Whereas the Legislature of the State
of Maryland passed a resolution at their
May Session, one thousand eight hun-
dred and thirteen, in the words follow-
ing to wit:

MAY SESSION, 1813.
Resolved, That the Treasurer of the
Western Shore be and he is hereby au-
thorised to negotiate a loan, on such
terms, and at such periods, as the Gov-
ernor and Council shall approve, not
exceeding the sum of four hundred and
fifty thousand dollars, and the faith of
the State is hereby pledged for the re-
payment of the principal and interest
thereof; Provided always, That in no
case shall a larger rate of interest be
contracted to be paid than six per cen-
tum per annum.

And whereas, the Executive of Mary-
land have authorised and directed the
Treasurer of the Western Shore to
borrow, in behalf of the State of Mary-

Our patrons will have the good-
ness to excuse the non-appearance of
the Gazette last week. A disappoint-
ment in the receipt of paper was the
cause of its not being issued as usual—
the difficulty, may the impossibility
of procuring any at this time, connect-
ed with the circumstance of all the
employed in the office being daily
called out on military duty, renders us
unable to present them with more than
a quarter of a sheet this week.

We are authorised to say, that
RICHARD HOPKINS, will be a candi-
date to represent Anne-Arundel County
at the next General Assembly.

The Friends of Peace in the
Congressional District, compose
Anne Arundel and Prince-Geo-
rges counties, and the City of Annapo-
lis, have determined to support JOHN
HERBERT, Esquire, as a Represen-
tative from said District to the next
Congress.

A letter from Ghent, dated July 2, con-
tains the following particulars—
The English ministers are Lord G.
and Messrs. Colburn and Adam, but
they have yet arrived at Ghent. The
Dutch ministers are Messrs. Bayard, G.
Adam, Russell and Clay. They have
been here for some days, except Mr. Galtier,
who is hourly expected to arrive.

The following facts are gat-
hered from a letter, from a very intel-
ligent gentleman dated Rock Hall, Se-
pt. 1814.

Last Sunday evening, the crew
of a frigate landed at Warton; and
Waller's house and stack yard
were bombarded. On Tuesday the
same by Richard Frisby's at-
tack—look four black men but no
let the hogs burn in the sty—
out were at Belle-Air, and
reach either house in time. On
Sunday night after they had a high
dancing and drinking—took a cir-
cuit, piloted by Frisby's negro
attacked Col. Reed's camp, in

came general—but the troops
had three pieces of artillery
centre; and a most animating

the enemy sounded a retreat
bugle, leaving ten dead and five
