January 10, 1795, died March 30, 1859. He was a merchant of Lancaster, Pa., and married a daughter of George Ross, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. He died in Philadelphia, leaving two sons, now deceased; (7) Catharine Orrick, born July 9, 1796, died June 6, 1797; (8) Davenport Orrick, born May 30, 1800, died August 15, 1832; married Miss McKnight, of Reading, Pa. No issue; (9) Hannah Cromwell Orrick, born March 22, 1798, died May 28, 1843; married Casper Weaver (Von Weber) a wealthy farmer of Berkeley county.

The children of Casper and Hannah Cromwell (Orrick) Weaver were: (1) Theodore Weaver, died young; (2) Catharine Davenport Weaver, married Dr. Edwin G. Buckles, who died in 1878, leaving no issue; (3) George Lowry Weaver, born 1839, was killed at Slatersville, Va., May 9, 1862. He served in Company B, First Regiment Virginia Cavalry, Berkeley county, Confederate States Army; (4) Charles Jacob Weaver, born 1837, served first in Company B, Stonewall Brigade, was later transferred to Company B, First Cavalry, died March 14, 1878. He married Frances Arbella Snodgrass, youngest daughter of Col. Robert Verdier and Sarah Ann (Snodgrass) Snodgrass. Their children are: (a) Leonora Weaver; (b) Hannah Orrick Weaver, married November 2, 1890, Harry Fenton Smith. They have one daughter, Hannah Cromwell Smith, born Thanksgiving Day, November 24, 1904; (c) Casper Weaver, died young; (d) Charles J. Weaver, unmarried; (e) George Lowry Weaver, married Miss Louise Snodgrass, all of Martinsburg, West Virginia.

Casper Weaver, who married Hannah Cromwell Orrick, was born December 14, 1791, died August 1879, and is buried in Green Hill Cemetery, Martinsburg, W. Va. The children of Charles Orrick by his second wife Ann (Cammell) Orrick were: (1) James Campbell Orrick, born October 10, 1807, died July 17, 1801. He married February 10, 1835, Shepherd Snodgrass Verdier Pendleton, daughter of William Pendleton, of Berkeley county, Virginia. They had two children, Rev. Dr. William Pendleton Orrick, of Reading, Pa., who is unmarried, and Charles James Orrick, of Cumberland, Md., who married Miss Helen M. Lewis. They have three children: (a) Jesse Orrick; (b) Virginia Pendleton Orrick, who married Lewis Carpenter and has one little daughter, Louie Carpenter; (c) Helen Lewis Orrick, who married James Sloan and has one son; (2) Sarah Ann Orrick, born July 23, 1800, married Dr. Walker Evans, removed West and died there, leaving four sons and one daughter. Their descendants live in St. Louis; (3) Campbell Orrick, born July 4, 1811, died June 12, 1839, removed to Missouri, married, but left no children; (4) Douglass Orrick, born September 13, 1813, went to St. Charles, Mo., married twice and had two children by each wife; (5) Charles Hamilton Orrick, born December 13, 1816, died 1850; (6) Alexander Cromwell Orrick, born May 5, 1819, removed to St. Louis, married Miss Brent and had five daughters and three sons; (7) Charles Orrick, son of Nicholas and Hannah (Cromwell) Orrick, is buried in the graveyard of the old Falling Waters Church, Berkeley county West Virginia. His wife, Catharine Davenport Orrick, is buried beside her husband.

Ann Orrick, born in 1750, eldest child of

Nicholas and Hannah (Cromwell) Orrick, married, first, in 1768, Joseph Cromwell, son of Comfort Dorsey and Joseph Cromwell. The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. Thomas Craddock. Joseph Cromwell died in 1781 and his widow, Ann (Orrick) Cromwell, married on December 23, 1783, Rev. Sater Stevenson, of Baltimore county and of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was a widower with three children and was the son of Rachel and Richard King Stevenson and grandson of Mary King and Edward Stevenson, of Baltimore county. The Stevenson family was of English descent and settlers in Maryland, where they owned much land. The marriage ceremony between Rev. Sater Stevenson and Ann (Orrick) Cromwell was performed by Rev. Mr. Andrews.

The children of Joseph and Ann (Orrick) Cromwell were: (1) Margaret Cromwell, born in 1776, died in 1846, who married, first, George Stevenson, by whom she had seven children, and second, William Stewart, by whom she had no issue; Matilda Stevenson, a daughter of George and Margaret Cromwell (Orrick) Stevenson, married F. G. Waters. Their son, James S. Waters, married Mary W. Fite; (2) Philomona Cromwell, (3) Nicholas Cromwell, (4) Hannah Cromwell, born in 1778, who married Thomas Taylor and had a son, Robert Taylor, who was Mayor of Chicago, died in 1838 and died in 1839. He was one of the old defenders who protected Baltimore during the War of 1812 to 1814 and was the son of Robert Taylor, of Dublin, Ireland, and his wife, Mary Ridley, of Wales. The children of Robert and Elizabeth Stevenson Taylor were: (a) Thomas Taylor, (b) George Washington Taylor, (c) Robert Alexander Taylor, (d) Washington Taylor, (e) Nathan Taylor, (f) William Reuben Taylor, (g) Joseph James Taylor, (h) Nicholas Cromwell Taylor, (i) Sater Orrick Taylor, (8) Reuben Stevenson, left no issue; (9) Ann Stevenson, married Mr. Jamison, in 1834, died in 1890, married Rev. Dr. James McKenney Stevenson, daughter of Ann Evans and Alexander Stevenson. Robert Alexander Taylor and his wife removed about 1830 to Galveston, Texas, where they remained for several years. Before they returned to Baltimore, the steamers of the Baltimore and Susquehanna Steamboat Company, the steamers of which company ran from Baltimore to Havre de Grace and Port Deposit. He was also as-

sociated with the steamboat line running between Baltimore and Fredericksburg, Va. He was for many years associated with Grace Protestant Episcopal Church of Baltimore, in which he held the office of treasurer and vestryman and of which he was warden for more than 30 years, being junior warden in 1901, at the time of his death. A memorial tablet is erected in the church to his memory. His wife, Ann Evans Stevenson Taylor, died in 1893. Their children were: (1) Howard Taylor; (2) Ann Elizabeth Taylor; (3) Orrick Taylor; (4) Mary Louisa Taylor; (5) James Alexander Taylor, married Mary Louise Richards and had two sons—(a) James Eugene Taylor, married Mary K. Weston, and has two little daughters, (b) Howard Richards Taylor; (6) Samuel Taylor; (7) Virginia Taylor; (8) George Wesley Taylor, died 1896; (9) Anule Stevenson Taylor; (10) Robert Griffith Taylor; (11) Robert Stevenson Taylor, died 1905, unmarried.

John Orrick, son of Nicholas and Hannah Cromwell Orrick, born October 30, 1753, died November 4, 1810. He married Sarah Merryman September 15, 1754; died June 5, 1833. Their children were: (1) Nicholas Orrick, born March 20, 1777, no record of death; (2) John Cromwell Orrick, born June 12, 1778, died March 10, 1804; (3) Elijah Orrick, born October 17, 1780, died May 8, 1803; (4) Ann Orrick, born January 9, 1782, died July 7, 1782; (5) Jane Orrick, born November 22, 1783, no record of death; (6) Daniel Orrick, born September 12, 1785, never married; (7) Ann Orrick (second), born October 26, 1787, died March 4, 1813; (8) James Orrick, born April 11, 1789, died April 13, 1821; (9) Elizabeth Orrick, born May 5, 1790, died May 5, 1857; (10) Edward Orrick, born January 11, 1792, died January 28, 1833, married Susanna Keener; (11) Benjamin Orrick, born March 13, 1794, died September 7, 1794; (12) William Orrick, born August 22, 1795, died March 5, 1833; (13) Sarah Merryman Orrick, born October 25, 1799, died December 17, 1828.

An extract from the will of John Cromwell Orrick written on board the ship Rebecca, China sea, December 6, 1803, for members of Baltimore county, now of the ship Rebecca, of Baltimore. He mentions his father, John C. Orrick, his brother Daniel Orrick, his brother Nicholas Orrick, and refers to "such effects which I may have on board the ship Rebecca or in Batavia, money which shall be due me as surgeon." The will is witnessed by Dr. John Worthington and died at the Courthouse of Baltimore.

Elizabeth Orrick was third daughter of John and Sarah (Merryman) Orrick. She married Samuel Johnson. The children of Samuel and Elizabeth (Orrick) (Johnson) were: Edward Johnson, born July 22, 1813, never married; (2) Mary Ann Johnson, born November 5, 1815, married George Alden and died without issue; (3) John Orrick Johnson, born March 27, 1817, never married; (4) John Cromwell Johnson, born November 27, 1820; (5) William Orrick Johnson, January 18, 1823, removed to California, married and has descendants; (6) Sarah Jane Johnson, born November 25, 1824, married William Bouldin, and their daughter, Mollie Bouldin, married A. Preston Gilbert; (7) Amanda Slade Johnson, born May 8, 1826, married, in 1840, Dr. William Wylie, of South Carolina. Their children were: (a) Mary Alden Wylie, (b) John Edward Wylie, (c) Amanda Evans Wylie, who married, April 30, 1870, John Thomas Chew Hopkins, of Belair, Md. The children of John Thomas Chew and Amanda Evans (Wylie) Hopkins are: (1) John Thomas Chew Hopkins, (2) William Wylie Hopkins, (3) Amanda Evans Hopkins, (4) Mary Alden Hopkins, (5) William Worthington Hopkins, (6) Elizabeth Finney Hopkins, (7) Ellen Morgan Hopkins, died in infancy; (8) Theresa McCormick Hopkins, died in infancy.

Edward Orrick, born 1792, died 1833, son of John and Sarah Merryman Orrick, married Susanna Keener, daughter of Susanna (Swope) Keener and granddaughter of Rev. Benedict Swope. She was born October 2, 1784. Their children were: (1) Dr. John C. Orrick, married Lydia Kirk; they had seven children; (2) William K. Orrick, born November 20, 1808, married Mary A. Yundt; (3) Edward Orrick; (4) the children of William Keener and Mary A. Yundt Orrick were: (3) Catharine S. Orrick, married December 2, 1852, Isaac Shirk, of Baltimore—their children were: (a) Mary M. Shirk, (b) Kate V. Shirk; (c) Henry Shirk, of the Baltimore bar; (d) Isaac H.
