WE understand that a letter from general Armstrong to the secretary of state, dated Jan. 20th, has been received by the Fame, printed at Norfolk, which states that our affairs with the French government had at that time assumed a more favourable aspect. General Armstrong had ordered the John Adams to sail to England, to receive Mr. Pinkney's dispatches, and to return to France for lieutenant Pinkney, who would be charged with the French dispatches.

We are authorized to state for the information of our commercial friends, that the Danish charge des affaires has received from the minister of that country at Paris, the most satisfactory assurance of the friendly disposition of the king of Denmark towards this country, and of a determination to cultivate a friendly intercourse with it.

That such explanations had been made to general Armstrong, of the measures which may have created a different opinion, as would remove all apprehension on that account.

Massachusetts Election.

EAST-INDIES.

Asiatic intelligence, furnished by captain Elliot, of the brig Dolly, arrived at Baltimore on Sunday last, from Madras, via Ceylon and Cape of Good-Hope.

The Dolly left Ceylon the last of Nov. and the Cape of Good-Hope the last of January. Six days before the departure of the Dolly from Ceylon, the governor received official notice of the capture of Tappanooly, a port on the W. coast of Sumatra, belonging to the British, by a French Squadron from Batavia, which had coasted up the Straits of Malacca along the coast of Sumatra, where they had captured a vast number of prizes and carried them into Tappanooly. Among these were 13 Americans, with dollars, which they did not time to convert into pepper as they intended.

The French had landed a considerable force at Tappanooly, which they were expeditiously fortifying, having resolved to establish themselves there on account of its good harbour and advantageous position. They gave laws to the surrounding country.

Three of the unfortunate men who were captured in Miranda's expedition have been sometime at the Havanna, but in confinement, and in a state of deplorable wretchedness. One of them, we understand, is to be sent to Spain, and the remainder will return to Carthage. Their distressed situation excited the compassion of the Americans in Havana, and a liberal subscription was set on foot for their relief, the amount of which was presented to them by capt. Driscoll, to whom they expressed their gratitude in a letter, of which the following is a copy.

"Sir,
"R. Saunders, P. Naulty & P. Raymond, return you their sincere thanks for your humane exertions in procuring for them so humane a relief. They also acknowledge their obligations to each individual compelling the charitable list; and beg leave to assure them of you, sir, that it will ever be recollected with gratitude."

The privateer *Ravanche du Cerf*, now in our port, captured, we understand, a Spanish schooner, from Cadiz to South-America, having on board the organ and plate of the Cathedral of Cadiz; and a number of ladies and gentlemen passengers. She took out what she wanted of the cargo, and gave the vessel up to the passengers.

The Savannah Evening Ledger of the 17th ult. states, that the late heavy rains, are supposed to have carried away many of the bridges and causeways, so as to render them impassable. Letters from the up-country, by the last mails, state, that a great quantity of water had fallen, and nearly all the mills and cotton gins in the neighbourhood of Augusta, on Savannah river, had been swept off by the freshes it occasioned. The river at Augusta is said to have been twenty-five feet above its ordinary height; but, by the latest accounts, it had fallen five or six feet. The tide yesterday, we are told, did not flow, perceptibly, after the time of low water, more than ten minutes, in consequence of the great body of water coming down. The Altamaha, had likewise risen considerably.

An additional Supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts.

BE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the several county courts of this state may exercise concurrent jurisdiction in all cases in the same manner that they now exercise jurisdiction by virtue of the act to which this is a supplement.

And be it enacted, That each of the judges of the several districts of this state, during vacation, shall have full power and authority to exercise, in their judicial districts, all the powers which the chancellor of this state can or may exercise.

And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of one of the associate judges of the several judicial districts of this state to attend at the court-house of the several counties in their judicial district, at some day between the several sessions of their court, who shall have power to make all necessary orders touching any subject matter in the said respective courts, upon the equity side, brought or depending therein, and it shall be the duty of the several clerks of the several counties in this state to attend the said judge on the said days, who shall make due entry of all such matters and things as shall or may be ordered as aforesaid by the said judge; and the several county courts in this state are hereby instructed, at their first court next after the passing of this act, to appoint the several days on which the said judge shall attend as aforesaid.

And be it enacted, That the county courts shall have full power and authority to appoint an auditor to the said court.

And be it enacted, That all and every person or persons who shall or may think themselves to be aggrieved by the decree of any county court, in any case of which such county court may have an equity jurisdiction by virtue of this act, shall be at liberty, in all cases to appeal to the court of appeals of the respective shires, and in the same manner, and under the same circumstances, and such appeals shall have the same legal effect and consequences as appeals prosecuted from the court of chancery to the court of appeals.

And be it enacted, That the clerks of the several county courts in this state shall act as registers for their said counties, in the same manner as the register in chancery now does.
