A Description of the Kingdom of BOHEMIA

THE Kingdom of Bohemia, properly so called, is bounded on the East by Moravia and Silesia, and on the North by Misnia and Bavaria; on the West by Lusatia; and on the South by Austria. It is almost entirely encompassed by Mountains, in which there are Mines of Silver, Copper, Tin, Iron, Lead, Sulphur, Nitre, Carbuncles, Emeralds, Amethysts, Saphire, and other precious Stones, abundance here, than in any other Part of the Empire. Gold Sand is likewise discovered in some Rivers. There are Salt Pits; but the Producing the Expence, they are supplied from Misnia, and other Places. They make Quantities of Allum. The Soil produces Saffron. The Gardens and Orchards yield sufficient for Consumption and Exportation. It does not much cultivate Vineyards, because Wine does not keep long. They have been long famous for their Meads and Pastures, and abundance, with large Cattle and Horses. The Inhabitants of the Towns are fond of either Arms, Arts or Trade, but pine indolent Life. The Revenue of Bohemia is near a Million Sterling.

PRAGUE, is the capital City, and was for the Residence of the Kings of Bohemia. Walls of this Town enclose a larger Town than any City in Germany: But desirable Abatements are to be made for the Spaces and Hills encompassed within them situate upon the Moldau, a large rapid which has its Source in the South Part of Bohemia, and being augmented before it comes to Prague by the River Eggra, at last empties itself into the Elbe. This great Body is divided into three Cities, viz. The Old, the New, and the City.

The Old Town is seated on the East Side of the Moldau, being the most populous Place there, and considerable for the University frequented by a vast Number of Students, though the only one of the whole Kingdom, that is not now comparable to what it has been. It may believe Lewis du May, there were, in the reign of John Huss, who was Rector, above 40,000 Students. And it is credibly reported among those that when the Emperor Charles IV. would retrench some of their Privileges, 24,000 Students left the Town in one Week, and after, 16,000 more. This Part of the Town also several Colleges and Monasteries, and the Rest, the Jesuits, which is a very happy one.

The New Town is of a very large extent, encompassing the Old Town, together with the River, divided from it by a Ditch, into which they can let the River. The Irish have a College of Franciscans here, and the Jesuits have a noble College.

The Lesser Prague is seated on the West Side of the Moldau. It is far beyond the Old Town in Pleasantry and handsome Structures joined to it by a very strong Stone Bridge, sixteen great Arches. Part of this Town is upon a rising Ground, on the Top of which is the Hofschin or upper Prague, where the Emperor has a Summer House and a magnificent Palace. In this Part of the City, is also the Church of St. Veit, and most of the Nobility. The Lesser Prague was destroyed in the long German War, by the Swedish King Konigsmark, who carried off all its Booty.
