## CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT

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A survey of the past year brings to mind several forward steps of great importance to the work under our care.

The dream of years has been realized in obtaining a place in the country for the use of the children during the summer months. Just when we had almost abandoned the hope of securing a summer home, the enthusiasm, interest and determination of a few members of our Board of Managers resulted in the attainment of our long cherished desire; we owe our sincere thanks to these Managers and to several of our Trustees for their efforts and we congratulate them upon the successful issue of their unselfish labors. The report of the Special Committee on the Summer Home contains further information.

In the early autumn the Managers induced Mrs. Winford Smith to accept the Chairmanship of the Hospital Committee. We consider ourselves fortunate to have secured the services of one with expert knowledge of hospital affairs; particulars of the Hospital Management will be found in the report of that Committee.

We record with deep regret the death during the past year of Mrs. Lewis Kalbfus, Jr., for a long time one of our Managers, and of Miss Eliza George, for many years a Manager and at one time President of the Board. Also the death of Mr. John Gill, Chairman of the Trustees of the Home.

As usual there has been a certain amount of sickness which periodically interrupted the attendance of the children in the several Sunday Schools near by; however, their religious instruction has received conscientious thought and two weekly services are regularly held at the Home.

During the past year three special efforts were made to increase the Summer Home Fund. Two teas at the Green

Spring Valley Hunt Club and a course of Shakespearean Lectures, by Dr. Abbott of Boston, at the Belvedere Hotel were given. We are grateful to our friends for their assistance in these endeavors.

The generosity of many friends has once more gladdened the hearts of the children at Christmas time; toys, candies, fruit and other gifts were provided for all and the hearts of our charges seemed full to overflowing.

There are 109 girls and boys under our protection, each one a force for good or evil. It is our earnest desire to guide all their possibilities in the right direction and when the children leave us for the battle of life, we hope to have made such lasting impressions for good upon their minds and hearts that they may be able to fight temptation right valiantly and ultimately become noble men and women, qualified to help others by extending just such aid as they themselves have received.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Through help given by a friend—for many years the Home has been able to maintain five separate Educational departments, thoroughly equipped with the latest and best books, also the necessary appliances to aid the children in their work. We have endeavored to secure well trained conscientious women as teachers—and feel that they have given themselves unsparingly to the work of advancing the children.

Our schoolrooms are large with an abundance of sunlight and air. The public school method is followed, which includes the merit system, physical culture, hygiene, music, drawing, etc. We do believe that good work is accomplished in our school. We are grateful to the teachers—who have been willing always, to work for the betterment of the children.

While we have a good equipment and excellent teachers—we are still greatly handicapped, because we are obliged to have an ungraded school—which is a great disadvantage to the teacher and the child. We desire if possible to have our boys and girls enter the "City School" September, 1913. We hope at that time to enter eighty-five children.

We sincerely trust that this good work may meet with success—as it will be a great factor in the development of the individual. It will help him to see life in a new way and give to him a complete change of environment for several hours a day, five days in the week, the companionship of home trained children, the benefit of the playground, the walks in the open air to and from school, with many other advantages too numerous to mention.

We have a class of ten boys, who are candidates for the McDonough School. This class will be entered as public school children—on Feb. 3, 1913.

The kindergarten work will continue in the Home—the children who join this class are between the ages of three and five years—and delight in the many interesting and instructive lessons taught them.

In conclusion, we wish to thank our teachers and friends, for the help and encouragement given to us through the year.

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## REPORT OF CLOTHING COMMITTEE.

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One thousand three hundred and seventy-eight garments of all kinds were cut. Repaired two thousand seven hundred and seventy-two garments, and two thousand six hundred and thirty seven pairs of stockings were darned. The Mothers Meeting of Johns Memorial Church, through Miss Howard made seven hundred and twenty-one garments, thirty-nine pairs of drawers made by some of the Ladies of "The Old Ladies' Home," through Miss Armstrong, also through Miss Armstrong the Mothers Mission of the Eutaw Baptist Church made one hundred and seventy-eight pieces of various kinds.

Mrs. William Fisher made some garments at home.

Miss Luckett worked three hundred button holes in children's dresses.

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## HOSPITAL REPORT FOR 1912.

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During the past twelve months 228 cases were cared for and 5,170 treatments were given in the Hospital.

In September Miss Maud Whiting resigned as Chairman of the Hospital Committee. Much credit is due her and the

other members of the Committee for their constant and conscientious attention to all matters pertaining to the management of the Hospital.

Many changes have taken place during the year in the management of the Hospital on the advice of Dr. Duvall Atkinson, Chief of the Visiting Staff. It was felt that the system of having a resident physician, who was in fact a medical student, with a consulting staff composed of busy practicing physicians, who could not be expected to give much of their time to this small hospital, was unsatisfactory. It was, therefore, decided to secure the services of a physician, who would take entire charge of all medical matters and to do away with the resident and the necessity of calling upon the busy members of a visiting staff. We were very fortunate in securing the services of Dr. Edward V. Coolahan.

The wards and most of the rooms of the Hospital have been painted. Observation cubicles have been built in the second floor ward and a sitting room furnished for the nurse.

Miss Mary M. Kilgour, a graduate nurse of the Toronto General Hospital, took charge in October. Her interest in the work and her efficient care of the children has demonstrated to us how very fortunate we were in securing her services.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE SUMMER HOME.

The year 1912, marks the beginning of a fondly cherished plan of the Managers and Friends of the Home, in procuring a country place where these hundred and twenty children may spend their summer in happy release from the unsympathetic bricks and mortar which have surrounded them for so many years. After fruitless searching, and much discouragement, the former home of St. Josephs House of Industry, situated in Anne Arundel County, about twenty miles from Baltimore was finally discovered; through earnest efforts on the part of Trustees and Managers, the Home was enabled to effect the purchase of a suitable portion of this property, containing a house and furnishings, outbuildings consisting of laundry, bath houses, and a large

pavillion, with 16 acres of land on which are groves of fine forest trees, grassy slopes, and shady lawns, also, a splendid apple orchard which afforded untold delight to these little City bred people. The price paid for this place so well adapted to our needs, was \$7,000, and the sum of \$3,000 was appropriated for the installation of water, the erection and necessary repairing of buildings, and making such additions to the equipment, as was found advisable. Early in July the household moved to this sweet restful spot, where the little ones could run and play in unrestricted pleasure, and grow and develop, as children only can when near to Nature's heart. After almost three months of healthful wholesome life of real enjoyment they returned to the City home, ruddy and strong, a vivid demonstration of the wisdom and success of the undertaking. We wish that every child lover in the City and State would visit our new Home "Montevideo" near Jessups, and see the rich possibilities it holds for the future development and progress of the child lives we are trying to shape. We have many plans in view for improved water and lightning facilities, of flower and vegetable gardening, properly directed games and amusements, which we think will appeal to our kind friends, and induce them to co-operate with us in continuing this work. Our earnest thanks are due to those whose noble generosity and strong efforts made possible this great forward step in the progress of the Home.

In making a financial statement of the Summer work at Montevideo it is necessary to divide the amounts received into two accounts. "The Summer Outing Fund" comprises sums received and contributed expressly for the purpose of defraying all extra expenses incurred by the removal and sojourn of the household of the Home of the Friendless to Montevideo.

The second account the "Summer Home Improvement Fund" consists of \$3,000 authorized by the Board to be borrowed from the Treasury at 4½ per cent. and used in alterations, repairs and equipment found necessary for the occupancy of the house, this interest will be paid by Members of the Board who have obligated themselves for this amount.
