

Spanish and the Penam Privateers, belonging to the...  
The former of 12 Guns, and the latter of 6.  
The latter of 10 Ships of War are ordered to be fitted out...  
to take under their Convoy 20 Sail of Transports, with  
Land Forces, Stores, &c. for Gibraltar. The latter  
of War, after seeing the Convoy safe in that Port, are  
to be sent to the Mediterranean under the Command of Ad-  
miral Saunders. The Transports are afterwards to sail to New-  
Carthage, to receive Instructions from General Amherst,  
Commander in Chief upon that Station, with respect to the  
regular Services they are to be employed in.  
A large Convoy of Transports is likewise getting ready with  
Expedition for Jamaica, with some Troops, and a great  
quantity of all kinds of Stores on board, to go out under the  
Command of a Squadron of Men of War, with 40 Sail of the Fleet  
commanded by Admiral Heines: His Successor in Command,  
it is said, will go with this Squadron, but when that Successor  
is to be named is not as yet learned.

**BOSTON, May 6.**  
A Letter from Lisbon, March 16, 1762.  
The 11th Inst. arrived in this River the Port-  
Man of War, with Lord Tyrwley, his Sec-  
retary Colonel Rainsford, four Aid de Camps,  
Col. O'Harra, Quarter Master General; these  
forerunners of the Troops expected here.  
The Gentlemen, as also Yesterday's Post, brought  
the Advice, that the King of Prussia had con-  
cluded a Treaty with the Emperor of Russia, who  
accepted a Subsidy from England; and it is  
said that 35,000 of his Men are to remain in Ger-  
many, to assist the King of Prussia: They are in  
the greatest Confusion at Vienna; and it is further  
said that the King of Prussia was about concluding  
a separate Peace with the King of Poland.  
The Britannia, Captain Olive, a Letter of  
 Marque belonging to Bristol, arrived the 3d Inst.  
took a Spanish Privateer of 14 Carriage Guns,  
wivels, and 113 Men, called the N. S. de la  
Capit. Manuel de Pando; she had 13 Men  
killed and wounded, of which Capt. Olive was  
one who is in a fair Way of Recovery. The Pri-  
vateer only arrived Yesterday, and has brought  
her another Spanish Vessel, loaded with Bar-

tonday last a Detachment of 500 Men, belong-  
ing to Colonel Hoar's Regiment, embarked from  
the William on board a Number of Transports,  
to sail for Nova-Scotia; the Remainder of the  
Regiment will soon proceed for the same  
Place: The two other Provincial Regiments are  
ordered to the Westward, one of them command-  
ed by Col. Saltonstall, the other by Col. Ingerfol.  
The whole of his Majesty's Requisition for the Pro-  
vincial Service was completed by the 1st of May;  
his Excellency's Orders were immediately  
for instituting the Recruits for his Majesty's  
Provincial Regiments in North-America, agreeable  
to his Majesty's Requisition for that Purpose.  
The Recruiting Officers of Major Gorham's  
Regiment are also raising a Number of Recruits in  
the Province to complete their Companies.  
Captain Lander, who arrived Yesterday at  
Annapolis in 27 Days from Martinico, we have Ad-  
vised that a Number of British Troops were em-  
barked on board Transports there, destined for  
the Expedition: Admiral Rodney with his Fleet  
at Antigua: Col. Murray, and several other  
Officers died there lately.—A Number of French  
Privateers were cruising between Martinico and  
Tobago, and had taken 7 or 8 Vessels a few  
Days before Captain Lander sailed.

**Extract of a Letter from Liverpool, Feb. 28, 1762.**  
By the Death of the Empress of Russia, there  
is a Prospect of the King of Prussia's being able to  
make up Matters with the Russians, by whom he  
has suffered greatly.—We hope he will, and that  
it may be followed by a Peace in Germany, which  
will enable us to make the Bourbon Family repent  
bitterly of their late Compact; and, by fresh Con-  
quests, put your Continent into the most flourishing  
Condition.—Stocks have already risen from this  
Prospect Five per Cent.

By Captain McClelland, from Faro, there is  
Advice, that the Portuguese expected every Hour  
to hear of War being declared against them by the  
Spaniards: That they were in great Confusion  
there, and pressing every Body into the Service,  
able to carry a Musket: That 2000 Men had  
marched from Faro for the Frontiers, while he  
was at that Place; and that there was a Peace  
concluded between the Prussians and Russians.

Captain Burrows, from Madeira, informs us,  
that the Spanish Ship, sent in there by the Rich-  
mond Frigate (formerly mentioned) in her Way  
to Barbados, had 50,000 Dollars on board, and a  
valuable Cargo besides, of Logwood and Skins.

On Tuesday last Capt. Rees arrived here from  
Barbados, which he left the 30th of April. By  
him there is Advice, that Admiral Pocock, with  
four Sail of the Line, and a Number of Trans-  
ports, arrived there the 18th ult. That there  
were about 5000 Land Forces on board the Fleet,  
under the Command of the Earl of Albemarle,  
who were all very healthy: That the Admiral  
sailed again the 23d of April, for Martinico, with  
6 Ships of the Line, and about 60 Transports;  
where, it was said, he was to be joined by as  
many Troops as would make up his Number  
12,000, with which he was to proceed to Jamaica,  
in order to join His Majesty's Ships there, and go  
against the Havannah.

**ANNAPOLIS, May 27.**  
By the last Mail from the Northward, his Ex-  
cellency our Governor received a Letter from Cap-  
tain John Scaife, dated on board his Majesty's Ship  
Chesterfield at New-York, the 16th Instant, wherein  
he informs his Excellency, that notwithstanding  
what he wrote in his Letter of the first Instant,  
(inserted in the last Gazette) of being detained  
on particular Service, that he is to be dismissed  
from that Service Time enough to be at Hampton  
Road in Virginia, by the latter End of June, to  
take under Convoy all Ships that shall be then  
ready to sail for England.

A Snow which failed from this Province for  
Liverpool, some Time since, belonging to Messrs.  
Mills and Eden, in St. Mary's County, loaded  
with Tobacco, sprung a Leak about 250 Leagues  
from our Capes, and put back; but on her Return  
she run ashore near the Capes, where she now  
lies.
