

Henry M. Warfield, 80-year-old Baltimore insurance executive and uncle of the Duchess of Windsor, died yesterday at his Timonium, Timonium,

Md., estate. Although he had not been in good health for nearly a for nearly a year, Mr. War-field was not taken seriously not ill until last week. He was president of the Warfield - Roloson Co., fire in-surance underwriters.

At the time of his detah Mr. War-field also was a director of the Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Co. and of the Eutaw Place Sav-ings Bank of Baltimore.

ings Bank of Baltimore. Although inactive for many years, as late as 1941 he headed Governor O'Conor's school survey committee which proposed a stand-ardized 12-year curriculum.

Born in Baltimore

Born in Baltimore, July 1, 1867, Mr. Warfield was the son of Henry

Mr. Warfield was the son of Henry M. and Anna Emory Warfield. His father was a member of Daniel Warfield & Sons, a milling firm. In the 80's he entered the em-ploy of a New York insurance com-pany. He later became resident manager of the Royal Insurance Co. of Liverpool, England, organ-izing his present insurance firm about 20 years ago. Mr. Warfield joined the Sixth Regiment of the Maryland National Guard as a private in 1885 and rose to the rank of major at the time of the Spanish-American War.

the commanded He regiment He commanded the regiment from 1903 until 1908, when he be-came adjutant general of the State and served in this capacity through World War I, when he directed mobilization of the Free State's fighting forces.

Resigned School Post

A man of strong convictions, he resigned as head of the Baltimore County School Board in protest to a new State law which authorized the expenditure of public funds for private and parochial school transportation.

Farms, au portation. His estate, Salona Farms, at Timonium, was regarded as one of the Free State's better examples of gracious living. It was here that his niece, the former Wallis Warfield, and her husband, the former King Edward VIII of Eng-land, made their headquarters dur-ing the couple's infrequent visits to Maryland. His niece was a daughter of his brother the late

daughter of his brother, the late teackle Wallie Warfield. Funeral services will be held at 11 a. m. Monday at Trinity Epis-copal Church in Towson, Md. Burial will be in Baltimore's Green-mount Cemetery.
