## Adjutant-General's Office.

Annapolis, July 12th, 1824.  
The late supplement to the Militia Law of Maryland requires the Adjutant General to forward to the Colonels of Regiments, and Majors commanding Extra Battalions, Blanks necessary to enable them to make their returns to his department. It also requires those officers to report themselves to his department before the 25th of August 1824. As the adjutant is anxious that a complete return of the militia should be obtained, he requests all those officers who have not already done so, to report themselves, that he may know to whom he may send Blanks; as, according to the law, no officer will be considered in commission who does not report himself.

## THE STEAM BOAT MARYLAND.

Will commence her regular routes on Wednesday, the 10th March at 7 o'clock, A. M. from Commerce street wharf, for Annapolis and Easton, leaving Annapolis, at half past 11 o'clock, for Easton, by way of Castle Haven, and on Thursday, the 11th, will leave Easton, by way of Castle Haven, the same hour for Annapolis and Baltimore, leaving Annapolis, at half past 2 o'clock, and continuing to leave the above places as follows:  
Wednesdays and Saturdays—and Easton, on Sundays and Thursdays, at 7 o'clock, during the season.

Captain Levin Jones, at Castle Haven, will keep horses and carriages for the conveyance of Passengers to and from Cambridge, without expense.

## To Rent this Fall.

A fine farm in Anne Arundel county, binding on Patuxent River, and within ten miles of Baltimore, containing nearly 500 acres of land, with four large corn shucks that will bring from 150 barrels of corn to 200 each. It has a raised up yard of 300 in size about the fields in a seasonable year. There is about 50 acres of fine market land, a great part of which brings fine cabbages, some weighing from 10 to 12 pounds each, when trimmed. There is one great advantage attending the place, viz. it may be had from two to 100 cart loads of manure from the river shore, so grass that beats up being equal to any thing for Potatoes, or Vines or Corn; you can make hay enough to winter 8 or 10 head of horses, and cut 6 or 5 large stacks of marsh grass that is fine for cattle.  
The place will afford two tenements, and will suit two brothers, or two friendly neighbors, with about 10 or 12 hands. The market land all enclosed in different lots, partly well palling. The improvements are a good welling house, with three rooms below stairs and three above, with a good pantry, passage and kitchen, all attached to it, and most excellent barn, with other necessary houses sufficient for any place. There are abundance with good fruits such as peaches, apples, plums of different kinds, damsons, and choice pears. There is a good spring near the house, with a spring house in which to place milk and butter. I have made the house for the fruit in one season. The rent will be made easy to a tenant, who must work the place as I do, that is to say, each field and to be rotation, and not raise Indian corn on the market land. It will be rented for a term of years.

## From Sir Matthew Hale's "Directions for Keeping the Lord's Day."

"I have, by long and sound experience found, that the due observance of this day, and of the duties of it, have been of singular comfort and advantage to me, and I doubt not but it will prove so to others. GOD ALMIGHTY is the Lord of our time, and lends it to us; and as it is but just we should consecrate this part of that time to him, so I have found, by strict and diligent observation, that a due observation of the duty of this day, hath ever been joined to it a blessing upon the rest of my time; and the week that hath been so begun, hath been blessed and prosperous to me; and on the other side, when I have been negligent of the duties of this day, the rest of the week has been unsuccessful and unhappy to my own secular employments; so that I could make an estimate of my successes in my own secular employments the week following, by the manner of my passing of this day; and this I do not write lightly or inconsiderately, but upon a long and sound observation and experience."

## From a late London Paper.

A paper has been read at the Royal Society, giving an account of some experiments lately made in Holland on the velocity of sound, by Drs. G. A. Mole, and A. Van Heek. The experiments were on the plains of Utrecht; and care was taken to annihilate the effects of the wind. The stations were 2,564 feet apart; and the velocity ascertained by determining the interval between the flash and report of guns by means of clocks with conical pendulums, dividing 24 hours in 10,000,000 parts. The result was, that at the temperature of 32 degrees, the velocity of sound is 10,297 feet per second.

## DRAM SHOPS.

The grand jury of New York, among a number of other nuisances, have presented the honorable Corporation of that city as obnoxious to public censure. It was, for permitting the erection of booths and dram shops around the Park, for the late celebration of the national birth day. The grand jury say that "so long as our city contains about 3,000 dram shops it is highly believed that the erection of two or three hundred more, in the most beautiful part of the city is not necessary, even for those who wish to get drunk, fight, or pick pockets in honour of the day."
