B E R L I N, July 2.

A COURIER is arrived from Bohemia with very comfortable News for the King's faithful Subjects: It is dated June 27, and runs thus: "The King, who enjoys perfect Health, as do likewise the Princes his Brothers, is intent on putting all Things to Rights again, in order to pursue his Progress in Bohemia. His Army does not retire towards Silesia: On the contrary, it is going forwards again, and on the 27th of June it was encamped on the Right of the Elbe, between Melnick and Leitmeritz, and is still about 60,000 strong."

Prague, June 26. Count Brown, Field-Marshal in the Service of the Empress-Queen, Governor-General of the Kingdom of Bohemia, Knight of the Golden Fleece, &c. died here this Day of the Wound he received in the Battle of the 6th of May, universally regretted.

Brussels, June 11. An Express arrived last Friday with the agreeable News that the French had taken Embden, without any further Trouble than that of appearing before it, and summoning it to surrender, which it accordingly did. The Garrison, consisting of 400 Men, were made Prisoners of War; and the French found in the Place thirty Pieces of Cannon, fifteen Ships, and a Magazine of Oats.

Paris, July 11. The Court has received an Express from Toulon with Advice, that an English Squadron of 18 Ships arrived off that Port the 29th ult. and block'd up the Harbour, so that no Ship could go in or out; but we have Ships enough to dislodge that Squadron.

Paderborn, July 12. The Electorate of Hanover is laid under Contribution, which is exacted in Money, Provisions, and Forage.

Plymouth, July 4. Arriv'd his Majesty's Ship York from a Cruise, with three Prizes, a Ship and a Schooner from St. Domingo, both richly laden with Sugar, Coffee, and Indico; the other is a Privateer of 16 Carriage Guns: She has likewise taken another Privateer of 4 Carriage Guns, which is not yet come in.

Liverpool, June 29. On Sunday the 26th, in the Evening, arrived here the Liverpool Privateer, of this Port, Hutchinson, from a Cruise, in which he fell in with a St. Domingo Fleet of Merchantmen, consisting of about 40 Sail, convoy'd by two Men of War. One of the Rear of the Convoy took him for a Merchantman, and stood for him; but he ran, and she gave chase; thus having drawn her out of the Fleet, he stood for her; when she came up she fired a Broadside of 9 Guns (carries 18, but pierced for 28) he then fell under her Stern, gave three Cheers, opened his Port-Holes (before shut) run Yard-arm and Yard-arm, poured into her a full Broadside, tacked about immediately, and fired another; then she struck, and came in here on Monday Morning. She is a fine Ship, with a Letter of Marque, Burthen about 500 Tons, valued at upwards of 30,000 l. bound from St. Domingo for Bourdeaux. The French Captain would have ransomed her for 30,000 l. but Hutchinson would not.

Liverpool, July 5. By private Letters from Kinsale we have an Account, that the Isaac Privateer, Clatworthy, of this Port, had put in there in a most shattered Condition. On the 1st ult. in the North Channel, she fell in with a French Fleet of 16 Sail (supposed to be their Martinico Ships) who attacked her on every Side. After being dismasted, and sixty Men killed, she struck; but they would not accept of her, and still fired with an Intent to sink her; but she got clear of them by the Help of her Oars.

Liverpool, July 8. The Ship Anson Privateer, Capt. Cuthbert, of this Port, is taken and carried into France. The Account is confirmed in a Let-

ter from a Gentleman to her Owners, but the Particulars are not yet known.

Liverpool, July 19. By a Letter from Tunis, dated July 1, we have Advice, that the Blakeney and Old Anson Privateers, of this Port, have sent in there two Prizes of considerable Value; so that the Report of the Blakeney being taken is false. The same Letter adds, that a very large and rich Vessel is sent into the Port of Leghorn, supposed to be taken by the King of Prussia Privateer, who has already taken two Prizes.

Yarmouth, July 13. This Day came into our Roads the America, a large Ship of near 600 Tons, taken on the first of May by the Squirrel Man of War, in her Passage from St. Domingo, with a Cargo worth 30,000 l.

Also three Dutch Hoys, taken by the Dispatch Sloop, bound from France with Oats, &c. for the Elbe, for the Use of the French Army.

Dublin, July 5. The Jason, from St. Domingo for Bourdeaux, Burthen about 350 Tons, is sent in here by the Boyne Privateer, Captain Jordan. The Cargo consists of upwards of 400 Hogheads of Sugar, 94 Hogheads of Coffee, 66 Casks of Indico, and several Bales of Cotton. The Boyne convoyed her as far as Kinsale, and is put in there to clean, having four Months of her Cruise unexpired. The Prize is valued at 30,000 l. This is the sixth Prize sent in here by the Boyne since she sailed the 21st of May.

L O N D O N, June 26.  
The Hawke Privateer, of Bristol, is taken by the Eagle Privateer, of Bayonne, and carried into Bayonne.

July 2. Tuesday the Court of Directors of the East-India Company voted 6000 l. to the three Ships arrived at Leith, as a Reward for their Bravery, in clearing themselves from the Enemy, when attacked by two French Men of War, agreeable to the Promise made by them to all their Ships in going out, in Case they behaved well.

July 5. We are assured a Squadron will in a few Days sail for the Baltick.

A French Privateer of 16 Guns, and a Spanish Ship suspected of having contraband Goods on board, are taken by the Ranger Privateer, and sent into Falmouth.

The Probite, of 16 Guns, L'Aigle, of 12 Ditto, L'Unique, of 12 Ditto, and L'Impromptu, from Bourdeaux for America, are taken by the Caesar, Lion and Phoenix Privateers of Bristol, and Tygres Privateer of Biddeford, and brought into Bristol.

The Alouette, and the Aimable Rose, both from St. Domingo for Bourdeaux, are taken by the Spotswood, Seaton, a Letter of Marque, from Bristol for Virginia, who has also retaken, in Company with the Prince of Wales, Capt. Lewis, the Sarah, Mackey, from Bristol for Boston, and are all brought into Bristol.

The Middleton Privateer, Captain Budd, of Guernsey, is carried into Brest by two French Men of War.

The Duke of Cumberland Privateer, Captain Steward, is carried into Morlaix by two French Men of War.

A Ship, Name unknown, with 400 Hogheads of Tobacco, is carried into St. Sebastians.

The Endeavour, of Boston, from South-Carolina, is arrived at Dublin, laden with Indico, Rice, Coffee, Fur, &c. valued at least at 40,000 l. She had been taken by the French, and was eleven Days in their Hands, and was retaken by the Boyne Privateer of Dublin, Capt. Michael Jordan.

A French Privateer of 16 Guns is taken and carried into Cork by the Hind Sloop of War, Capt. Richard Hughes.

July 9. They write from Aberdeen, that the Dolphin Sloop of War, Capt. Patker, has taken a French Privateer of 16 Guns, with 15 Ransomers on board.

A Ship of 500 Tons Burthen, bound for Bour-

deaux from St. Domingo, is taken and brought into Bristol by the Trial Privateer.

July 14. It is said that three Regiments will speedily embark for America.

We hear that the King of Prussia has desired that six English Ships of the Line be sent to protect the Trade of his Subjects in the Baltick.

Last Thursday the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq; was unanimously elected to represent the City of Bath.

We hear that Orders are issued out for sending 15,000 Men abroad, to the Assistance of the Army of Observation under the Command of the Duke of Cumberland.

It is currently reported, that the Empress Queen lies dangerously ill of a Fever at Vienna.

July 15. Yesterday were shipped for Virginia, 3000 lb. of Gun-Powder and other Military Stores.

July 16. Letters received Yesterday from Barcelona advise, that the Fortune Sloop of War was arrived there to purchase Vegetables for the British Fleet, and that 14 English Men of War were going to cruise off Toulon.

Two Ships from Virginia, Names unknown, are taken and carried into Morlaix.

The Pondicherry, the Dover's Prize, is purchased by private Contract, for the capital Ship of the Ladies Resolution Privateers; and the Command given to Commodore George Walker. She has the Character of a prime Sailer, and is to mount 40 Carriage Guns, besides Swivels.

Several Chests of Money have been found concealed among the Ballast of the Dromedaire, from St. Domingo, taken by his Majesty's Ship York. It is thought this will be as rich a Ship as any taken this War.

There was no Court at Kensington Yesterday, on Account of the Death of the Queen Dowager of Prussia.

The Transports lately taken into the Government's Service; will be ready on Monday next to receive Troops or Military Stores on board.

The Broderick Privateer of Guernsey, is taken by the Victory Privateer of St. Maloes.

A Ship from Carolina for London, with 500 Barrels of Rice, is taken by two French Privateers. Yesterday upwards of 50 Pieces of Cannon were shipped at the Tower for different Ports on our Coast.

July 18. It is said that 4000 of our Troops have Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to embark for America.

Twelve Men of War are now building in the several Yards in the River.

A French Privateer, of 26 Guns, and 330 Men, is taken off Altea by the Experiment Man of War.

We hear that Part of the Matrosses at the Camp at Chatham are ordered to hold themselves in Readiness for an Embarkation; as also that some of the Train of Artillery is to be sent with them.

July 20. We hear that the Jersey Man of War, during a Cruise of six Months in the Channel of Malta and the Levant, has taken seven Prizes, computed to be worth upwards of 50,000 l. Sterling.

Extract of a Letter from Hull, July 11.

"On Saturday last was brought into this Port, a large Swedish Ship, laden with Anchors, Guns, Pitch, and Warlike Stores: By their Bills of Lading they are bound to Ostend; but their People acquaint us, that they were going to Dunkirk, on Account of some Privateers that were fitting there, and waiting for them."

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, July 17.

"Sir Edward Hawke leaves this Town To-Day, without hoisting his Flag; his Ship is fitting with the greatest Expedition."

"An Order is sent by every Cartel Ship, that the English Prisoners shall not be impressed when received from France, but may have their Liberty, or enter on board some of his Majesty's Ships, in which Case they will
