St. John's College.

The visitors and governors of St. John's College, being desirous to render this institution as extensively useful as may be practicable, and to diffuse the benefits and blessings of education, as far as is in their power, have reduced the price of tuition money to 24 dollars per annum. The visitors and governors feel perfectly justified in recommending to the public, the talents, assiduity, and deportment of the faculty, employed to superintend the instruction of the pupils, as well as the discipline which has been adopted in the institution, and which is faithfully, mildly, but energetically enforced.
