## ASSEMBLY AFFAIRS. [Numb. III.]

Monday, June 15, 1752.

All the Members appeared, as on Saturday, except Two.

Three Bills had a first Reading; viz.—*To prevent raising Swine and Geese in George Town.*—*Supplementary to the Act for Appointment of Constables.*—*And, To oblige Attorneys to prove their Lists of Fees.*

*Post Meridiam.* The Affize Bill; and the Bill for Recovery of small Debts before a single Magistrate; were brought down from the Upper House, with a Negative to each.

The Bills, *To prevent raising Swine in Bladenburg;*—*And, For Quietting Possessions;* had a second Reading, and passed.

The Bill, *To pay the Charges on Special Commissions;* was brought from the Upper House, with some Amendments, to which the Lower House would not agree.

A Message from the Upper House, acquaints the Lower House, that they had appointed Samuel Chamberlaine, Esq; to join their Committee [about the Paper Currency Office] in the Room of Richard Lee, Esq; who was called home, by the Sickness of his Family.

The Bills, *For continuing the Act for Publication of the Laws;*—*And, Relief of such Persons as cannot find Surety to testify, &c.*—Had their second Reading, and passed.

Then the House adjourned.

Tuesday, June 16.

Five Members (who were absent on Saturday), appeared this Morning in the House.

The Journal of Accounts was ordered to be closed on the 18th Instant.

Three Bills, *Administration of Justice in Testamentary Affairs.*—*Examining Evidences.*—*And, Punishing Fornication;* were read a second Time, and passed.

The Bill, *For Licensing Pedlars;* was brought from the Upper House, with some Amendments, to which the Lower House would not agree.

*Post Meridiam.* Four Bills, *Prohibiting the raising Swine and Geese in George Town.*—*Continuing the Act about Jurors Allowances.*—*Writs of Replevin.*—*And, Destroying Squirrels and Crows;* were read a second Time, and passed.

Three Bills were brought from the Upper House, all passed without any Amendment; viz.—*For Quietting Possessions.*—*Relief of such Persons as cannot find Surety for their Appearance as Witnesses in Criminal Cases.*—*And, For continuing the Act for the Printer's Salary:* All which, were read again in the Lower House, and passed for Ingrossing.

The Bill, *To prevent Firing the Woods,* had a second Reading, and passed.

On the second Reading of the Bill for reducing the Allowance to the Members of each House of Assembly, a Question was put, Whether the Allowance per Diem, to the Members of the Upper House, should be 80, or 90 Pounds of Tobacco. Determined that it should be 80. Yeas 32. Nays 22. And then the Bill was committed for Amendments.

The Bill relating to Vestrymen, was read a second Time, and would not Pass.

The Bill, *To oblige Attorneys to prove their Lists of Fees,* had a second Reading, and passed.

Then the House adjourned.

Wednesday, June 17.

The Supplementary Bill to the Laws about Inspection of Tobacco, had a first Reading.

The Bill, relating to Attachments, had a second Reading, and would not Pass.

*Post Meridiam.* The Bill, *Supplementary to the Act for preventing Horse-Racing, &c. near the Quaker's yearly Meetings,* had a first Reading.

On Reading and Considering the Petition of the Sheriff of Anne-Arundel, praying that the Wall of the Prison Yard may be mended and raised; his Petition was granted.

The Petition of the Rector, &c. of St. John's Parish in Baltimore, to obtain a Levy in their Parish for building a Chapel, was granted.

The Petition of the Rector of Coventry Parish in Somerset, was referred to the next Session.

The Petition of sundry Inhabitants in Worcester County, praying Leave for a Bill to prevent Hunting in the Woods; was referred to next Session.

A Petition from Kent County, for dividing Tovey's and Langford's Bay Warehouses [now under one Inspection] into Two Inspections; was granted, and a Bill ordered for that Purpose.

The Supplementary Bill to the Inspection Law, was read a second Time, and passed.

From the Upper House was brought a Bill [which was fram'd by the Upper House, and there read twice, and passed,] for the better Security of Purchasers and Creditors; and read a first Time.

The additional Bill, to the Acts for Encouragement of Charles Town, in Cecil County, had a first Reading.

The Petition of Thomas Catteral, relating to Turkey Point, was brought from the Upper House. Also the Petition of some of the principal Inhabitants of Charles Town in Charles County; and a Petition of the Rector, &c. of Trinity Parish, in the same County.

Also, was brought from the Upper House, with their Concurrence, the five following Bills; viz.—*Punishing Fornication before a single Justice.*—*Relating to Testamentary Affairs.*—*Continuing the Act for Allowance to Jurors.*—*And, Two Bills relating to the destroying Squirrels and Crows.* All which were read, and ordered to be Ingrossed.

The Committee of Aggrievances delivered in a long Report, relating to the Growth of Popery.

Then the House adjourned.

Thursday, June 18.

On Considering the Petition of Thomas Catteral, five Members were appointed a Committee to enquire into the Truth of the Facts therein set forth.

A Supplementary Bill to the Act for taking £. 4500 out of the Office; was read the first Time.

The Supplementary Bill—*about Constables;* had a second Reading, and passed.

The Petition of the principal Inhabitants of Charles Town, in Charles County, to prevent making Fires in Wooden Chimneys; and the Petition from Trinity Parish to levy 55000 lb. of Tobacco; were granted.

The Bill, *To prevent Tippling and Racing, near the Quaker's yearly Meetings,* had a second Reading, and passed.

A Bill, *To assist a Sum of Money in Baltimore;*—*And, To divide Warehouses in Kent;* had a first Reading.

Three Bills were brought from the Upper House; viz.—*To oblige Attorneys to prove their Lists.*—*Writs of Replevin.*—*And, Examining Evidences about Bonds of Land;* each with a Negative.

*Post-Meridiam.* The Bill, additional to the Acts relating to Charles Town, in Cecil County; had a second Reading, and passed.

On a second Reading of the Bill, *For the better Security of Purchasers and Creditors;* the Question was put, Whether it should be made temporary or perpetual? Determined that it be the former. Yeas 33. Nays 14.

The additional Supplement to the Inspection Law, was brought from the Upper House, with a Negative.

Two Bills were brought from the Upper House; *To prevent raising Swine and Geese in Bladenburg;*—*And, in George Town;* with some proposed Amendments; to which the Lower House would not agree.

The Committee about Mrs. Catteral's Affair, bring in their Report.

The Bill, *To levy 55000 lb. of Tobacco in a Parish in Charles County;* had a first Reading.

Then the House adjourned.

Friday, June 19.

The Bill [last mentioned] had a second Reading, and passed.

A Bill, *To prevent raising Swine and Geese in Charles-Town, in Charles County, and Fires by Wooden Chimneys;* had a first and second Reading, by especial Order, and passed.

Three Bills had a second Reading, and passed; viz.—*Dividing Warehouses in Kent.*—*To levy Money in Baltimore County.*—*And, For Payment of an Agent.*

The Petition from Chester Town, to assess 20 s. on every Lot, for the Purchase of a Fire Engine; was referred to next Session.

The Bill, *relating to Charles Town in Cecil County,* was brought from the Upper House, with a Negative.

The Bill, *against Firing the Woods,* was brought from the Upper House, with some proposed Amendments, to which the Lower House would not agree. Nays 28. Yeas 23.

On Reading the Report from the Committee of Grievances of the 17th Instant; the Question was put, Whether the House will concur with the sixth Grievance, or Not? Determined in the Affirmative. Yeas 31. Nays 21.

The same Question, as to the eighth Grievance. Yeas 38. Nays 13.

The President communicated a Message to desire a Committee might be appointed for Fixing the new Cannon.

*Post Meridiam.* The House comply'd with the President's Request, and appointed four of their Members to join those should be named of the Upper House, to be a Committee to get the Cannon fix'd. An Address to his Honour was ordered, to acquaint him with their Determination.

A Report was brought in and concur'd with, relating to the State of the Arms and Ammunition.

A Bill, *for Encouragement of the West India Trade;* was brought in, and read a first and second Time, by especial Order; and on the Question for it's Passing, determined in the Affirmative. Yeas 43. Nays 9.

Then the House adjourned.

Saturday, June 20.

The Bill, *For reducing the Allowances to the Members of the General Assembly.*—*And, Additional Supplementary to the Act for taking £. 4500 out of the Office;* had a second Reading, and passed.

A Report from the Committee of Elections and Privileges, was brought in, and concur'd with.

Four Bills were brought from the Upper House, all passed; viz.—*To levy a Sum of Money in Baltimore County.*—*To levy 55000 lb. of Tobacco in a Parish in Charles County.*—*Additional to the Act for the Appointment of Constables.*—*And, Dividing Warehouses in Kent.*

The Address mentioned Yesterday, was now presented.

A Report from the Committee of Accounts was brought in, and concur'd with.

The Bill, *relating to Charles Town in Charles County;* was brought from the Upper House, with some proposed Amendments, with which the Lower House would not agree.

A Message was brought from the Upper House to acquaint the Lower House, that they had appointed two of their Members to join those by them appointed for the Mounting the new Canon.

The Journal of Accounts was brought in, read and assented to, and sent to the Upper House for their Assent. [The whole Sum of the Public Debt, allowed on the Journal, amounts to 2,444,027 Pounds of Tobacco, and 4 Fifths of a Pound; and £. 846 14 s. 11 d. Current Money.]

*Post Meridiam.* On Reading Mr. Catteral's Petition, the Question was put, Whether the same shall be referred to next Session, or Not? Determined that it should be put off. Yeas 27. Nays 23.

Then the House adjourned 'til Monday. [The Remainder of the Proceedings, will be inserted in our next Paper.]
