to our republican institutions, and to aid in defending the palladium of our liberties against the assaults of open or concealed enemies. It is a sacred duty which we have pledged ourselves to perform, and from which we cannot shrink without injury to our families and to our country. What is there so important as dear to a man as freedom? Disguise thyself as thou wilt, still slavery, still thou art a bitter draught; and whether the draught be brought upon us by profligate friends or avowed foes, 'thou art the less bitter on that account.' To avert this bitter draught, and to transmit that glorious inheritance acquired for us by a Franklin and a Washington, and the other ages and heroes of the revolutionary war, it is necessary for every patriot in the republic to be upon the watch, and that no son of Tammany should slumber upon his post.

The guards provided by the constitution are founded on the experience of all times; that a republic is always in danger from men in power; and it is by the vigilance, unceasing vigilance alone, that it can be preserved.
