

the River towards Augusta. One of the *Rabbit's* Party had been killed about five Days before, by the Creeks as he thought. Moytoy desired the Governor might be informed that he had not forgot his Promise at the Congress to assist the white People, if it became needful; and if his Assistance was wanted, desired his Excellency might send him a painted Knife, that he might know it was War.

"A Letter from Mr. Calhoun to his Excellency, dated Fort at Long Canes, December 26, says, That besides the Woman and Girl mentioned in Edward M'Gary's Affidavit, a young Man had been found killed about a Mile from the other. Such a Detachment of the Militia as could be spared from guarding the Women and Children, was sent out to bury the dead, and make Discoveries; part of them returned the 26th; they found the Bodies of 14 white Persons killed at the Time and Place mentioned by M'Gary, only one scalped, but the others cut and mangled in a most inhuman Manner; several Persons were still missing, but the Party being small, they did not chuse to stay out long, and had brought in many of the Settlers to the Fort. The situation of the poor Inhabitants is represented as very deplorable, flying for fear of the Savages with only the Cloaths on their Backs, helpless Women and Children exposed to all the Inclemencies of a rigorous Season, abandoning their Habitations, and in Want of every Convenience, and even the Necessaries of Life. An Alarm had been spread through the Country, and Application made for a Detachment of Militia from the Regiment commanded by Col. Chevillote at Orangeburgh, which, though upwards of an hundred Miles from Long Canes, was their nearest Relief. Several Settlers were come from the Northward and other Parts since the Congress at Augusta, who, with many single Men, seemed willing to make a stand, if they met with speedy and proper Encouragement."

By other Intelligence we learn, that Moytoy the Cherokee, furnished Arthur Cody with a Horse, which enabled him to get to the Fort at Long Canes. Moytoy said, that the whole Number of White Persons scalped by those Indians, appeared to be twelve, and those killed, but not scalped, thirteen, according to the Accounts he had received.

The Inhabitants of Long Canes got into two stockaded Forts, which they built for their own Defence; in one were thirty-seven Men, and one hundred and three Women and Children, and in the other thirty-four Men, and thirty-five Women and Children. There are likewise Forts at Ninety-Six, and at Hard-Labour, about 24 Miles from Long Canes, whither we hear many are fled for Shelter, and all the other back Settlers, Mr. Calhoun says, are moving down to Edisto. The Detachment mentioned above, sent out to bury the Dead, consisted only of ten Men; they went first to Dyer's Plantation; next to—Lawson's, and then to—Pawley's, where they found all the Families murdered except three Men, one Boy, and one Girl, who provisionally happened to be gone out.

#### BOSTON, January 19.

Extra of a Letter from London, dated Nov. 9, 1763.  
"The Ministry is the same as when I wrote you by the last Packet. Our Commons are all returning from Spa, France, &c. against the ensuing Session of Parliament, which is fixed to be the 15th Instant, it is expected to be a very warm one. Sir Charles Yorke has resigned his Place as Attorney General. Lord Northumberland has greatly displeased his Irish Subjects, in attempting further Pensions on the Irish List: Lord Kildare is gone over to suppress the Riots. It is said that Dr. Tucker, Dean of Bristol, will be created a Bishop, by the Title of Bishop of Albany, with a Salary of £1500 per Annum, to be paid out of his Majesty's Quit Rents in America; that his Lordship's Residence will be at Albany, where a Palace is to be built at the Expence of the Crown: This Gentleman is remarkable for his great Attention to American Affairs."

#### NEW-YORK, January 26.

Yesterday came on, in the General Court in this City, the Trial of the Soldiers taken up on Account of the late Riot, breaking the Goal, and rescuing Major Rogers; when we hear five of them were found Guilty, and that they have declared the Major was privy to the Design.

About 10 o'Clock Saturday Night last, Captain Mooney, of this Place, was stopped by three Sailors, near Chapel-street, and ordered to Stand and Deliver, and at the same Time they presented a Pistol to his Breast; Capt. Mooney, not chusing to comply with their Request, rushed in upon the

Fellow who had the Pistol in his Hand, which he immediately fired, and Capt. Mooney narrowly escaped being shot, as the Ball went through his Cloak. The Villains immediately made their Escape.

Jan. 30. We have it from the very best Authority, That Sir WILLIAM JOHNSON was lately visited by above 300 Friendly Indians of the Five Nations; as also by some Deputies from the Senecas, who are accompanied by one Hans Eise, a German, formerly taken near Fort Cumberland, and delivered up, with several other Prisoners, to Sir WILLIAM about two Years ago: But, being a profligate Person, immediately made his escape to the Senecas, whom he has since accompanied, by his own Confession, to war against the English, and committed several Acts of Cruelty, by the Report of others.—On which Information Sir WILLIAM caused him to be apprehended, and committed to Albany Goal.—And has also obtained from a Village of Friendly Senecas, one Gabriel Ellison, an Englishman, who says he has Relations in Bucks County, in the Province of Pennsylvania, and was taken in November 1762; and carried to Kanawagan, a Castle of Enemy Senecas, from whence he made his Escape to Ganadasago, a Castle of Friendly Indians of that Nation (next to Cayuga) which Indians having remained neuter during the late Hostilities, have now delivered him up at Sir William Johnson's Request.

Feb. 2. On Saturday Night Mr. Edward Nicholls, of this Town, was robbed of a small Sum of Money, in the Street on Golden Hill, by a Man who presented a Pistol to his Breast, threatening his Life, if he made the least Noise or Delay.—This was probably one of the same Persons who attempted Captain Mooney.—And on Tuesday Morning last a Fellow was detected in stealing a Saw from a Cooper on the North River. He offered the Cooper a Ten Pound Bill to let him escape, and on his Refusal attempted to break from him, but was secured, and carried before a Magistrate, where he was searched and a loaded Pistol, a Powder Horn with Powder, a Paper of Bullets, and a long sharp pointed Knife, were found in his Pockets. He proved to be the same Man who was tried in October last, and found Guilty in the Supreme Court, for Robbing Sullivan of a Watch, &c. and discharged on Supposition of Insanity. It was declared by Sullivan that some of the Goods taken from the Villain in the Scuffle, by Capt. Mooney, appeared to be the same he had seen worn by the Man who had robbed him of his Watch. Capt. Mooney and Mr. Nicholls declared that the Prisoner appeared to be the same that robbed the one, and attempted to rob the other. He was committed to Goal.

Elizabeth-Town (New-Jersey) Jan. 23, 1764.  
Last Friday departed this Life Miss MARY ELDRINGTON, an old Virgin, in the 109th Year of her Age; she was of an ancient Family, born at Eldrington-Hall, in Northumberland, Old England, and on the next Day she was decently interred in St. John's Church-yard, at Elizabeth-Town. It is remarkable that notwithstanding her great Age, she was desirous of getting a Husband before she died; and not two Years since, nothing would offend her so highly as to tell her that she was too old to be married.

PHILADELPHIA, February 2.  
We hear from East-Jersey, that last Friday Evening, ROBERT HUNTER MORRIS, Esq; Chief Justice of that Province, and formerly Governor of Pennsylvania, died suddenly there. His Death is justly looked upon as a public Loss in that Government, where he has long maintained the Character of an able and upright Judge.

Feb. 9. On Saturday last the City was alarmed with the News of great Numbers of armed Men, from the Frontiers, being on the several Roads, and moving towards Philadelphia. As their Designs were unknown, and there were various Reports concerning them, it was thought prudent to put the City in some Posture of Defence, against any Outrages that might possibly be intended. The Inhabitants being accordingly called upon by the Governor, great Numbers of them entered into an Association, and took Arms for the Support of Government, and Maintenance of good Order.

Six Companies of Foot, one of Artillery, and two Troops of Horse, were formed, and paraded; to which, it is said, some Thousands, who did not appear, were prepared to join themselves, in Case any Attempt should be made against the Town. The Barracks also, where the Indians are lodged, under Protection of the regular Troops, were put into a good Posture of Defence; several Works being thrown up about them, and eight Pieces of Cannon planted there.

The Insurgents, it seems, intended to rendezvous at Germantown; but the Precautions taken at the several Ferries over Schuylkill impeded their Junction; and those who assembled there, being made acquainted with the Force raised to oppose them, listened to the reasonable Discourses and Advice of some prudent Persons, who voluntarily went out to meet and admonish them; and of some Gentlemen sent by the Governor, to know the Reasons of their Insurrection; and promised to return peaceably to their Habitations, leaving only two of their Number to present a Petition to the Governor and Assembly; on which the Companies raised in Town were thanked by the Governor on Tuesday Evening, and dismissed, and the City restored to its former Quiet.

But on Wednesday Morning there was a fresh Alarm, occasioned by a false Report, that Four Hundred of the same People were on their March to Attack the Town: Immediately, on Beat of Drum, a much greater Number of the Inhabitants, with the utmost Alacrity, put themselves under Arms; but as the Truth was soon known, they were again thanked by the Governor, and dismissed; the Country People being really dispersed, and gone home according to their Promise.

Extra of a Letter from Burlington, Jan. 25.  
"Lieutenant Shaw, who commanded our Detachment at Niagara, after the Death of Captain Johnston, is come down from thence, and says, that the very Warriors, who were at the Attack of our People at the North End of Lake Erie, were at Sir William Johnson's, making their Submission, as he passed by."

ANNAPOLIS, February 16.  
Some few Days ago, at Oxford, as two little Girls of Mr. Pempillon's, were sitting by a Fire Side by themselves, the Fire flew and catch'd the Cloaths of one of them, and burnt her to that Degree that she Died in a few Hours after.

Last Monday Died on Kent-Island, aged 55 Years, Mrs. MARY HUTCHINGS, Wife of Mr. JAMES HUTCHINGS, who was a good Wife, Mother, Mistress and Neighbour.

Friday Evening last, as one ————, was going over a Ferry at Fredericksburg with his Horse, they were both Drowned.

In the last Spell of Cold Weather, an old Woman (formerly a Servant to Mrs. M'Leis) was froze to Death at Upper-Marlborough.
