

to sue for peace, instead of selling it for a tribute under the title of presents. But the senate has resolved not to consent to any peace with the dey, until he shall have indemnified the owners of the two ships taken by some Turkish rovers; but this is not all: the senate insists, that for the future the Venetians shall not pay more than three per cent. on all goods imported by them into, or exported from the dominions of Tunis. Hitherto the duties have been at five per cent. The emperor of Morocco has actually fitted out seven frigates, four of which are to be stationed on a cruise in the latitude of the Canary and Cape de Verde islands; the other three in the Mediterranean; with this insignificant armament will he be permitted to plunder the ships of any nation he pleases; and sooner than agree to sick or burn this little squadron, all the maritime powers in Europe will consent to purchase the protection of the Moorish prince, as if this squadron was more powerful than the united navies of England, France, Spain and Holland.

April 15. Tuesday last, arrived here in twenty-four days from St. Eustatia, the ship success, captain Cadenhead, who informs us, that the ship Hydris, belonging to Rhode Island, had arrived at Eustatia, from Bengal in the East-Indies, in three months and ten days, that all the hands belonging to her, except four, had left her at Bengal, and that the captain was obliged to get Lascars to man her. She has a valuable cargo on board. On the 7th instant, captain Cadenhead spoke the brig Hector M Keever, from Port au Prince, bound to this port, out twenty days. Captain Cadenhead sent a pilot on board her.

Extract of a letter from Cadix, January 16.
 "A stout Algerine rover of 26 guns, was lately sunk of Cape St. Vincent by two Portuguese frigates, after a very desperate resistance of four glasses, and all on board perished. The rover, during the engagement, attempted several times to board the largest frigate, which was much disabled in her rigging, but was vigorously beat off each time, with the loss of a great many men. The prizes had a prize in company, which they sent away before the engagement."
