### In Chancery

July Term 1828. Benjamin Gaither vs. John Dent, and William Cecil.

The object of the bill filed in this case is to obtain a Decree of the Court of a Parcel of Land in Anne Arundel county, called Trusty Friend, to satisfy a lien alleged by the complainant to belong to him. The bill states, that a certain Thomas Bicknell, late of Anne Arundel county, deceased, being seized in fee of a parcel of land in said county, called "Trusty Friend," contracted with John Dent, the defendant, for the sale thereof, and on the 11th day of September 1814, executed certain articles of agreement, which are exhibited with the bill, which he bound himself to convey the said land to the said Dent upon payment of the sums of money therein mentioned; that afterwards, to wit, on the 19th day of February 1817, the complainant agreed to purchase the said parcel of land from the said John Dent, for the sum of twelve hundred, and paid him three hundred dollars, and passed his bond for the payment of the balance... On application by petition in writing of Samuel P. Bailly, to me, one of the Judges of the Orphans Court of Anne Arundel county, praying the benefit of the act of assembly entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, and the several supplements thereto, a schedule of his property, and a list of his creditors, (as far as he could ascertain them) on oath, being annexed to his said petition, and I being satisfied that the said Samuel P. Bailly has resided in the state of Maryland for two years next preceding the date of his said petition; and being also satisfied that the said Samuel P. Bailly is in actual confinement for debt, it is hereby ordered and adjudged, that the said Samuel P. Bailly be discharged from his confinement, and it is further adjudged, that the said Samuel P. Bailly give notice to his creditors, by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in one of the newspapers published in the city of Annapolis, once a week for the term of three months, to appear before the Anne Arundel county court, to be held in the city of Annapolis on the third Monday in October next, to recommend a trustee for their benefit, and to show cause, if any they have, why the said Samuel P. ### City By-Laws.

A By-Law imposing a tax on the Real and Personal Property within the Limits of the City of Annapolis, and the Precincts thereof.

Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, that a tax of fifty-six and a quarter cents, be and the same is hereby imposed on all the assessable property within the said city and precincts for the year 1828 to be levied and collected agreeably to an act of the general assembly, passed at December session 1818, entitled, An act to alter and amend the charter of the city of Annapolis, and agreeably to the several by laws of this corporation, respecting the collection of taxes. ### A By-Law relative to the Officers of the Corporation.

1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That whenever any officer shall be appointed by this corporation, who is required by any by-law to give bond for the faithful discharge of his duties, and shall not, within ten days after his appointment, produce satisfactory surety to the Mayor, Recorder or Aldermen, authorized by the by-law to approve the bond, that such appointment shall be considered of no effect and shall be vacated.

2. And be it established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That whenever any officer who is appointed by this board, shall be required by any by-law to pay a license to the corporation before he can proceed to act, if such officer shall not within ten days after his appointment pay such license, such appointment shall be considered of no effect and shall be vacated.
