STOCKHOLM, October 12.

THE Iron Mine at Distrop in the Western Nencia, which after 150 Years Difuse was re-opened in 1759, was entirely cleared for Working last August. At the Depth of 120 Ells the Body of a Man was found, who had perished there, and who according to Tradition, was named David. He had a Woollen Doublet, Breeches of Leather, Woollen Stockings and Shoes. The Brain was white and soft. The Teeth were firm, and in their Place; and the Body had the Property of Iron. The Proprietor of the Mine caused the Body to be placed in a Coffin, and it was interred the 26th of August. It was carried to the Grave by eight of the Miners, and followed by forty others.

Lisbon, October 20. Senhor Dom John returned the 9th Instant with his Squadron, after having been at Gibraltar, and cruized some Time upon the Coast of Saltee. He staid nine Days at Gibraltar, and expressed great Satisfaction at the particular Attention and Politeness with which he was received by the Governor and the whole Garrison.

This Week arrived a small Fleet of four Merchant Ships from Pernambuco, and a Fleet of Two and Twenty Sail of Merchant Ships under Convoy of one Man of War, from the Bahia; the Cargo of these last consist of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Roles of Tobacco, and about Two Hundred Thousand Pounds in Gold.

Watersford, October 20. We can assure the Public, that the Insurrections of the White Boys are quelled in this Part of the Country.

L O N D O N, October 28.
They write from Lisbon, that in digging up the Foundation of an old Palace burnt down in the late Fire, the Workmen found an Urn containing Three Hundred Gold Medals of the Emperor Titus, which appear to have been struck soon after that Prince's last successful Expedition against the Jews, having this Inscription, TITO VESPASIANI AVGVSTI FILIO, JVDÆIS SUBACTIS.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Horse King Herod, beat the Duke of Grafton's Antonius for a Thousand Guineas. The Betts on this Occasion are said to have amounted to more than a Hundred Thousand Pounds. The Difference that determined this enormous Sum was no more than Half a Neck's Length. His Royal Highness, whose Life was tho't in Danger, is greatly recovered. An Incision was made in his Leg, just under the Knee, and a surprizing Quantity of Matter discharged, but the Wound is now healed.

We hear Commissions are come over from Jamaica to ship by the first Opportunity, Goods proper for the Spanish Market, to the Value of 90,000l.

Oct. 31. The Advices received from America, are full of the bad Effects of the late Act of Parliament for regulating the Trade of the Plantations, and for laying a Duty on their Exports and Imports in order to defray the Expences of their own Government. The Prohibitions lain upon their Trade by this Act, are grievously complained of, and the Rigour with which these Prohibitions are enforced by the Men of War stationed on their Coasts for that Purpose, are by no Means relieved by the Americans, who subsist in a Manner by their clandestine Commerce with the French and Spaniards, and which must be connived at, if any Advantage is to be expected from them by their

Mother Country. On the other Hand, the West-Indians complain of this Indulgence, and are preparing Memorials to be presented to Parliament, to put a stop to the North-American Distilleries, from French Materials.

They write from Glasgow, that great Numbers of Journeymen lately employed in the Stocking Manufactures, and buoyed up with high Prospects of Encouragement made them by some American Agents, have embarked this Summer for Boston and Philadelphia; where it is said Four new different Branches in the Weaving Business have been already set up.

Nov. 1. We hear an additional Duty will soon be laid on the foreign Importation of Hemp, Hempseed and Flax, particularly from Russia and the Baltick; great Quantities, the Growth of our own American Colonies, being expected over early in the Spring.

Commissions are come over from New-York, for Implements of Husbandry and Gardening, to the Amount of 5000 l. to be forwarded with all Speed.

By a private Letter from Newmarket we are informed, that his Royal Highness had taken Cold on Friday last, which occasioned an Inflammation and Swelling in his Throat, but that having been bled, his Royal Highness was much better, and his Leg was as well as could be expected.

It is now said, that for very prudential Reasons, never less than five Regiments on the British Establishment will from henceforth be kept in Commission in the Province of New-York, Pennsylvania and New-England. It is expected, that Pensacola in Florida, and two British Islands in the West-Indies, will speedily be declared free Ports.

We hear a List of all such Goods as are hereafter to be deemed Contraband in any of the Colonies of North-America, are now making out, and will be sent over by the next Packet; according to which his Majesty's Sea and Land Officers, Collectors of the Customs, are to regulate their Conduct with Regard to all future Seizures.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Virginia, to his Friend in this City, Sept. 4.

"There is the same dull Round of Business pursued as usual; the Courts are filled with Law-suits, and many People are obliged to sell their Estates. Melancholy and Uneasiness are visible in most Countenances, and happy is the Man that can keep his Effects together. Tobacco is low, and Grain of all Sorts much fallen; from whence then is to come our Relief? It can happen, in my Opinion, only from the strictest Frugality in our Affairs. Hemp and Flax are the two Objects that are looked on, as if they would deliver us; and so they may in a great Measure, but something else is necessary."

It is said that the Sum of 30,000l. will be granted next Session for the better rendering the Basin of Pensacola one of the best Receptacles for Trade and Shipping on the British-American Continent.

It has been a Question among the Learned in France, whether the Heat from a Chimney, or from a Stove, is most wholesome? M. Mongin, a French Physician maintains, that the ferrugineous Heat from Stoves penetrating through the whole Mass of circumambient Air in the Room, must unavoidably affect the Head; and that the Intensity of that Heat rarifies the Air in the Room to such a Degree as to be suffocating; and occasions us to breathe a hot, fuliginous, and unelastic Air, which produces Palpitations of the Heart, Asthmas, habitual Qualms, Head-achs, Lassitudes, &c. Upon the Whole, he

concludes, that the Heat from a Chimney is more wholesome than that from a Stove.

The Faculty at Paris have at last determined the great Question relating to Inoculation, by a Plurality of 52 Voices against 25, in Favour of that Practice.

A curious Medal has lately been struck at Stockholm, in Honour of Inoculation; it represents an Altar of Esculapius, with a Serpent twisted round it; the Motto, *SUBLATO JURE NOCENDI.*

In the last Meeting of the Assembly held at Charlestown, South-Carolina, his Honour Lieutenant Governor Bull, who in all his Actions appears another Pitt, being truly actuated with the Spirit of Patriotism, strongly recommended to their serious Consideration, the pernicious Consequences of encouraging the farther Wear or Importation of French Manufactures, and it is thought a Law will be passed at the next general Meeting to lay the Practice entirely aside.

Mr. Lloyd, an eminent Merchant in Georgia, has lately imported several Thousand Plants of the Logwood Trees from Honduras, in order for Cultivation on the River Savannah. Those already planted thrive well, and seem to promise that in a few Years Great-Britain may be supplied with this useful Dye from her own Colonies, in sufficient Quantities to answer all the Purposes of Manufacture.

At a Village in Jutland, called Borglum, a Peasant's Wife, was brought to Bed of the 29th Child, all born alive.

The Circulation of Copper Money in North-America, has for some Months past been increasing in Proportion as that of their Paper Currency has been called in. Some Tons of Farthings are now ordered in Commission from Philadelphia and New-York, for the Benefit of small Change in the Retail Trade; which, it is thought, will soon occasion a new Dye at the Tower.

They write from Madrid, that his Catholic Majesty is determined, at whatever Expence, to promote the ART of PRINTING within his Dominions; for which Purpose he has settled handsome Pensions upon several Gentlemen (both Printers and Letter-Founders) who are engaged in the forwarding that noble Art, so unteakably beneficial to Mankind.

Nov. 6. Some Letters from Great Poland say, it is asserted there, that the King of the Romans, and the King of Poland, are to marry two Sisters, Princesses of Saxony, Daughters of Augustus III. late King of Poland.

His Highness Prince William (next Brother to the Duke of York) will soon be created Duke of Lancaster, and have his Household settled.

On Thursday last the 1st Instant, John Wilkes, Esq; had Sentence of Outlawry pronounced against him at the Sheriff's County Court in Holbourn, by the Sheriff, Coroner, and other Officers.

It is strongly reported, that an Embargo will be laid on the Exportation of Provisions to foreign Parts, excepting those for his Majesty's Service, till the Meeting of Parliament.

It is said that a grand Promotion of Officers, both in the Land and Sea Service, will shortly be made.

By recent Letters from the Grenades, there is Advice, that 43 Sugar Works have been erected in that Island, by British Subjects since the Peace.
