

OBITUARY.

EDWIN WHITE.

Edwin White, an artist known to most of the lovers of paintings in this city, died at Saratoga Springs on Thursday last. In the year 1819 he was elected a member of the National Academy of Design, and in the succeeding year he went to Paris to study, where during four years' stay he formed friendships with Mr. Eastman Johnson and Mr. John H. Hall. Upon his return he obtained a studio in the University Building on Washington-square. He only remained a short time in this country, however, returning to Europe where he labored for many years. Most of the remaining years of his life of 60 years were passed in Europe. He returned to this country at last in 1875 and took a studio in the Young Men's Christian Association's Building. A few months afterward he was obliged to leave the city on account of ill-health, and went to Albany for medical treatment. He will be buried at Bridgeport, Conn., to-morrow afternoon at 1 o'clock. The deceased was a good painter of historical subjects. In the exhibition at the National Academy of Design of 1875, he had an exhibition: "Giotto Sketching the Head of Dante," "Chapel in Church of St. Egidius, Nuremberg," "Café at Cairo," and "Moonlight on the Arno."

MRS. MORRIS PHILLIPS.

Mrs. Morris Phillips, wife of the editor of *The Home Journal*, died a few days ago, and was buried yesterday morning from the residence of her husband, No. 139 East Thirtieth-st.
