

By Letters from North-Carolina, of the 10th Instant, we learn, that Colonel Waddle was marched for Fort Dobbs, with such Part of his Regiment as was provided with Arms, in order to join the Virginia Forces, as soon, and at such Place, as should be ordered by Col. Byrd.

A Person Yesterday from Augusta reports, that a Party of Indians had carried off some Cattle from Long-Canes; and a Letter from Augusta, of the 4th Instant, says, "that two of the Georgia Rangers, belonging to Lieutenant Barnard, were carried off about two Days before; they were up River Savannah, about 20 Miles above Augusta."

Extract of a Letter from New-Providence, Aug. 10.
"A Danish Vessel, and a New-England-man, brought in here lately, have been acquitted."

Capt. Palmer, of the Privateer Brig Nassau, of this Port, has sent in a large Spanish Brig, with 200 Hogheads of Sugar, which has been set at Liberty, by Consent of Parties. A Spanish Sloop has likewise been sent in here. And last Night Capt. Oman, of the Privateer Schooner Charming Sally, of this Port, brought in a very large Dutch Ship, of 700 Tons, loaded chiefly with Naval Stores, bound, as they say, for Havannah, but the Captors say for Port-au-Prince, and that she had two Sets of Papers, one Dutch, and the other Spanish.

BOSTON, September 7.

We hear from Falmouth, in the County of Barnstable, that on Saturday last was Se'nnight, a Whaleman arrived there, and informed, that on the Tuesday before he was chased for 7 Hours by a French Privateer Brig, in Lat. 37, but by Favour of the Night he got clear. The next Morning he was chased again by the same Brig, but she soon left him, and gave Chace to a Ship which then hove in Sight, who soon came up with and fought her for several Hours, but the Ship being too many for her, the Privateer was glad to make off as fast as she could.

By Captain Badger, who arrived here last Week from Halifax, we learn, that on the 20th ult. his Majesty's Ship Rochefort, of 50 Guns, Captain Burnet, arrived there from the Isle of Bic, in the River St. Lawrence, and had brought in a Snow that he seized in the River, bound from Jersey to Quebec, laden with Wine, Brandy, &c. but can't as yet tell whether she will be condemned or not.

Tuesday last Captain Delap, in a small Schooner, sailed from hence for Halifax, but after being out a few Hours, his Vessel sprung a Leak, and the Water gaining upon them so fast, they were obliged to throw over all their Cattle off the Deck, and part of the Cargo in the Hold, in order to preserve the Vessel from sinking, and the next Day they got safe back again: Captain Shiverick coming in from Philadelphia, took up two of the Cattle alive, after they had been in the Water a considerable Time, and brought them in with him.

We have Advice from the River St. Lawrence, that Capt. Friend, in a Ship from London for Quebec, which had the Misfortune to run ashore on the Island of Anticosta some Time ago, is since bilged, by which the Vessel and most of the Cargo is lost; Capt. Friend and his People were taken up by Capt. Paddock, one of the Fleet from Cork, and carried to Gaspey, where he agreed with some Fishermen to go to the Wreck, and save as much of her as they could.

NEW-YORK, September 14.

Saturday last Capt. Morris arrived here from the Coast of Africa: He says, that the French Frigate that lately paid that Coast a Visit, had taken a great many Vessels, and among the rest, one Capt. Elliot, from Rhode-Island.

PHILADELPHIA, September 17.
Since our last, the Captains Appowen and Miller arrived here from Jamaica.

Captain Appowen, as lately mentioned in this Paper, was taken by a French Man of War of 74 Guns, soon after he left our Capes, but ranfomed his Vessel for Fifteen Hundred Pounds Sterling.

Captain Miller spoke with a Privateer Brig, Captain Washington, of Jamaica, going in there with four Prizes; one of which a Privateer Sloop, of 14 Guns, commanded by Palanqui; who we learn, was cut out of the Kaimetta's.

ANNAPOLIS, September 24.

By the last Post from the Northward, came sundry Letters, which mentioned, that they had a Rumour of Peace being concluded on between Great-Britain and France. We wish we could give our Readers a certain Account of so happy an Event as an honourable Peace; but we cannot as yet, and only give it as a Report; tho' it is probable, from the several different Accounts, that, if a Peace is not already concluded, some large Strides have been made towards it. The following is an Extract of a Letter wrote last Thursday by a Gentleman at Philadelphia, to his Friend here: "A Merchant of this City came in this Morning in six Days from Rhode-Island, where he spoke with a Gentleman of Credit in three Days from Boston, who told him, he had seen a Gazette Extraordinary, brought by a Vessel in 23 Days from England, in which were the Preliminaries of a Peace betwixt England and France, containing a Cession of all North-America, with the Mississippi, Neutral Islands, and Minorca, to us; every Thing else we had taken was to be restored to them. What relates to Germany, we have not yet heard." A little Time will bring us to the Truth.
