There were also four armed Cutters; and sixty

dant, Conway and Cornwallis, with the follow-

Loudoun's, Hume's, Amhurst's, Wolfe's, Hud-
son's, Brudenell's, Stuart's, and Effingham's. As
also several Troops of Light Horse.

There are two Ships of 100 Guns left in Port-
mouth Harbour, and two of 90 Guns, which,
with others, are to form a second Fleet, for an-
other Expedition.

By the said Ship we have Advice, that there
had been a Battle between the Prussian and Russian
Armies, wherein many Thousands were killed on
each Side, and that both Parties claimed the Vic-
tory, as is the Custom in such Cases.

N E W - Y O R K, November 14.

Tuesday last arrived here the Prize Ship, men-
tioned in this Paper Two Weeks since to be taken
by Captain Waynman, in the King George Privateer,
of this Port. She is called Le Saint Esprit,
of about 250 Tons Burthen, mounting 14 Four
Pounders, double fortified, and was commanded
by Monf. Thomas Gramion, carrying 50 Hands,
and bound from Quebec to Cape-Francois.

The same Day arrived here Capt. Codwise, in
20 Days from Antigua, in a Letter of Marque
Sloop, and informs, that while he lay there, on
the 12th of October, the Snow Dolphin, Christo-
pher Sheldon Maiter, of and from Rhode-Island,
was taken by a small French Privateer in Sight of
the Port, when Capt. Codwise weighed Anchor,
and with 40 Volunteers went out, retook her,
and carried her into Antigua, after she had been in the
Enemy's Possession upwards of 36 Hours. And
that on the 16th following, 14 French Ships passed
by the Harbour of St. John's, when his Majesty's
Sloop the Antigua, Capt. Codrington, went out
after them, but was beat off by one of the Frigates.

Thursday last returned from a Cruize, the Pri-
vateer Brig De Lancey (formerly a French Pri-
vateer, and taken by the Captains Randall and Har-
ris in Consort) Thomas Randall Commander, and
brought in with her a Ship of about 300 Tons
Burthen, called the John, mounting 2 Guns only,
navigated with 16 Men (said to be Dutch) com-
manded by Reuloff Malmstrong, taken the 22d of
October last off Crooked Island, in Lat. 25 N.
and Long. 70 W. from London, bound from St.
Domingo to Nantz. Capt. Randall also took, at
the same Time, another Ship, that was in Com-
pany with the above, Burthen about 400 Tons,
called the Spanish Galley, mounting 22 Guns,
Men in Proportion; and which may be expected
every Hour; both Ships deep loaded with Sugar,
Coffee, Cotton, and Indico.

Part of a Letter from a Gentleman of considerable
Note in London, to his Correspondent in New-
York, dated August 25, 1757.

"It is conjectured that the Expedition in Agi-
tation is against Genoa, and to put a Crown on
the Duke of Parma, as King of Corsica, for which
Spain is to warrantee to England Gibraltar and
Minorca. Also, That the King of Sardinia will
join in the Alliance, and dispossess the Empress of
Lombardy, and the Emperor of Tuscany. That
the Danes and Swedes, with the Dutch, and several
German States, will declare War against France,
Austria and Russia. And since the last Coalition
of Parties, domestic Politics have intirely subsided,
and have taken so reversed a Turn, that many
Things are in this Administration applauded, which
before occasioned Tumults, and universal Discon-
tent."

We have a particular Satisfaction in informing
the Public, That Colonel Peter Schuyler, of the
New-Jersey Forces, taken at Oswego the 14th of
August, 1756, and carried to Quebec, where he

has been kept ever since, arrived at Fort Edward
in good Health some Day last Week, having been
released by the French, and conducted thither by
Two Indians and a Frenchman.

By a Letter from Lieutenant Dugdale, of War-
burton's Regiment, who was cast away in his Ma-
jesty's Ship the Tilbury, dated at Louisburg, Oc-
tober 10, we learn, That he and about 270 more
saved themselves on a Raft, they made on the
Wreck, having remained there Four Days; that
as soon as they reached the Shore, they were sur-
rounded by Three or Four Hundred Indians, who
would inevitably have murdered them, had not the
Governor of Louisburg (having Intelligence of
their Misfortune) detached 200 Soldiers to their
Relief; that Capt. Croxton, of Warburton's Re-
giment, with the brave Capt. Barnsley, the Cap-
tain of Marines, and a great many more, perished
in the Waves.

Abstract of a Letter from Mount Johnson,
October 24.

"Yesterday Morning about Nine o'Clock, Little
Cornelius, a Mohawk Indian, with another of the
same Nation, arrived here, and brought the following
Intelligence, viz. That 5 Days ago, they, with 13
more Indians, and one white Man, of the Name of
Johnson, attacked a Party of 18 Frenchmen, inclu-
ding an Officer and Sergeant, within 200 Yards of
the Fort of Ticonderoga, and betwixt the Fort and
a pretty large Encampment; that Five of the French
were killed on the Spot, besides several wounded; and
their Scalps, together with 5 French Muskets, Swords
and laced Hats, were brought off, notwithstanding
their being so near to the Fort, and that they found
the Camp alarmed and under Arms; none of the In-
dians were wounded, tho' the French Party fired se-
veral Shot, only one of them had about a Foot of the
Barrel and Stock of his Piece carried off by a Shot
from the French. Cornelius reported, that the Party
of Indians with the Scalps, were some Miles off in
the Woods, being extremely faint and feeble, as they
eat nothing since the Engagement but some wild Fruit
they picked up in the Woods; upon which Sir William
Johnson immediately dispatched some of his Servants
on Horseback, with a Refreshment of Provisions and
Drink, and between Four and Five o'Clock the same
Evening, the Indians arrived at Sir William's, with
the Scalps, Muskets, Swords, &c. which, among
others, afforded me no small Pleasure, being the
greatest Number of Scalps I have seen at once since
I came to this Country. It was but a Fortnight
before, that three Scalps were brought in here from
the same Place, by another scalping Party of friendly
Indians, who killed six in all, but no more than three
of their Scalps could be brought off, on account of
a numerous Body of French coming up."

P H I L A D E L P H I A, November 17.

On Friday last Captain Laws arrived here from
Halifax, with whom came Passenger Capt. Thomas
Hatton, late of the Sloop St. Andrew, of this
Port, who informs us, that on the 26th of Sep-
tember he was taken on his Passage from hence
for Newfoundland, by a Privateer of Louisburg,
of eight Guns, called the St. Margaret, William
Reneau Commander. That soon after the same
Privateer took a Sloop from Malagash, bound to
Halifax, laden with Wood; which Vessel was ran-
somed; and in her he got to Halifax: That the
Captains Condy, Hamilton and Swainey, sailed
for this Place before Captain Laws; and that the
two latter had a Number of our People on board,
who were made Prisoners by the French and Indians
at or near Lake George: That the Highland Re-
giment had sailed from thence for New-York, under
Convoy of a 20 Gun Ship, which lately arrived
there in 28 Days from England: That Admiral
Holbourne, with 9 Capital Ships, and some smaller
Ones, was at Halifax: That the French Fleet at
Cape-Breton, consisted of seventeen Ships of the
Line, besides Frigates: That they were said to be
very sickly there, and in Want of Provisions: That
they had 16 Privateers belonging to that Port:
And that at Canada the French were in great
Distress, occasioned by the Scarcity of Provisions.

The Privateer Blakeney, Captain Minshall, of
Barbados, is fallen down on a Cruize against his
Majesty's Enemies.

A N N A P O L I S, November 24.

At a Meeting of the Worshipful Mayor, Rec-
order, Aldermen, and Common-Council of this
City, on Tuesday last, a Bye-Law was Passed for
suspending the Execution of a Bye-Law made in
January last, relating to the Tread of Cart-Wheels,
and other Carriages of Burthen (which was to have
taken Place on the First of January next) until the
First Day of May next.

Party, Two of whom they killed and scalped,
and wounded the other, but he got away; and
Wednesday they brought the Scalps to Town."
