

and uncontrollable Powers, for the better collecting the Duties that are, or may be imposed upon us without our Consent; the Jurisdiction of Admiralty Courts (which are unfriendly to Liberty) is extended and enlarged in America; a Power arrogated of superseding and dispensing with Acts of Assembly, which have received the royal Confirmation, in order to encrease the Fees of Crown Officers; and Persons suspected of Treasons and Misprisions of Treason, are threatened to be dragged from hence, and tried in England, contrary to Law, and the Principles of the English Constitution; and a standing Army is kept up in Time of profound Peace, independent of any Authority in the Colonies:

We, therefore, the Grand Jury for the City and County of Philadelphia, think it our Duty to declare, that we consider ourselves as Freemen, and entitled to all the Rights and Privileges of free-born British Subjects. "That it is inseparably essential to the Freedom of a People, and the undoubted Right of Englishmen, that no Tax be imposed upon them but with their own Consent, given personally, or by their Representatives. That Courts of Justice are established for the Trial of all Crimes, committed within this Province; and that no Person is legally, and consistent with the Principles of Liberty, and the English Constitution, amenable before any Court, out of this Province, for any Crimes committed within it." And therefore, lest the Alteration, which a Majority of the Importers of British Merchandise in this City, who met at Davenport's Tavern, on Thursday, the 20th Instant, have made in the Non-importation Agreement, may be construed into an Acquiescence of the People in the Parliament's Claim of Right to tax the Colonies, in order to vindicate our just and inherent Rights, we declare and resolve:

I. That we will, as far as in us lies, promote a Union with the other Colonies, and concur with them in any Measures, that may be deemed prudent and practicable, consistent with the Duty we owe to our King, in endeavouring to procure a full Redress of our Grievances, and a full Enjoyment of English constitutional Liberty.

II. That we will unite with our Fellow-Subjects in discountenancing the Use of British Manufactures, and the Consumption of British Merchandise, until the Parliament's Claim of Right to tax the Colonies is given up, the Act imposing Duties on Tea, &c. is repealed, the Jurisdiction and Power of the Admiralty Courts is restricted, the Board of Commissioners dissolved, and the standing Army removed, or put under the Direction of the Civil Authority, so as not to be dangerous to the Liberty of the People.

III. That we will abstain from the Use of all such Articles of Luxury, imported from Great-Britain, as shall hereafter be agreed to by our Fellow-Subjects in this Province.

MANY respectable Freeholders and Inhabitants of the City, fully alarmed at the Resolutions formed by a Number of the Dry Goods Importers on Thursday last, at Davenport's Tavern, which reflect Dishonour on this City and Province, earnestly request the Freemen of this City and County, to meet in the State-House this Afternoon, at Three o'Clock, to consider and determine what is proper to be done, to vindicate the Honour of this City, and to avert the Danger that threatens their Country.

In Consequence of the above Advertisement which was published in the Papers, and dispersed in Hand-Bills round the City and Suburbs, a large Body of respectable Inhabitants assembled at the Time and Place appointed, and having unanimously chosen Joseph Fox, Esq; Chairman, they came to the following Resolutions.

1st. That the Claim of Parliament to tax the Colonies, and particularly the Act imposing Duties on Tea, &c. for the Purpose of raising a Revenue in America, is subversive of the constitutional Rights of the Colonies.

2^d. That the Union of the Colonies is necessary, and ought to be maintained, in order to procure a Redress of their common Grievances, and to preserve their common Rights and Liberties.

3^d. That it would have been for the Reputation of this City to have consulted the other Colonies before any Breach had been made in the Non-importation Agreement entered into by the Merchants and Traders of this City.

4th. That the adopting the Maryland Agreement, or one similar thereto, would be of Advantage to this Province, and, at the same Time, tend to keep up a Harmony among the Colonies, and to procure a Repeal of the offensive Act.

5th. That such an Agreement be recommended to the Merchants and Traders of this City.

6th. That, provided such an Agreement is entered into by them, the Inhabitants of this City will concur with them therein; and further will, by all lawful Ways, discountenance and discourage the Importation of Goods from any other Colony, until the Spring Vessels arrive with such Goods as shall be ordered by our Merchants, that they may reap the Advantage of the virtuous Self-denial they have hitherto exercised, for preserving the Liberties of America; and that such as shall bring, or connive at, countenance, aid or abet the bringing of Goods into this Province, contrary to this Resolve, shall be deemed an Enemy to the Peace and good Order of this City, and unfriendly to the Liberties of America.

7th. That the Thanks of this Body be given to those Members of the late Merchants Committee who resigned at Davenport's, on Thursday last, for their faithful Discharge of the Trust reposed in them.

8th. That Messieurs Andrew Allen, Peter Chevalier, Benjamin Loxly, John Cadwalader, Daniel Roberdeau, James Pearson, William Masters, George Clymer, and John Shee, with the Members of the late Committee who resigned, be a Committee to request the Merchants and Traders of this City to adopt the

Measure proposed, and make Report to the Inhabitants at a publick Meeting, which they are desired to call when they are ready.

9th. That these Resolves be published, and the Inhabitants of this Province invited to concur therein.

Every Thing was conducted with the greatest Order and Decorum. Business being over, the Thanks of the Company were voted to the Chairman for his Services. To the 4th Resolve there was only one dissenting Voice, the rest were all carried unanimously.
