

Jan. 13. Letters from Warsaw advise, that the Dyet has taken the following Resolution on the Subject of the Declarations remitted from the Courts of Russia, Prussia, England and Denmark, in favour of the Protestants.

"We have received, with all possible Consideration, the Declarations which the Ambassador of her Imperial Majesty of all the Russias, the Prince de Repnin, the Minister Plenipotentiary of Prussia, M. Benoit, the English Minister, Mr. Wroughton, and the Danish Minister, M. de Saint-Saphorin, have presented in Writing, on the Part of their respective Sovereigns, in favour of the Greeks and Dissidents in the Kingdom of Poland and Great Duchy of Lithuania. We assure those Ministers, that we will fully maintain the said Dissidents in all the Rights and Prerogatives to which they are intitled by the Laws of the Country, particularly by the Constitution of the Year 1717, &c. and by Treaties.

"As to the Grievances of the Dissidents, in respect to the Exercise of their Religion, the College of Most Rev. Archbishops and Bishops, under the Direction of the Prince Primate, will endeavour to remove those Difficulties in a Manner conformable to Justice and neighbourly Love. The Regulation drawn up on this Subject shall be inserted in the Acts of the Metrique, and from thence communicated to all those who shall require it.

"We charge the Chancellors of the Two Nations to report this Resolution to the Ambassadors and Ministers of the Courts abovementioned."

The Secret Committee of Sweden having found that the Crown has a Claim of 300,000 Rubles upon the Court of Petersburg, in virtue of the Treaty of 1745, they have prayed their King to enter into a Negotiation for procuring the Payment of the said Sum, and above all, in Corn, on account of the Dearth now reigning in that Kingdom.

The Crew of the Tartar. Capt. Read, bound from London for Maryland, were taken up about 200 Leagues from the Cape of Virginia by the Leveret, Capt. Colwell, bound from Maryland who carried them to England. The Vessel is lost.

NEW-YORK, April 2.

From private Advices by the last Vessels, we are informed, that there was the greatest Reason to hope the Restrictions upon the Governors of the several English American Colonies, against passing Money Bills of Paper-Currency, would be wholly taken off, without any Conditions inconsistent with English Liberty, soon after the sitting of Parliament, which was to meet the 16th of January.

PHILADELPHIA, April 9.

Extract of a Letter from London, Jan. 10, 1767.
"These are intended by the Packet to acquaint you, for the Information of all our Correspondents, that a Committee of Merchants was chosen at a Public Meeting, on the 7th Instant, to apply to Parliament for Relief in respect to your Paper Currency, with the Assistance of the Agents of the several Provinces, and such Gentlemen, from your Continent, as are now here. They meet the Day after To-morrow, to receive and consider several Plans which, it is said, will be offered for the Purpose, which, with their Opinion, they are to report to a General Meeting; and as the present Ministry are favourably disposed towards the Measure, we doubt not but something will be done this Session, and we shall, as soon as in our Power, advise the Success."

Extract of another Letter from London, of same Date.

"The Merchants met on Wednesday, and formed a Committee to apply for Leave to create more Paper Currency for the Colonies; but as many wild Schemes (as we thought them) were talked of, we conversed with some of the Ministry, and proposed settling it on the old Footing, to which they seemed very well disposed, and which we will endeavour to support.

"On Monday, when the Committee meets to consider all the Proposals, we shall endeavour to fix upon the simplest and speediest Method for your Relief, as we came to an unanimous Determination, that Paper-Currency, in the Colonies, under proper Regulations, was of mutual Advantage."

Extract of a 3^d Letter from London, of the same Date.

"We had almost forgot to have acquainted you, that on the 7th Current, a Meeting of North-

American Merchants was summoned, who accordingly met, and chose a Committee; which Committee are to meet again on the 12th Current, in order to consider of, and form a proper Plan for the Circulation of Paper-Currency in your different Provinces; and as we have very great Encouragement from the present Ministry, we have not the least Doubt of obtaining our desired Point, which hope, and doubt not, will be a very acceptable Piece of News to all our North-American Friends, as also very agreeable to Yours, &c.

Extract of a 4th Letter from London, Jan. 12, 1767.

"Your Agents have been, for some Time, much engaged in promoting the Repeal of the Paper-Money Act. They have had several Meetings with a Committee of Merchants on the Subject, and have no Doubt but they will succeed in obtaining the Repeal, under the following Restrictions, viz. That the Bills of Credit to be made in future, shall not be legal Tender in any Debts payable in Europe; in Debts already subsisting; or in special Contracts, to be paid in a Silver Currency."
