N A P L E S, J u l y 16.
 I T is thought there will soon be some Revolu-
 tion in this Kingdom, relative to the Jesuits,
 the King having forbid Cardinal Orsini to see
 the General of that Order, and directed him
 to discharge his Confessor, who is a Jesuit.

B E R L I N, J u l y 7. The Baron de Larrey, Envoy
 from the Prince Stadtholder, is still here, and his
 Commission is no longer a Secret. It was to de-
 mand the Princess Wilhelmina in Marriage for his
 Serene Highness, and he has executed it with Suc-
 cess. It is not certainly known when this Marriage
 will be solemnized, but it is generally thought that
 it will be in October next. The Beauty, good
 Sense, and amiable Disposition of this Princess, who
 possesses every natural and acquired Accomplish-
 ment, prognosticates the highest Felicity to his
 Serene Highness.

L O N D O N, J u l y 11.
 It was Yesterday reported, that one of our
 Cruizers, on the Newfoundland Station, had taken
 a large French Ship in the Gulf of St. Lawrence,
 with a great Quantity of Goods, Arms and Ammu-
 nition, on board, and carried her into St. John's.
 The French King has yielded to the last Remon-
 strance of his Parliament concerning the Prolon-
 gation of the Twentieth Penny, and has issued
 another Edict, which has been registered, and
 which limits that Tax to Two Years, instead of
 Four and a Half, as was at first intended.

It is said that the Difference which has so long
 subsisted between Two noble Brothers, the one in,
 and the other out of the M-----, is on the Point
 of being made up, in which Case it is thought the
 latter will have some distinguished Post in the A-----
 conferred on him, with Liberty to bring his Friends
 in along with him.

The Terms which a certain Marquis offered,
 have been rejected.

It is said, that if the Earl of Chatham resigns,
 his Grace the Duke of Newcastle will be again ap-
 pointed Lord Privy Seal.

Yesterday the Earl of Bristol had the Honour of
 a private Conference with his Majesty at St.
 James's.

No Changes have yet been declared at Court.
 The Right Hon. Mr. C-----, whose Resignation
 was voluntary, has been desired, as we are inform-
 ed, to remain in his Place till a proper Person is
 chosen to fill it. The above Gentleman has several
 Times lately had the Honour of private Conferences
 with his Majesty.

The King of Sardinia, it is said, has formed the
 Project of assembling all the Jesuits in his Kingdom
 at Alexandria, and to confine them there till such
 Time as they shall be utterly extirpated.

J u l y 9. Sunday the Marquis of Rockingham,
 and the Right Hon. Mr. Conway, set out of Town
 for Richmond, where they had a long Conference
 with his M-----, who, we hear, sent for them ex-
 pressly for that Purpose; and on Monday those
 Two Personages waited upon the Duke of Grafton,
 with whom also they had a long Conference. It is
 reported that the Marquis has refused the Lieu-
 tenancy of Ireland.

J u l y 11. A great Personage, we hear, before he
 left London, declared publicly, that he would al-
 ways oppose the present Administration.

Considerable Wagers are held at the West-End
 of the Town, that a noble Marquis will be in Pos-
 session of an Employment, which he lately held no
 less to his own Honour than the Satisfaction of the
 Public, before the Middle of August.

It is reported, that some Affairs of the utmost Im-
 portance to the Well-being and greater Improve-
 ment of the British Colonies in America, are now
 under Consideration of a great Board.

Information has been made within these few
 Days, against several Ladies, for wearing painted
 or dyed Calicoes, commonly called Chintz, the
 Penalty for which, on Conviction, is Five Pounds.

J u l y 7. Yesterday one of the Clerks of the Bank
 was apprehended on Suspicion of Filing Guineas.
 In the Evening he attempted to cut his Throat,
 but without Success. On searching his House,
 many curious Instruments for the Purpose above-
 mentioned, and also a Quantity of Gold Dust, were
 found.

The Bank Clerk who is in Custody for Filing
 Guineas, is, we hear, a Man of some considerable
 Property.

The Friends of Mr. Wilkes, we hear, are in great
 Hopes of his Pardon, and it is thought if such a
 Circumstance should take Place, the celebrated
 Exile will be in Parliament at the next General
 Election.

The Farmers round the Country, particularly in
 Devonshire, are dabbling out their Corn as fast as
 possible; and cursing the News-writers; for they

say, if such a Pother had not been made by them,
 Corn would have been 20 s. a Bushel; but now the
 Price is falling, owing to the large Quantities of
 Corn imported, which may be, in some Measure,
 attributed to the News-Papers.

We hear that an Order will soon be issued from
 the War-Office, for a Muster and Return of all his
 Majesty's Forces in the several Garrisons of Great-
 Britain.

A great Number of Jesuits have been lately seen
 in different Parts of the Town, by a Gentleman
 who knew them abroad.

On Monday last a Man and his Wife, in the
 Parish of St. Martin in the Fields, having some
 Words together, the Husband gave her Six-pence,
 and advised her to purchase some Arsenic, and poi-
 son herself; the Woman, from a false Spirit of Re-
 sentment, put her Husband's Injunction into Exe-
 cution, and expired soon after in great Agony.

J u l y 8. A Tradesman in the Strand has under-
 taken, for a Wage of Ten Guineas, to swim from
 Westminster-Bridge, to Chelsea-Ferry, in a Pair of
 Jack-Boots, and his Legs tied together about the
 Ancles.

J u l y 9. A noble Lord being offered a Place in a
 certain Bed-Chamber, calmly told the Person who
 offered it, that he had no Inclination to be a Ser-
 vant out of Livery.

By Letters from Rome, there is Advice, that a
 Corsican Nobleman, lately arrived there, charged
 with a Commission to the Court of Rome, had ob-
 tained a private Audience of the Pope, lived in
 great Splendor, and was in a few Days to set out,
 on Business of Importance, for Turin.

We hear that most of the Royal Forests in Eng-
 land are to be surveyed this Summer, in order to
 their being laid out into Farms.

J u l y 11. They write from Gibraltar, that several
 Transports, laden with Ammunition, Naval and
 Military Stores, continue to arrive there from Hol-
 land, &c. bound to Corfica.

On Thursday Night Four Men, said to be Jesuits,
 were taken into Custody, in Oxford Road, by vir-
 tue of a Special Warrant.

J u l y 14. We hear from Cowes and Newport, that
 the Farmers in the Isle of Wight, have got in all
 their Hay, and had the Prospect of exceeding plen-
 tiful Crops of Wheat.

It is said that no less than 450,000 l. were remit-
 ted into this Kingdom, on account of Corn exported
 to France, Spain and Portugal, in the Years 1764
 and 1766.

J u l y 16. Letters from the Frontiers of Spain take
 Notice of some Marks of Discontent in that King-
 dom, at what has lately happened with regard to
 the Jesuits. The Governors, Commandants, &c.
 are ordered, it seems, to have a Watchful Eye, in
 their respective Departments, over the Public Tran-
 quillity; to prevent any tumultuous Assemblies;
 and to arrest all such Persons who shall discover,
 either by Words or Actions, any Disapprobation of
 his Majesty's Measures. And further, that in or-
 der to be prepared against all Surprize, as there are
 not above 80,000 regular Troops, and 25,000 Mil-
 itia in the Kingdom, his Catholic Majesty has in-
 treated the King of France to reinforce his Troops
 in the Garrisons nearest to Spain, that they may be
 ready to assist the Spanish Troops, in case there
 should be any Occasion to stifle the Spirit of Sedi-
 tion.

Letters from Madrid advise, that many Persons
 who were known to be closely connected with the
 Jesuits, have been lately arrested there.

Wheat sold at Leeds last Tuesday se'night at the
 exorbitant Price of 7 s. 10 d. a Bushel, notwith-
 standing such Quantities are weekly imported, and
 the great Prospect of a plentiful Harvest.

A Memorial has just appeared at Paris, from a
 Person who pretends to be the Son of a powerful
 King in the Indies: He sets forth, that he was en-
 trusted in his Youth to the Care of a Portuguese
 Dominican, with large Sums, for making the Tour
 of Europe; that after he had been at China, the
 Friar sold all the Effects and Slaves of his Pupil,
 and put him on board a French Ship, which brought
 him to L'Orient, where it was some Time before he
 could make himself understood; but as soon as he
 was able to do so, some People who had been in the
 Country, made no Doubt of the Truth of his Re-
 lation, &c. He now desires Permission to send Two
 Ships to Solor, to inform the King his Father,
 from whom he has been separated Twenty Years,
 of his present Condition; and of the Assistance he
 stands in need of to return home.

J u l y 18. It is said above Two Millions Value of
 Teas are now in the Store-Houses of the East-India
 Company.

We hear from Gloucestershire, Worcestershire,
 Herefordshire, and Staffordshire, that they have
 plenty of fine Crops of Corn.

We hear that one of our East-India Ships lately
 arrived, fell in with a Pirate Ship in the Chinese
 Sea; the Commander of which was an Englishman;
 he was manned with Blacks, and was cruising, a-
 gainst the Dutch.

I N T E L L I G E N C E E X T R A O R D I N A R Y.
 The Terms upon which the M----- of R-----
 offered to come into the Administration were cer-
 tainly as follows:

1. The D----- of R----- to go to Ireland.
2. Lord A----- to be at the Head of the Army.
3. Mr. Y----- to be Lord Chancellor.
4. Mr. C----- to be Secretary of State for the Southern Depart-
 ment. Which were refused.

Thursday Lord A----- set out for Woodburn.
 Previous to the Offer of the above Terms, Appli-
 cation was made to those who have been firm and
 uniform in the Opposition to the Favourite; and
 the laudable Answer which they made was, "That
 they would not treat clandestinely; the whole of
 the Opposition (i. e. all the Leaders) must be taken
 in, or none."

C H A R L E S - T O W N, (South-Carolina) August 4.
 The following Particulars relating to the desperate Vil-
 lains that infest our Frontiers, may be depended on as
 authentic.

J U L Y 26. James Tyrrel, John Anderson, Sill
 Stoaks, James Stoaks, and one Cornelius, came to
 the House of James Miller, at Turkey-Creek, and
 robbed him of all his Wearing-Apparel, 45 l. in
 Cash, and a Parcel of Deer-skins. The next Day
 they went to the Dwelling of Michael Watson;
 and, after ransacking it of every Thing worth car-
 rying off, set Fire to it, as also to his Wheat and
 Corn. From thence they proceeded to Watson's
 Father's, in order to do his Job, (as they said) but
 he got out of their Way. They then went
 down the Road about Ten Miles, where they met
 Conrad Elder, driving a Waggon, with his Fam-
 ily in it, going to his Settlement at Long-Canes,
 and robbed him of his Watch, 140 l. in Money,
 and took his Wife's Silver Buckles out of her
 Shoes, vowing Vengeance against every Person that
 durst oppose them: Upon which, William Watson,
 with his Father, Brother, and Two other Men,
 pursued the Villains above 30 Miles, 'til they came
 within Half a Mile of Robert Ford's House, who
 is supposed to be one of the Party. Here they met
 Tyrrel and Anderson, and obliged them to surren-
 der, and carried them up to Ford's House; when
 some of the Gang hollowed out Peace or War,
 Watson answered Peace; the housed Villains im-
 mediately fired on them, killed poor old Watson,
 one of his Sons, and another of their Party, and
 knocked down Michael Watson, who soon recov-
 ered himself, and after discharging his Piece, drew
 his Knife, and ripped Two of them open: This
 gave the Prisoners an Opportunity of making their
 Escape.

Captain Hays, on hearing of those Robbers, or-
 dered out a Party of the Militia, under the Com-
 mand of Lieut. Sinkfield, who went immediately
 in Quest of them; and a little this Side Ford's
 House, met Tyrrel, who was looking for Ander-
 son; Lieut. Sinkfield called out to him to surren-
 der, which he refused, desiring him to fire away,
 and be d-----; they then fired at him, and brought
 down one of the most barbarous Wretches among
 the whole Crew: On going a little farther, they
 met Ford's Boy with Sugar, which he said was to
 dress some of the Robbers Wounds that Anderson
 carried off. Night coming on, and Lieut. Sink-
 field's Party being but Eight in Number, he thought
 it advisable not to make any farther Attempts 'til
 reinforced, when he intended to pay Ford and his
 Lodgers a Visit, and, if possible, to put a Stop to
 those Cruelties which are daily committed.

AUGUST 7. Letters from Silver Bluff, on Savannah
 River, dated on Tuesday, last Week, informs us,
 that a Number of the People called Crackers, who
 live above Augusta, in the Province of Georgia,
 had gone, in a hostile Manner, to the Indian Town
 and Settlement at Okonee, where, on their Arrival,
 finding only one old Indian Man, all the rest being
 out a hunting, they plundered the Village of every
 Thing of any Value that they could carry off, and
 burnt every House in it. The same Letters add,
 that this is like a formal Declaration of War, and
 that dreadful Consequences may be apprehended,
 should the Indians take it in that Light, in which
 Case, those People that committed such a violent
 Outrage, would be the first to run away. Letters
 from Augusta say, that the Pretence for such Vio-
 lence was, that those who committed it had lost
 several Horses, which they suspected were stolen by
 the Indians of Okonee, that they went to that Town
 in search of them, but found none, and seeing the
 Place defenceless, all the Men being from home,
 they resolved to plunder and burn it.
