The St. Stephens paper of Cct. 19 states, that, at the latest dates from Pensacola, (the dates are not mentioned,) the yellow fever continued to assail the remaining in habitants—though the place was nearly depopulated by death and removal

The Charleston Patriot says, "Pensacola

is almost completely deserted, on account of the dreadful mortality by the yellow feor the dreadill mortality by the yellow fe-er. A letter says, that out of apopulation of 1400 souls, but 400 remain—the rest having either died or fled from the place. But one American family was there. All the authorities have died or deserted. They had no governor nor Council no police or post office."

The London papers relate a singular and melancholy lestance of suicide in September. On the 18th of that month, the Earl of Craven took his three sons to Eton School, with their tutor, the Rev Edward Island, who had been six years in that situation, and was highly respected as a scholar and gentleman. A few days after, Mr Halhed was found lying dead in his bed, with his throat cut, and the razor with which he had committed the act, firmly grasped in his hand. The testimony on the subject before the Coroner's Inquest, went to prove that the cause of the suicide, was "a remarkable and unnecessary degree of anxiety about his three pupils." The exercises written by them as part of their examination on entrance into the school, not being satisfactory to him, he evinced at once the greatest disappointment and des pondency .- Nat. Gaz.
