SIENNA, April

WE hear that the French has appointed Count Governor General of Corsica. Campaign is expected extremely Bloody; Fatalities more are expected to embark from Provence under Convoy of several War and Bomb-Vessels, which are destined to the Coast of Sicily.

From the Banks of the DANUBE, April 25. I received Advice from Constantinople, upon the Occasion of removing the Mahomet, made a grand Procession through the Streets, or at their Windows; but Christians upon this Occasion were forbidden to appear, and the Minister of one of the European Courts, being excited by Curiosity, placed at a secret Window to observe the Procession, which was no sooner discovered by the Turks, than they attacked the Ambassador's House, and endeavoured to make an Entrance; but the Servants, after opposing them, well armed, a dreadful Fight ensued, in which no less than 100 Persons lost their Lives, and the Ambassador's Daughter was slain. As soon as the Porte was informed of this Outrage, the Ringleaders of the Mob were taken into Custody, and Four of their Heads were struck off and sent to the Minister, in token of the Grand Signior, that all Proceedings should be made him for the Injury done.

UTRECHT, April 28. The Disturbances between the Turks and Russians, which were expected to terminate in a Peace, are now likely to kindle a new War in Europe and Asia, that will not be easily suppressed. Notwithstanding the Reports of intercession, the Russians have had no Reason to value upon their Success in Poland. The Tartars are undisciplined as they are, have, since their Invasion into New-Serbia, gained Advantage, and have not been easily overbalanced. That Count de Saxe, the Villages are all destroyed, and the Inhabitants sent up the Country to the Mountains, and the Horses, Cattle, and other Property of the Land by the Conquerors, are now at Constantinople, that the Grand Signior, upon the Eve of a Rupture with the Emperor, whose Minister has not yet been sent to Court, but that notwithstanding the good Offices of the French and English Ambassadors, the Emperor's power and enterprising Northwardness has been arrested, and sent to keep Count de Saxe at the House of the Margrave of Brandenburg. The People of Dantzick are desirous for that City; however, the Emperor's Letters have been transmitted to other Parts, May 12. It is said, that the Emperor has sent 20,000 Men into the Island of Corsica, in the Month of March.

LONDON

May 9. There is just arrived in London, the illustrious Chief Paoli, painted for the Countess of Aachenleck. Mr. Boswell sent for the Countess last Summer Mr. Bambridge, an American Artist, who had finished his Study, amidst all the Fatigues and Danger of his Expedition, was pleased to fit, to indulge the Desire of his ever zealous Friend. Who was brought to Leghorn, all who had heard of the Countess's expressed a Desire to see it, and was sent to Florence, where it was much admired by the grand Duke, Dutchess, and all the Nobility, as a whole Length as large as Life; the Countess's Face in a very masterly Manner.

May 10. The following Gentlemen were recommended by their Oratory, viz. For the Middlesex Petition.—Sir John Bull, Barre, Burke, Beckford, Townshend, Glynn, L. E. Cavendish, and G. Grenville. Against it.—Jer. Dyson, Lord Norton, Fox, Lord Clare, G. Johnston, Thurlow, and Jenkinson.

May 15. They write from Corsica, that the Count had lately made a Speech to his Parliament, among other Things, he said, "I forego the Harvest to hope for this Year, and to take Care to provide against the want of Bread and Biscuit are already arrived; and you from the Assurances I have received, neither want Arms, Ammunition, nor Money." We hear a Conspiracy of the Inhabitants of Corsica, lately discovered by the French, the Commandant, and all the principal Persons were to have been assassinated, and the Countess's Troops of General Paoli, if it had succeeded.

Letters from Florence say, that the Emperor's Third Consort for the Emperor, who had been his Choice would either fall under the Power of Modena, or the Princess's Letters yesterday there was a great Court and a great number of Ministers, at which their Majesty
