Guilleminot, the French Ambassador to Constantinople, has been recalled. Orders have been received at Toulon, to fit out for active service all the vessels of war that have been placed on the peace establishment.

The account of an insurrection in Turkey is confirmed. From Greece, also, the advices represent the revolt in Macedonia assumed a serious aspect. The insurgents had come to an engagement with the regular troops, and had been driven to the mountains.

The London Courier of April 30, says:—Dwernicki's corps and the Volhynians now interrupt the Russian communications with Kiova and the South, while the Lithuanian insurrection cuts them off from Wilna and Minsk, and their northern magazines. Though we must not reckon too sanguinely that a great army will be destroyed because its communications are embarrassed, these circumstances subject the Russians to difficulties of which the Poles have skill and gallantry, and we hope physical force, enough to avail themselves.
