A Supplement to the all for the establishment and regulation of levy courts in the several counties of this

B E it enasted, by the general affembly of Maryland, That the governor and council be authorifed and required annually to appoint and commission for each county in this state, feven of the most discreet and test qualified persons of the said county, from the list of those annually commissioned as justices of the peace, who shall be styled in the commission jusfices of the levy court of fuch county, and who shall be differfed as equally as may be through the county; and that in case any vacancy shall happen in any of the feid courts by refusal to aft, death, removal out of the county, refignation or disqualification, the governor and council be authorised and required from time to time to supply such vacancy.

And be it enasted, That the governor and council

full appoint eleven justices of the peace as justices of the key court for Baltimore county, four of whom shall be resident in the city of Baltimore, and the remaining seven resident in the county, any thing in tais act to the contrary notwithflanding

And be it exacted, That the justices of the levy courts aforesaid, or a majority of them, shall be and are hereby inveited with all powers which the juffices of the peace of faid counties have had at their re-frective meetings as levy courts of their faid coun-

And be it enalled, That no member of the general affembly, or commissioner of the tax, shall be appointed under this act.

And be it erasted, That each of the justices of the levy courts aforefaid shall have and receive, as a compeniation for his fervices, the furn of two dollars, and no more, for every day he shall attend the duty of his office, the said allowance to be affessed and levied as other county charges.

And be it enadled, That no justice of the peace of any of the several counties of this state, other than those justices appointed and commissioned by virtue of this act, shall have or exercise any of the powers given to the judices of the levy courts to be appointed and commissioned in virtue of this act, any law to

the contrary notwithstanding.

This act to continue and be in force until the twentieth day of Ostober, one thousand eight hundred and one, and until the end of the next festion or affembly that shall happen thereaster.

B. it enaded, by the general affectily of Maryland, That the general court, and every county court, fall at all times have power to direct talefmen to be fammoned to ferve on juries, where, without such thefmen, there would not be twenty of the original pannel exclusive of the jury charged, from whom a jury can be formed, and if the parties, or their counfel, agree, the drawing of a pannel of twenty jurors in any canle may be dispensed with.
