ROME, October 18.

THE Paper War here is carried on with as much Vehemence as ever between the Jesuits and their Adversaries, which last, believe me, are neither weak nor despicable; and moreover that his Holiness and his Court are under no small Trepidation for the Interests of his dear Children in Spain, lest that Court should follow the Examples of the Courts of France and Portugal, for it is certain some unlucky Steps are already taken in Spain, which carry very much that Appearance; and as to the young Chevalier de St. George, whom I have mentioned in some of my former Letters since my Arrival here, his chief Residence is still at Albano, where he takes the Diversions of the Season with his Attendants, which I am assured consist of three British Gentlemen and his Secretary, all Protestants, which I presume will afford the Bigots here but little Pleasure, nor will it strengthen his Interest in the Pope's Court, which it is believed he has Sense enough to despise, though it be generally thought his Finances are low enough.

Stockholm, November 4. The Princess Royal has made her Public Entry this Morning, and the Marriage Ceremony is to be performed at Seven o'Clock this Evening in the Chapel Royal.

LONDON, November 6.

This Day the Right Hon. Lord Cambden, Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, went in grand Procession, attended by several of the Great Officers of State, the Judges, &c. &c. from his House in Lincoln's-Inn-Fields to Westminster-Hall, and opened the Court wherein his Lordship is worthily presides.

Nov 14 On the 22d of last Month a Foreign Gentleman, who is out of his Senses, took an Opportunity in the Minorities of slipping away from a Surgeon of a Ship, who had the Care of him from Constantinople, and was conducting him to his Friends, and although he was advertised constantly in the Papers, with a very minute Description of his Person and Dress, though he could not speak a Word of English, nor had any Money in his Pocket, and though several People were traversing the Town in Search of him, yet no Tidings could be had of him before Tuesday Morning last; when his Brother passing over Westminster Bridge, fortunately perceived him sitting down, in a very dirty, melancholy, starving Condition. He was conducted home to his Friends, but could give no Account where he had been, how he subsisted, or what was become of a Gold Watch which he had in his Pocket when his Conductor lost him.

From the House of Correction in Surry, we are informed, that one of the most Wonderful Lyings-in that ever was known or heard of, is shortly expected to happen there; a young Man, one of the Prisoners, being big with Child: This is verified by the Oath of a young Woman, who, it seems, is the Father of the Child. For the Truth of this, we refer to an Article in the last Printed Calendar of the Prisoners in the House of Correction in South-wark, which runs in these Words: "Edmund Mitchell, committed the 11th of June, 1766, by the Rev. Thomas Ellis, Clerk, he being charged on the Oath of Elizabeth Edwards, of the Parish of Nutfield, in this County, single Woman, with being with Child; and that the said Child is likely to be Born a Bastard, and to be chargeable to the said Parish of Nutfield." [Perhaps the Parson who committed him is an old Woman.]

Nov. 26. A Plan for a new Town is already drawn, which is to consist of 1500 Houses, built of equal Height, and in the most regular Manner. This Town is to be built on the Left of Sooter's Hill in Kent, in a circular Form, with a noble Assembly Room in the Middle, and is to be called New Plumstead; and, when finished, it is supposed will be the most beautiful Thing of its Kind in Europe, as it commands a most delightful Prospect for many Miles over the River Thames, and Springs of Water are even with the Ground.

The Eagle, Sugars, from Dublin to Parkgate, with General Stanwix and Family, and other Passengers, is supposed to be lost.

The Lords Justices of Ireland issued a Proclamation the 23d ult. in Consequence of a Memorial

from the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Common Council of the City of Cork, representing, "That several large Quantities of Potatoes have been lately shipped in the Port of Cork for foreign Parts, whereby the Price of Potatoes in that City had been greatly advanced, and that they had strong Reasons to imagine that there will be Orders for shipping from that Kingdom such Quantities of Potatoes, as will distress the Poor thereof in the highest Degree; and that by the great Failure in the Growth of Wheat, Barley, and Oats, in that Kingdom this Year, the lower Clafs of People must receive their principal Support the ensuing Winter, Spring, and Summer, from the Potatoes of the Produce of this Year." In order to prevent the Distress which may be apprehended to the poorer Sort of People of that Kingdom, by the Exportation of Potatoes, they do strictly prohibit and forbid the Exportation of Potatoes out of all the Ports in the Kingdom.

Nov. 29. Yesterday the Duke of Portland resigned his Place as Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household.

The same Day the Earl of Hertford resigned his Place of Master of the Horse; and afterwards kissed his Majesty's Hand on being appointed Lord Chamberlain, in the Room of the Duke of Portland.

It is said that the Duke of Richmond will this Day be appointed Master of the Horse, in the Room of the Earl of Hertford.

Yesterday the Earl of Beborough resigned his Place of Post-Master General.

The same Day Sir Charles Saunders resigned his Place as First Lord of the Admiralty.

The Earl of Scarborough also resigned his Place of Cofferer of his Majesty's Household, and Deputy Earl Marshal of England. As did Lord Monson his Place of Lord Chief Justice in Eyre of his Majesty's Forests South of Trent.

We hear that on Tuesday and Wednesday a Deputation of Millers, Mealmen, &c. waited on the principal Nobility and Gentry in the Administration, with a Memorial, praying to have the same Bounty allowed on Flour as on Wheat, to the great Benefit of the Manufacturers of this Nation; when they were received with that Condescension and Attention which this worthy Administration have ever shown to the Manufacturers of Great-Britain.

Yesterday the Duke of York had a numerous and splendid Levee at his House in Pall-Mall, where it is said two illustrious Foreigners, lately arrived at this Court, attended.

Yesterday Se'night two Italian Princes arrived in Town, who it is said had the Honour of entertaining his Royal Highness the Duke of York when on his Travels through Italy, and are now come on Purpose to visit him and the British Court.

Orders are received at Toulon to fit out there the Spy Felucca, on board of which 2 Lieutenant Generals of the French King's Naval Forces are to embark, in order to visit all the Coasts of France, from Marseilles to the Mouth of the Rhone.

Dec. 2. Most, if not all, of the Resignations mentioned in the public Papers, have been made, as perhaps some more will be; but we are well assured that the pretended Offers made of those Employments to others, and their Rejections of those Offers, are impertinent and groundless Falsenesses, and of course Impositions on the Public.

It is said that the Attention of the Ministry will be employed principally this Session in regulating for the future the Price of Corn and Provisions, and for preventing the monopolizing and engrossing those Necessaries of Life.

Letters from Copenhagen, dated the 18th ult. inform that their Majesties, the King and Queen of Denmark, are in perfect Health; and that the Prince of Hesse Cassel, on the 16th ult. gave a grand Entertainment and a Masked Ball there, at which their Majesties, the great Officers of State, and others of the Nobility, were present.

It is said that the free Importation of Corn from any Part of Europe will only be allowed until the first Day of next March.

The Ticket N^o. 20,099, drawn Yesterday a Prize of 10,000 l. is the Property of Mr. Jump,

Cheefe Monger in Piccadilly, and 5 other Tradefmen. [A very lucky jump for them.]

They write from Rochfort that six Regiments of Foot had just arrived there, to be embarked on board two Men of War and several Transports, for the French Settlements of Domingo.

A Letter from Sierra Leon mentions that the Crew of a French slaving Ship on the African Coast had turned Pirates, and run away with the Vessel to Madagascar.

We hear that Yesterday Lord Hillsborough was removed from First Lord of Trade to be First Lord of the Admiralty,

And that George Cockburne, Esq; from Comptroller of the Navy, is appointed a Lord of the Admiralty, together with Dr. Hay.

It is said that a certain Noble Lord, of great Abilities, has offered his Service to the Crown, without Fee or Reward.

They write from Guernsey that a French Ship, laden with Wool, from Barbary, had lately been wrecked on the Race of Alderney, and all the Crew perished.

A few Days ago a French Bark put into St. Mary's, Scilly, by Distress of Weather, where she was detained by the Custom-House Officers, having a Quantity of English Wool on board.

Yesterday a large Seizure of Tea was made by two Revenue Officers, concealed under the Ballast of a North-Country Coasting-Vessel lying off the Hermitage.

We hear from Berwick upon Tweed that the Price of Wheat had fallen there 3 s. 6 d. per Sack, and is now brought to Market in the greatest Plenty.

Yesterday the Price of Wheat fell One Shilling per Quarter in Mark-Lane.

The Hon. Chambers Russel, Esq; many Years one of his Majesty's Council of Massachusetts-Bay, one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature, and Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty there, landed the 17th ult. at Portsmouth from Boston, and on the 22d died at Guildford, in his Way to London.

We learn from Whitehaven that the Eagle, Capt. Sugars, reported to be lost, with General Stanwix and Family on board, was safely arrived there, from Ireland.

We hear from Scotland that 50,000 Head of Cattle have lately been contracted for by the English Graziers, to be sent into Lincolnshire, and the Southern Counties.

From the GENTLEMAN'S MAGAZINE, for November last.

The following PETITION was presented to his Majesty as he went to Parliament.

To the KING's most excellent Majesty,

The humble Petition of the Widows of the Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy, Sheweth,

THAT your poor Petitioners, by the great Reduction of their Pensions, are reduced to the greatest Extremity, to insupportable and almost insupportable Distress, and without the kind Interposition of Parliament, their present very calamitous distressed Situation is likely to be rendered still more intolerable, by the excessive Dearness of Provisions, and the Cruelty of merciless Creditors, many of your Majesty's unhappy Petitioners being now under continual Fears and Apprehensions of a Goal.

That great Almighty Power who hath stretched out the Heaven, and laid the Foundation of the Earth, by whom King's reign, and Princes decree Justice, has declared that he will not disdain to hear the Cries of the Poor, and the Sighings of the Needy; whom to resemble is the greatest Honour, the noblest and most supreme Glory of Princes.

We therefore your Majesty's poor needy Petitioners (as nothing but a Royal Order to the honourable House of Commons is wanting to procure us Redress) most humbly beg that your Majesty would be graciously pleased to recommend our very unhappy Case to the Consideration of Parliament, and that they would be pleased to fix our precarious, uncertain, nominal Pensions, upon a certain, solid, and lasting Foundation; and we flatter ourselves from your Majesty's great Goodness, Justice, and Humanity, that we shall not beg in vain: So shall the Blessings of your illustrious House, and the devout fervent Prayers of most grateful Hearts be incessantly poured out for the Glory, the Happiness and Prosperity of your Majesty and Royal Family, as long as the British Empire exists, and its victorious triumphant Navy rides the vanquished Main.
