BY-LAW.

A BY-LAW explanatory of the By-Law imposing a Tax on the real and personal property within the limits of the City of Annapolis, and the precincts thereof.

Whereas, an omission having been made in the by-law heretofore passed for the purpose—
BE it established and ordained, by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That a tax of seventy cents in the one hundred dollars, be and the same is hereby imposed on all the assessable property within the said city and precincts for the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, to be levied and collected according to an Act of the general Assembly of Maryland, passed at December session, 1818, entitled, An act to alter and amend the charter of the City of Annapolis, and agree to the several By-Laws of this Corporation respecting the collection of taxes.

I take her in fifteen minute you see?—Me say noising—De frigate Americane come vid majesty vid grandeur—twas de first time I had de pleasure to see von frigate Americane—von beautiful ship—Capitaine Dakaire call out—give him von broadside!—whorroh! de frigate Americane no answer but come vid majesty, vid grandeur, give him anoder broadside!—whorroh! rohl! rohl! de frigate Americane no speak, but come on vid majesty, vid grandeur—vat say Capitaine Dakaire, is he deaf or dumb!—give him anoder broadside! Whorroh! rohl! de frigate Americane no speak, no answer at a' at a'—but presently Gentlemen, I hear de tander; whorroh! whorroh! oh! Gentlemen, de mast, de sail, de yard, de spar, de every ting, all about my ear! I tought de heaven and de earth had come together, for de frigate Americane had fire his broadside—von big man, (vat is dis his name)—ah! de boatwain—he step up to Capitaine Dakaire, and below in his ear—"Capitaine Dakaire! he say, 'me tink you got a hard job!' parbleu monsieur, me tink so too, say I. Bye and bye, Capitaine Dakaire say to me 'Mons. French Capitaine I tink you had better go below!' parbleu Monsieur me tink so too! I go down into (vat you shall call it)—ah! de cockpit—and dare, gentlemen, I see de poor sailor, vidout leg, vidout arm, vidout head,—vidout any ting! Bye and bye all was still. I go up on de quarter deck, and dare I see de poor Capitaine Dakaire (von brave man), rid a tear in his eyes 'ah! Mons. Capitaine Dakaire offer him his sword—no Capitaine Dakaire, keep a your sword, for you deserve it, and so he did. Presently de Commodore Americane say to me 'holla! 'Parbleu Mons.—I say, 'I was in von little prig bound for de coast d'Americane, loaded vid prandy—and Capitaine Dakaire von day take out all my prandy, and blow my little prig up in de air!—Den say the Commodore, 'on de word of Officer Americane and dat never was false, you shall have your prandy back again.'—And gentlemen, he was as good as his word, and I have here de pleasure to tell you de story. ASPARAGUS.

I think that an error prevails in the method ordinarily adopted in cultivating this delicious vegetable. The object is to grow long branched stock, which, to be sure, is inviting to the superficial buyers; but at the table it is found stringy, tough and bitter. The roots must lie deep and the growth be comparatively slow, my roots have a superficial covering of earth. Their growth is early and rapid, and in a few days the surface, the grass is tender, succulent and well flavored, and the whole of it eatable. I cover my beds in winter with manure, but rake it all and stir the ground in the Spring.
