Nearly a hundred members answered to their names. Messrs. James A. Stewart, of Dorchester, (one of the Secretaries) Lambert Heardon and Samuel A. Spencer, of Talbot, and Thomas Hope, of Harford, were in attendance, were, on motion, severally invited to take seats in the convention, and participate in its deliberations, and accordingly they appeared and took their seats.

Resolved, That a committee, consisting of one member from each county, and one from each of the cities of Baltimore and Annapolis, be appointed to devise some plan calculated to produce unanimity and concert of action in the Jackson Republican party of this state, at the approaching election.

Resolved, That the above committee be appointed by the selection of one member from each delegation, and elected by the delegation themselves, and that the names of the committee be reported to this body.

The following gentlemen were named in pursuance of the above resolution, Baltimore county, William A. Spencer, Queen-Anne's county, William C. Scott, Cecil county, David Brookhart, Washington county, William Frick, City of Baltimore, James Dixon, Frederick county, Thomas Willson, Kent county, James Stewart, Dorchester county, John T. Stoddert, Charles county, John C. Herroert, Prince-George's county,

On motion of Mr. Stewart, of Queen-Anne's, the delegates to the late National Convention remaining in the city, were invited to take seats within the bar.

After some other preparatory resolutions, on motion of Mr. Smith, of Baltimore county, The Convention adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Friday, May 25th, 1832. The convention met pursuant to adjournment. Present the same members as on yesterday—also Messrs. Joseph Redoe and Ebenezer T. Massey, whose names were heretofore accidentally omitted. H. C. Scott, esq. a delegate from Prince-George's, Henry Wilson, esq. a delegate from Kent, and B. F. Toy, esq. a delegate from Washington county, appeared to-day and on motion, John S. Stansberry, esq. of Anne-Arundel county, and Ebenezer T. Massey, esq. of Cecil county, were invited to participate in the deliberations of the convention, and took their seats accordingly. The names of the following gentlemen were also handed in as delegates from the Kent-Town district of Baltimore county, to wit:—Dr. S. L. Lash, William H. Wilson, and William Frick, esqrs.

On motion of Mr. Smith, from the committee composed of one delegate from each of the counties and cities represented in the convention, reported: That in performance of the duty imposed on them they be leave to recommend to the convention the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions.

Resolved, That this convention has assembled to take into consideration, the various matters connected with the welfare of the Jackson Republican party of this state, and after a free interchange of opinions, to adopt such a course as may be best calculated to secure harmony and concert of action.

Resolved, That the most unfeeling charges have been advanced against the administration of our venerable chief magistrate, with a view to alienate from his affections of the people, and a reckless opposition is endeavoring to defeat his re-election. Therefore, Resolved, That this convention feels undiminished confidence in the unblemished integrity, the devoted patriotism, and the sound judgment of ANDEW JACKSON.

Resolved, That his administration of the affairs of the government, has fully equalled our most sanguine expectations, and largely aided to the honor, the welfare, and the security of the republic.

Resolved, That in the management of our foreign relations, his conduct has been always characterized by the frankness, truth and energy, becoming the chief magistrate of a high-minded people; and that in the direction of our domestic concerns, his counsels have been guided by a salutary spirit of conciliation, a laudable respect for the rights and dignity of the states, and a sacred regard to the principles of the constitution.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves zealously to support his reelection, to use all honorable means to secure that object, deeming it, at this important crisis, essentially necessary to the harmony and permanency of the Union.

Resolved, That the arbitrary measures, the interference of his opponents in the conduct of the affairs of this state, and the abuse of the power conferred to them by their immediate constituents, have

the most vigorous efforts, and unflinching exertions on the part of his friends, as well to remove "from the control of such unfaithful or incompetent agents, as to restore the natural alliance and harmony which ought to subsist between the general and state governments; and that the Republican party in Maryland, be earnestly requested to adopt such measures as will best promote these important objects.

Resolved, That a central committee of five persons residents of the city of Baltimore, be appointed, and that it be recommended to our political friends in the several counties, to appoint a committee of correspondence at the seat of justice, or other convenient place in each county, whose duty it shall be to communicate from time to time, such information, and to suggest such measures to the consideration of the central committee, as may in their opinion, most effectually ensure success at the fall elections.

Resolved, That since under present circumstances we must submit to the unjust and factious enactment of the last General Assembly, dividing the State into unequal districts in order to secure the votes of the Electoral College of this State for President and Vice-President of the United States contrary to the wishes of the people, it be recommended to the delegates in this Convention from the several counties included in each electoral district, to meet and confer together, and with due attention to all the circumstances, and a free determination to consult the wishes of their constituents, as far as they can be ascertained, recommend a time and manner in which the people may meet and designate the requisite number of candidates for the electoral election in their several districts.

The said preamble and resolutions were then severally read, considered and adopted.

In conformity to the sixth resolution, the following gentlemen, were appointed a central committee: Robert Purviance, Philip Laurensen, Charles Howard, Louis Wm. Jenkins, and Dr. Thomas I. Murphy.

Mr. Kennedy, of Washington county, offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That a committee of seven be appointed by the President of this convention, to prepare an address to the people of Maryland, on the subject of the approaching elections.

Dr. G. S. Townsend, of Frederick, Stewart of Baltimore city, Laurence Harper, B. N. of Kent and Townsend, were appointed on the committee.

Mr. Stoddert, of Charles, offered a resolution, which after being modified at the suggestion of Messrs. Redoe, of Kent, and Stewart of Dorchester, was adopted as follows: Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed by the chair, to frame an address to the people of Maryland, exhibiting fully and strongly, the unjust, oppressive, and unreplicable character of the late enactment of the General Assembly, in regard to the election of President and Vice-President, and the propriety of selecting delegates to the next Legislature, pledged to use their exertions, for the repeal of such an arbitrary and unconstitutional law, or recommended to the people in the said address.

Messrs. Stoddert, Jenkins of Baltimore city, Sewell, Yoe, and Gale of Kent, were appointed on the committee.

On motion of Mr. Stewart, of Baltimore city, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That this convention be impressed with the high importance of unanimity by the action of its friends of the National Administration in Maryland, and that in order to promote the same, it be recommended to its friends to surrender all personal preferences, and to unite in giving effect to the acts and proceedings, of the National Convention recently assembled in the city of Baltimore.

The convention then adjourned, to meet again at 5 o'clock, in the afternoon. Five o'clock, P. M. The convention re-assembled. Mr. Stoddert, moved that the committee charged to prepare an address, in reference to the late act of assembly, regarding the election of Presidential Electors, have leave to make up and publish their report after the adjournment of the convention, which was agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Jenkins, a similar leave was granted to the committee appointed to prepare the general address.

Mr. Jarrett, of Harford, moved the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That two thousand copies of each of the addresses ordered by this convention be printed for distribution.

Mr. Stewart, of Dorchester, offered the following resolution: Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the chair, to ascertain the expenses which have been incurred by this convention, and to make arrangements for the payment thereof.

Mr. Jenkins, stated that he had been requested by the committee of arrangements to inform the convention, that the expenses had been already provided for by them, and he therefore hoped the resolution would be withdrawn.

Mr. Stewart accordingly withdrew the resolution, and offered the following, which was adopted: Resolved, That the convention be very grateful to the committee of arrangements of the City of Baltimore, for their kind and hospitable attention, in providing for our comfort and accommodation during our session; and we tender them our warmest and most heartfelt thanks.

On motion of Mr. Palmer of Frederick, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the thanks of this convention be presented to the President and Vice Presidents of this convention, for the dignity and ability with which they have presided over its deliberations.

On motion of Mr. Matthews, of Charles, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the thanks of this convention be presented to the Secretaries, for the attention and ability with which they have discharged the duties imposed on them by this convention.

POSTSCRIPT

STILL LATER FROM ENGLAND. The packet ship North America, at New-York from Liverpool, brings London advices May 1. From the proof-slips forwarded by the editors of the New-York Courier and Merchant Advertiser, and chiefly from the former, we make the following extracts.

The cholera appears by the official accounts to be diminishing in Paris, but spreading throughout France. A London paper of the 28th, says it has broken out at Havre de Grace. All the French Ministers have been attacked. The Chamber of Deputies is prostrated.

Letters from Paris, dated April 23, state that 20,000 had died in that city of the cholera.

We give an article from "Le Constitutionnel" of a very warlike aspect. The London Times, however, treats it with ridicule, and says the credibility of the Paris editor must have been imposed upon. We should incline to this opinion, for it would seem that the French troops are about evacuating Ancona, or at least that some amicable arrangements have been entered into in relation to the possession of that place.

The Belgic Governor of Luxembourg has fallen into the hands of the Dutch Government. There is little doubt that he would be again given up. The formal ratification of the 24 Articles by Austria and Prussia is published in the London papers. In consequence of the reservations with which this act is accompanied, and perhaps the little faith placed in the acts of despotic governments, it does not seem that it is sought in London these ratifications will materially expedite the settlement of Belgic affairs.

The Cholera continues very mild in England, but more severe in Ireland. Of the further progress of the Reform Bill, we can say yet know nothing.

THE INDIAN WAR UNPLEASANT NEWS. A post-slip from the office of the Cincinnati Daily Gazette states that the Steamboat Herald, in seventy-four hours from St. Louis—an extraordinary quick passage—brings a proclamation from the Governor of Illinois to the citizens of that state, from which it appears that a bloody and successful attack has been made by the Indians upon a detachment of volunteers. A private letter states that fifty two of the volunteers were killed, among whom were Colonel Crane, Col. Thomas, Major Morgan, and Capt. Bailey.

At the date of the last accounts, Gen. Atkinson, the Commander-in-chief of the United States forces, was in a most perilous situation. He had sent out several expresses for supplies, and every man had been cut off. The Keel boats, destined with supplies above the Rapids had not been heard of, and it was supposed that they had been captured and their crews massacred. Intelligence so painful has not been anticipated. For a further knowledge of the condition of our frontiers, the reader is referred to Governor Reynolds's proclamation.

DIXON'S FERRY, ON ROCK RIVER. To the Militia of the State of Illinois: It becomes my duty again to call on you for your services in the defence of your country. The state is not only invaded by the hostile Indians, but many of your citizens have been slain in battle. A detachment of the mounted volunteers commanded by Major Stillman, of about 275 in number, were overpowered by the hostile Indians on Sycamore creek, distance from this place thirty miles, and a considerable number of them killed. This is an act of hostility which cannot be misconstrued.

I am of opinion that the Puttawatomie and Winnebagoes have joined the Sacs and Foxes, and all may be considered as waging war against the United States.

To subdue these Indians and drive them out of the state, it will require a force of at least two thousand mounted volunteers more, in addition to the troops already in the field.

I have made the necessary requisitions on the proper officers for the above number of mounted men, and have no doubt that the citizen soldiers of the State will obey the call of their country. They will meet at Hinopin on the Illinois river, in companies of 50 men each, on the 10th of June next, to be organized into a Brigade.
