

People in her are saved. The Ship *Africa*, Capt. *Dunbar*, was also stranded, at a Place called *St. Helena's* Island; and Capt. *Tucker's* Schooner of this Port, that went to take out the *Africa's* Cargo, drove ashore.

Since our last, the Sloop *Polly*, Capt. *Gerr*, bound for *Barbados*, the Schooner *Elizabeth*, Capt. *M'Gillivray*, the Sloop *Nancy*, Capt. *Babb*, and a Schooner belonging to Capt. *Baker*, that were driven into a Plantation at *Wappoo*, and into Col. *Himn's* Pasture, on the 15th ult. have been got off, and are fitting for the Sea.

The Sloop *Betsy*, Robert *Jones* Master, from *Philadelphia* for this Port, and a Snow from *Nova-Scotia*, have put into *Edisto* Inlet.

The Master of a Schooner from *Georgia*, in his Passage saw 5 or 6 Vessels at Sea, off *St. Helena*; of which some seemed to be dismasted; but he did not speak with any.

Yesterday arrived here, the Snow *Rowand*, Capt. *Arthur Traas*, from *Rotterdam*, with near 300 *German* Passengers.

October 9. On Wednesday last arrived here the Ship *Live Oak*, of this Port, Capt. *Rodger*, from *London*: He was on the Coast the 30th ult. when the last Hurricane happened, and in it lost his best Bower Anchor and Mizzen yard, had some of his Sails torn to Pieces, shipped several Seas, and received other Damage. The Day he came in, he saw a Snow off the Bar, that had only her Main mast standing.

Since our last we learn, that the Hurricane which happened on the 30th ult. has done greater Damage at Sea, and to the Southward, than that of the 15th: Abundance of Trees, and several Houses, having been blown down, that did not suffer before: At *Port Royal* the Water rose four Feet and a Half higher than usual, and a Sloop was drove ashore that entirely beat away Mr. *Perry's* Wharff: A Sloop from *Rhode Island*, *Waldron* Master, bound for this Port, put into *Edisto*, lost all her Anchors, Bowsprit, Sails, Boat, &c. the Captain wash'd out at one of the Port Holes, and thrown in again: The Schooner *Betty*, *John Mills*, from *Maryland*, with *German* Passengers, and the *Minerva*, *Isaac Colcock*, from *Philadelphia*, were obliged to put into *Edisto*: The Snow *Bristol* Merchant, Capt. *Parsons*, from *Bristol* for this Port, with a very valuable Cargo on board, that sail'd to come round from *Port Royal* after the first Hurricane, lost her Bowsprit, Sails, &c. in this; and is since beat to Pieces upon *Edisto* Bar, the Vessel and Cargo entirely lost: A large Sloop, whose Quarter was painted green and white, drove ashore and beat to Pieces upon *Kaywab Island*, none of the People, but many Limes found: Capt. *Tedar's* Snow drove into a Marsh at *St. Helena*; near which Inlet another Snow from Sea, is said to be beat to Pieces: A large Ship beat to Pieces upon the *Hunting Islands*: And another Sloop said to be ashore upon the Southern Coast.

'Tis reported, that a Ship and Sloop are also ashore upon the *Racon* Keys.

The Ships *Eagle* Galley, Capt. *M' Daniel*, and *Telemachus*, Capt. *Feartough*, put ashore on the 15th ult. near *Dorchester*, have been got off since our last; as are also, the Schooner *Betsy*, Capt. *Hutchins*, of this Port, that was overlet upon *Jamaica Island* The Ship *Africa*, of *Barbados*, and *Snow Vine*, of *Liverpool*, drove ashore on the 30th ult. are since beat to Pieces, but their Cargoes have been saved; and *Tucker's* Schooner has been got off. The Ship *Charming Sally*, Capt. *Spencer*, from *London* for *Winnarow*, is put into *Port Royal*.

Yesterday came Advice, that the Brig *Carolina*, Capt. *Boyd*, of and for this Port, from *Philadelphia*, and the Ship *Caledonia*, Capt. *Harvis*, also of this Port, with *German* Passengers, put into *Savannah* in *Georgia*, on the 2d Instant.—Capt. *Boyd* writes, "That in the last Hurricane (which he met with in Lat. 34, and 16 Fathom Water, on the 29th ult. and continued till 12 o'Clock the next Night, the Wind at S. E.) he lost an Anchor from his Bow, had his Caboose carried away, one of his Men wash'd over board (but happily wash'd in again) his Vessel continually filled with the prodigious Seas that beat in upon her, and his Sails much damaged, so that, he every Moment expected to sink, or be driven upon the Breakers; but that about One o'Clock on Sunday Morning, the Wind suddenly whirl'd about to the N. W. and blew him off." He saw several Wrecks on the Coast.

The Sloop towed in here by the *Cauliffe*, on the 19th ult. was the *Laetitia*, Capt. *Philip White*, belongs to *Santa Cruz*, was bound from *Jamaica* for *Port Royal*, and lost her Mast, Sails, &c. on the 15th.

All the Papers, &c. in the Surveyor General's Office, were five Feet under Water in the first Hurricane, many of them wash'd away, and the

rest are in a perishing Condition, tho' the utmost Care has been taken of them.

The Loss this Province has sustained, in Trees only, by the late dreadful Hurricanes, may be better conceived than it has been, by informing our Readers, that it was chiefly the largest and best that have been blown down and broke; that many Plantations and most of the Islands have none of those left standing on them; that Mr. *Beauford* (whose whole Loss amounts to upwards of 20,000 l.) has lost in this Article alone (from one Tract of Land not far from this Town) to the Value of 10,000 l. And that the Roads in most Parts of the Country, were rendered impassable 'til cleared.

Vessels still ashore. His Majesty's Ship *Mermaid*, at *Hebeaw*; *Snow Charming Nancy*, of *Hull*, *Charles Cookson* Master; the *Snow Dove*, *John Tappan*, of *Corvuz*; the Brig *Peggy* and *Betty*, *William James*, of *Bristol*; Brig *Two Friends*, *Robert Jones*, of *Falmouth*; Sloop *Industry*, *Uriah Davis*, of *New England*; Pilot Boat, and 5 Schooners, besides small Craft, in and about this Town. Also the *Snow Industry*: The Ship *Upton*, *Gardiner*, of *Liverpool*; Sloop *Susannah*, *Minot* of this Port; 3 Pilot Boats, and 9 Schooners; &c. at *Wappoo*, and upon *Jamaica's* Island.

LONDON, September 14.

A List of Vessels lost on the Coast of Cornwall, in the late Storm, viz. *Daniel*, *Panoret*, of and for *Guernzey*, lost, the Crew saved. *William* and *John*, *Dare*, of and for *Sandwich*, ditto. *Unity*, *Diamond*, from *Padstow* for *London*; and a new Brig, *Rondel*, from *Milford*, lost; one Man only saved. Two Brothers, *Gardner*, from *Drogheda* to *London*, lost; one Man drowned. The *Esther*, *Ball*, and ———, *Norman*, from *Swanzy*, ashore. A Brig belonging to Mr. *Bozacot*, of *Comb*, lost, the Master drowned. To the Westward of *St. Ives* two Vessels are lost, and all the Crews perished; one of them from the Masts and Rigging come ashore, must be a Vessel of 3 or 400 Tons. The *Cesar*, *Hamerton*, with *Provisions*, from *London* for *Plymouth*, is put into *Coves* with five Feet Water in her Hold. The *Catherine*, *Harris*, from *London* for *South Carolina*, is put into *Portsmouth*, having received much Damage. The *Constant* *Mathew*, from *Petersburg* for *Bristol*, is put into *Dartmouth*, with the Loss of his *Mizen* and *Main* Topmast: Capt. *Storm* parted with the *Wilson*, *Boswick*, from *Petersburg* for *Dublin*, the 27th ult. all well. The *Fearon*, *Sutcliffe*, from *London* for *Barcelona*, with *Corn*, is put into *Dungeness*, having received Damage. The *Three Brothers*, ———, from *Bristol* to *Bayonne*; the *Plymouth* Merchant, *Broad*, from *Bristol* to *Plymouth*; and the *Squirrel*, *Payce*, from *Bristol* to *Frederickstadt*, are lost in *Bristol* Channel. The *Wilmington*, *Scot*, from *London* and *Falmouth* to *Milford*, is lost off *St. Ives*, and all the Crew except the *Mate* and a *Boy* perished. *NEWBERN*, in *North Carolina*, *October*, 6.

On Tuesday last ended the General Court here, when three Persons were capitally convicted, and received Sentence of Death, viz. *William Jillet*, and *Daniel Johnston*, alias *Dixon*, for *Coining*; and *David Smith*, alias *Griffith*, for *Pelony*, in robbing a Store in *Johnston* County, about four Years ago.

Patrick Moore, who was concerned with the *Coiner*, turn'd Evidence against them; and *Peter Matthews*, at whose House they were taken, and who was thought to have been concern'd with them, was acquitted.

October 20. On Monday last were executed at the Gallows near this Town, pursuant to their Sentence, *Daniel Johnston*, alias *Dixon*, *William Jillet*, and *David Smith*, alias *Griffith*. They were attended to the Gallows by the *Rev. Mr. Loperie*, who also attended them while in *Goal*. They all appeared very penitent, and expressed much Sorrow and Contrition for their Crimes, which they confessed; and *Jillet* and *Johnston* declared *Patrick Moore* to have been the sole Contriver and Promoter of the wretched Scheme, for which they suffered, and which would have been so destructive to the Community had it succeeded. *Johnston* died a staunch *Roman Catholic*, and was very earnest and pathetic in his Prayers for the Friends and Followers of *Lord Lovat*, *Kilmarnock*, *Balmerino*, and all the Rebels that suffered in the late Rebellion, and heartily prayed for a Continuance of that noble Spirit which he hop'd was yet alive in *Scotland* among the Well-wishers of the Pretender.

They made several Attempts, while in *Goal*, to escape, but were prevented by the *Sheriff*, who kept a Watch round the Prison every Night; and

indeed it has been intirely owing to his great Vigilance and Industry, that these Fells of Society were first apprehended, and preserv'd safe in a *Goal* (which has hitherto been remarkable for letting Prisoners escape) till they received the Reward due to their Crimes.

WILLIAMSBURG, October 27.

William Trent, Esq; sent by this Government with a Present to the *Twightwees*, arrived in Town this Week, and gives us the following Account of the Engagement mentioned in our last. On the 21st of June, about nine o'Clock in the Morning, Two Hundred and Forty French and French Indians, surprized the *Twightwees* in their *Corn* Fields, and came so suddenly on them, that the white Men who were in their Houses, had the utmost Difficulty to reach the Fort. Three not being able to get in, shut themselves up in one of the Houses adjoining. There were about 20 Men and Boys, including the white Men in the Fort. The Indians, having taken Possession of the white Men's Houses, advanced towards the Fort, fitting very briskly, which was as returned, then attacked the Log-House where the three Men were shut up, who having Plenty of Arms and Ammunition, and being well secured by the Strength of the House, might have defended themselves against the whole Body of the Enemy: Notwithstanding which they could not be prevailed on by the Men in the Fort to Fire a Gun, but cowardly hid themselves under Skins, suffered the House to be taken, and themselves made Prisoners; and then discovered to the Enemy the Weakness of the Fort. The French and Indians in the Afternoon, informed the *Twightwees*, that if they would deliver up the white Men that were in the Fort, they would break up the Siege and go home. After a Consultation it was agreed by the Indians and Whites, that as there were so few Men, and no Water in the Fort, it was better to deliver up the white Men, with *Beaver* and *Wampum*, to the Indians; on Condition they would do them no further Injury, than let the Fort be taken, and all be at their Mercy. The white Men were delivered up accordingly, except *Burney* and *Andrew*, whom the Indians hid. One of the white Men delivered up to them being wounded in the Belly, they stabbed and scalped him, took out his Heart and eat it; and as they have a considerable Reward for killing an *Englishman*, they cut off his Fingers and carried them to *Canada*, to prove him such: The Indians upon receiving the white Men (whom they carried away Prisoners) delivered up all the Indian Women, whom they had taken, and set off with the *Plunder*, amounting to about 3000 l. They killed one *Englishman*, and took six Prisoners. One *Mingoe*, one *Shawnesse*, and three *Twightwees*, they killed; among whom was the old *Twinguisa* King, called by the English, *OLD BRITON*, whom they boiled and eat. The French and Indians lost fifteen in the Battle. They carried off all their Dead, except four of the *Chapawas*, whose Custom is to leave the Dead: One of them is the Head King, and another of them the next Head Man of that Nation.—The other Indians that assisted the French, were called *Ottawawas*. One Hundred of the *Chapawas* went over to the *Six Nations*, because they would not help the French, and the rest that assisted them, say, that those which were slain were killed by the French, and not by the English and their Indians.

The *Six Nations* have not yet declared War, but have called in all their Warriors, and are making Preparations; that we have Reason to expect a Declaration very soon.

NEW-YORK, November 20.

Last Friday Evening Capt. *Hill* arrived here, in 40 Days from the Bay of *Honduras* who informed us, that the *Spaniards* arrived there the 2d of August last, in the Morning, in six *Pettisangers*, and a Flat of 14 *Swivel* Guns, and attacked Capt. *Crowel*, in the Sloop *Stork*, of this Port, and Capt. *Hill*, in a Brig belonging to *Connecticut*, and after an Engagement of two Hours, took the Brig, and after taking every Thing of Value out of the Sloop, left her: Capt. *Hill's* Mate stood the Deck longer than any of the Crew, and after he fired his *Musket* the last Time, broke her all to Pieces on the *Spaniards*; but was at length killed, by the Stab of a Knife in his Back; Capt. *Hill* killed the *Spanish* Commodore, by a Shot out of his *Cabbin*, and a Gun from the *Stork* killed 4 *Spaniards*, and wounded 7: Capt. *Hill*, and Capt. *Crowel*, and his Mate, who were barbarously used, after taken, were carried away Prisoners, the rest of the Crew, having received little or no Hurt, were set at Liberty. A few Days after, they took a Craft, two of which belonged to Capt. *Hill*, loaded with Wood, and after destroying them, set the Men ashore. About the 18th of September, O. S. as

Capt. *Arnold* was going in, he was Scout *Dorey*, and two *Pettisangers*, but he handled them so rough, and as soon obliged them to cry for *Q*, he not chusing to comply with, kept as long as they stayed by him, and the Craft sunk in a very little Time.

Their Commandant, was killed, as well as five more, and by some Shot from the *Cabbin* the *Cabbin* Boy, One of the *Spaniards* over board, and hung by the *Rimold's* Rudder, but was taken in. *Companions* were gone. Capt. *Hill* with five *Spaniards* (one of which here) and from Papers found upon thought they were *Spies*. He sailed with Capt. *Fones* of *Rhode Island*, of *Boston*; and left at the Bay, *throp*, *Arnold*, *Sluman* and *Wayne* Port; Capt. *Adams* of *South Carolina* Johnson of *Jamaica*.
