

OUR Advices from Great-Britain to the 28th January, represent Peace as an Event much wished for, but at a great Distance. All Kind of military Preparations are going on with the greatest Vigour. The Fleet for the West-Indies is said to consist of twelve capital Ships. A Fleet is likewise getting ready for the East-Indies. The Grand Expedition is resumed, and carrying on with fresh Spirit. Mr. Pitt continues the Darling of the King and People. Sweden and Poland, especially the latter, are heartily tired of the War, and it is said with Confidence, they will withdraw before the next Campaign. In the mean time the Motions of the King of Sardinia give Reason to dread the Flames of War will spread to Italy.

On Thursday Captain Colbert, set out for Augusta; with the Chickesaw which came with him hither, and Presents for those that remained at Augusta, and had been with him in his last Excursion. He is to go towards the Cherokees with them, and some of the Lower Chickesaws, immediately, without waiting for the Army coming up.

Letters from Gentlemen at Augusta of the 10th, 14th and 16th Instant, say, "The News from the Upper Creeks is not near so bad as was at first represented. That Nation will scarcely break with us; what Mischiefs has lately happened, was done by those Villains who had a Hand in the Murders last Year, and was not in the least countenanced by any of the Headmen. Douglas, with his Goods and Horses, are safe, under the Protection of the Gun Merchant. The Wolf King's Return, with the Accounts he carries, will have great Influence in the Creek Nation. His coming down here was very lucky, and Governor Bull's inviting him to Charlestown was well judged, and of great Service."

We hear from Mr. Galphin's Fort at Silver-Bluff, that there never was known so great Plenty of Fish there as at present, which is a providential Relief to the poor People who have taken Shelter there. The Creeks still remain at that Fort, and the People that Way flatter themselves that these Indians will keep off worse Neighbours. One Perry, who was sent down lately from thence with Dispatches to the Governor, found on his Return, his House burnt, and other Mischiefs done; it is uncertain whether by Indians, or white People, no Indian Tracks could be discovered.

Yesterday his Honour the Governor received Dispatches from Captain Lauchlan M'Intosh, Commandant of Fort Prince-George, Keowee.

Fort Prince-George, March 15. The Day after Mr. Miln and Major Thompson left us, four Prisoners were brought here by the Indians, viz. Stephens's Wife and two Children, and one Trowel, of Captain Demere's Company. The Indians continue to bring in the Prisoners; we have received 20 in all since Mr. Miln's Departure, viz. 12 Women and Children, and 8 Men. To-morrow six more are expected. Some Days ago Attakullakulla, or the Little Carpenter, and his Brother Tisnoo, the Wolf of Keowee, &c. came to this Fort, and on the 12th Instant Attakullakulla delivered some Prisoners, and a Talk, in the Name of the whole Nation, to Captain M'Intosh: He said, That Willanaw and M'Nammar are gone to the Virginia Camp, with several white Prisoners, agreeable to what he had told Colonel Byrd. Salloone, the Young Warrior of Estatoe, with a Number of his desperate Gang, are gone out against the Settlements, chiefly, it is said, for Provisions, of which they are in great Want. Salloone said he got 100 of the Rangers Horses. Captain M'Intosh gave Attakullakulla several Presents, which he immediately distributed among his Attendants, who are in Number near 500. He is still here, and has sent a Talk to the Governor, with a String of white Beads, in Behalf of the whole Nation. This faithful Cherokee is treated with great Kindness by the Commandant, as his unalterable Attachment to the British Interest merits. He enquired, in the most affectionate Manner, for his old Friend Captain John Stuart, and has desired Captain M'Intosh to acquaint that Gentleman of his good Wishes, and that he will be glad to hear from him or see him.

On Monday the 16th Instant, eight of the Settlers on Bush River, a Branch of Saluda, went from Brookes's Fort to look after their Plantations, and were set upon by a Party of Indians, supposed to be Salloone and his Party, who killed and scalped Cadwallader Eaton, and took Edward Box Prisoner; the remaining six got off, and returned to the Fort. Eaton's Body was shockingly mangled, a Bullet was lodged in his Hip, on which he fell, he was stabbed in five different Places, with a broken Bayonet, and his Head was almost cut off; the Bayonet was found stuck in his Body.

April 1. This Day the Highlanders marched from Town for the Camp.

We hear from Virginia, that several large Parties of the Six Nation and other Indians, have been seen going against the Cherokees; and that both Virginia and North-Carolina are raising Men for the common Cause. We hope soon to hear this confirmed.

BOSTON, April 14.

Extract of a Letter from New-Providence, dated March 17. "On the 14th Instant, Captain Johnson, in the Privateer Schooner New-Experiment, sent in a small Prize Sloop, laden with Dry Goods, Coffee, and Indico. The 15th Captain Kemp, in the Privateer Brig Speedwell, sent in a Brig belonging to New-York, and which was pretended to be a Prize of Captain Koffler's. Yesterday Captain Tucker, in the Privateer Snow General Shirley arrived with a large Ship of eight 9 Poundsers, and 28 Men, (pretended to be Danish) laden with Sugar and Coffee, and some Indico. Capt. Tucker has also taken a Snow, but she is not yet arrived, though she sailed some Days before he left the Coast of Hispaniola: It is thought she is either retaken, or gone down to Jamaica. Several Spanish Vessels and their Cargoes, sent in here as Prizes, have been lately acquitted. Our Assembly have lately voted an Addition of 100 l. to the Governor's Salary; and made Provision for an Agent in Great-Britain."

NEW-LONDON, April 10.

The General Assembly of this Colony have ordered Two Thousand Three Hundred Men, including Officers, to be employed in securing his Majesty's Conquests in America; to consist of two Regiments. The Field Officers appointed to command the first Regiment are, Col. Lyman, Lieut. Col. Payson, and Major Durkee; and those to command the second Regiment are, Col. Whiting, Lieut. Col. Smedley, and Major Baldwin.

THOSE Soldiers who have already been in the Service, are to have a Bounty of Eleven Pounds, and One Pound Fifteen Shillings, to purchase a lappelled Coat. The new Levies to have a Bounty of Seven Pounds, and also One Pound Fifteen Shillings, for a lappelled Coat. Their Wages to be the same as last Year; and they are to have suitable Camp Equipage, and all other Allowances as usual.

NEW-YORK, April 20.

The Ship Sally, Captain Marshall, and the Snow Olive Branch, Captain Fowler, arrived here, Saturday last, from South Carolina. The Ship Prince Tom, of and for Bristol, John Chilcott, Master; and the Snow Molly, of and for Lancaster, William Denison, both from Charles-Town, were taken about the 15th of January, in Latitude 47. 47. Longitude 30. 40. by a French Privateer of 22 nine Pounders, belonging to St. John de Luz, who was afterwards taken herself by his Majesty's Frigate the Aquilon, and made the seventh Privateer taken by that Ship, in less than a Month's Cruise between Scilly and Lisbon. The Aquilon was stationed off Scilly.

The Snow Eglington, Archibald Robertson, was taken between South-Carolina and Bermuda, on the 12th of March, in Latitude 21. Longitude 66. 43. by a French Letter of Marque Brig, but ransomed for 200 Guineas. The French put six Englishmen on board, belonging to a new Snow from Newbury for St. Kitts, which he had taken. The Ketch Jenny, Ash, Master, from Lisbon, was taken by the same Brig on the 14th. This Brig is Bermuda built, mounted eight 6 Pounders and 8 Swivels, and had about 40 Men; was from Martinico bound for Marcellis, with a very valuable Cargo of Indico, Cocoa, and Coffee on board, which she was to land at Cadiz. Captain Ash made the 5th Vessel she had taken, three of which he burnt, one of them a Schooner.

Captain Valentine's Prize, from Jamaica, is expected in every Hour, the Man of War's Claim having been thrown out of Court. The Privateer continues her Cruise.

The Schooner Delight, Thomas Wallace, Master, from South-Carolina for Philadelphia, run ashore the 8th Instant in the Night, at Little Egg-Harbour; the Vessel and Cargo will be entirely lost, as the Men went ashore, and left her to drive to Pieces: The Captain could not be found, neither will the Men give any Account of him. The Register of the Vessel was in Captain Wallace's Name, tho' the People say one Burns was then Master.

Tuesday last the Brig Royal-American, Captain Fairley, arrived here in thirty Days from Madeira: Some Days before he sailed from thence, two Dutch Men of War having about 50 Sail of Merchantmen under their Convoy, for the West-Indies, put in there, but were soon to proceed on their Voyages.

Thursday last Captain Johnson arrived here in a Brig in 29 Days from Jamaica: Off Crooked-Island he met with a Boat, with five Men in her, who said they belonged to the Privateer Sloop Harlequin, Capt. Omen, of this Port, who was cast away on Ackland's Key, and that they were bound to Providence, to endeavour to obtain a small Sloop, to carry away all that could be saved of the Wreck.

About the 8th of February, the Ship Marquis of Granby, Captain Life, of and from Philadelphia to Lisbon, sprung a Leak at Sea; and when, within 10 Leagues of Fyall, all the Hands took to their Boat, and left her; and the next Day she was drove close in with St. George's, where she was towed into a good Harbour.

The Brig Lord Howe, Audley Clarke, of Rhode-Island, from New-York to Barbados, that was taken last Fall, is retaken, and carried into St. Kitts.

PHILADELPHIA, April 23.

By Captain Jenkins, from Barbados, there is Advice, that the Barbados has retaken, and carried into that Island, a Guiney Man; and likewise the Privateer that took him.

The Legislature of New-Jersey have passed an Act for raising Six Hundred effective Volunteers, Officers included, for his Majesty's Service.

By Captain Bridges from Antigua there is Advice, that Captain Speer, from this Port for Guadaloupe, is taken, and carried into the Grenades; that Captain Long for Antigua, likewise from this Place, is also taken, and sent to Martinico.

ANNAPOLIS, April 30.

Last Week the Negro Fellow who lately kill'd his Mistress, her Child and a Negro Wench, in St. Mary's County, was taken alive; but in apprehending him, he had one of his Arms broke, and was otherwise maim'd. A Commission is gone down for holding a Special Court for his Trial.

We hear from Baltimore, that a Man who was lately condemn'd there for robbing a Store, has broke out of Joppa Goal, and made his Escape.
