

plate, and in that time it would seem to have been the wild state and acquired the ferocious and predatory habits of the tribe. A short time ago some of the tribes seen in pursuit of a full-grown man to the ground, and before the person was pressed the scene could reach the scene, succeeded in so lacerating the throat that it bled to death in a short time. It required considerable exertion to remove the dog, subsequently sent in pursuit of them, caught one, but was severely wounded, had not the owner in his room, it is said they also pursued a small dog, and followed him a considerable distance, as is now supposed with deadly intent.

FOREIGN.

FROM EUROPE.
The packet ship Rhone, at New York from Havre, brings Paris papers to the 13th February, containing London dates to the 11th. The annexed summary of intelligence is copied from the Commercial Advertiser.
The dates from Spain and Portugal are so late as by our late Gibraltar papers.
The accounts are now important only in confirming, most fully, the Gibraltar edition referred to. The Pedros achieved a succession of victories, during the whole month of January, which had left the cause of the rebel entirely hopeless. So it was considered by the friends of Miguel in Paris. Miguel had addressed a letter to Pedro, announcing the death of their sisters but it was not opened—the Regent refusing to hold any communication with the usurper.

ENGLAND.
Numerous petitions have been presented to Parliament, from the Dissenters, praying liberty to register their own births and marriages, and for exemption from marriage fees.
The Duke of Wellington has been installed Chancellor of the University of Oxford. It is stated that he pronounced his Latin address in a most excellent and impressive manner. It was classical in style, and in substance eloquent. He alluded with much facility to the occasion when Oxford conferred upon him the Degree of Doctor of Law, in company with the Emperor Alexander, the King of Prussia, and their illustrious train, and expressed himself determined to defend the privileges of the University, which had gratified his feelings in conferring upon him the high office with which he is now invested.
The last despatches from the Court of St. Petersburg give such positive assurance of a continuance of peace that a reduction of the army is talked of in the higher circles. It is believed, however, that this measure will take place till after the close of the Congress.
The London journals of the 11th and 12th are principally filled with Parliamentary reports. The Commons were occupied the whole of Monday night with Mr. Stiel's affair, and a Committee of Inquiry was appointed.

PORTSMOUTH (Eng.) Feb. 3.
The following circumstances have appeared before the Portsmouth magistrates this week: The ship *Marianne*, Captain, master, based on board 212 Polish refugees, bound for the United States, has been detained in the port, wind-bound, five weeks. The ship was taken up by the Prussian government for the purpose of conveying these men from the country to America, under an agreement on their arrival there they were to be paid a sum of about 60 dollars each. The ship was obliged to put into this port by stress of weather, and the Poles appeared to be very comfortable, and expressed their willingness to proceed to America, until Sunday last, when a Polish officer arrived from London, and communicated to them that the Poles of Havre, and who were similarly situated, had obtained permission of the French Government to land in France and Algeria; on which the Poles here refused to proceed to America, and agreed to leave the ship on the following day.
The necessary steps being taken on Monday for their leaving the ship, they pertinently refused to proceed to America, and to leave the ship. The next day, (Tuesday), the wind being favorable for sailing, the pilot gave directions for heaving the anchor, and as the crew were at the windlass for that purpose, the Poles rushed forward and forced the handspikes from them, stating that they were determined the ship should not proceed. They took possession of the ships and from their violent and threatening conduct, the Captain applied to the civil authorities for protection, as he could not put to sea without endangering his life. Depositions of the facts were taken, and communication had with the Secretary of State, and also with the Prussian Ambassador. Thus the case stands at present.—*Hampshire Telegraph.*

SCOTLAND.
The London Courier states that an insurrection had broken out among the workmen of the extensive calico printing established in the neighbourhood of Glasgow. It was produced by their attempting to compel their employers to give them more wages, in consequence of which the latter employed their hands, which so enraged them that they resorted to open violence to drive them out. Troops had been marched from Edinburgh to protect the establishments.
Glasgow and Paisley, were quiet at the accounts.
PARIS.
Gen. Lafayette had been severely and alarmingly ill—but was better on the 13th February.
The French Chambers were occupied with the Civil List. We perceive nothing in the debates worth noting.
The Constitutional of the 14th Feb. states that on the preceding day, after long and interesting discussion the Chamber of Deputies

acted the law, (so warmly contested) for liquidation of the old Civil List.
An expedition against some refractory bands of Arabs, had been successful—After explanations from the French, the Arabs desisted from hostile intentions, and promised to live in peace and harmony.

SWEDEN.
Stockholm Journal of the 31st Jan. professes that capital the most prosperous in Europe, and congratulates the King of Sweden on his having relieved the country from the yoke of a foreign debt.
Thirteen days later from England.
Twenty days later from Liverpool.
The evening edition of the New York Journal of Commerce of Monday announces the arrival of the Liverpool packet ship *Roscoe*, from Delano, bringing London papers to Feb. 1 and Liverpool to the 26th inclusive.
The intelligence from Spain, is of a very gloomy and meagre character. The Queen's orders do not seem to be acting in the manner best adapted to promote the interest and tranquillity of the country. By the peace of court intrigue, it appears that she is prevented returning to Spain, and the country will be deprived not only of services, but also of those of several other distinguished constitutionalists, who make their way to Spain contingent on that of Minerva, as the accounts in the Paris papers indicate, never, we believe, very firmly established, is now rapidly on the wane. The chief of this is stated to be the prefect of Paris, having ordered all the theatres closed at eleven o'clock, whether the spectacle was finished or not.
London, Feb. 24.
Disturbances at Marseilles have been suppressed, but those at Lyons still continue, in Paris a considerable degree of agitation prevails.
Paris, Feb. 22.
The subject of conversation in every society in Paris for the last few days, is the late state of Lyons, where the workmen, proceeding to acts of serious outrage, have effected a determination to hold out until demands are granted, and above all display organized system of combination, extending to various other manufacturing towns, to create serious uneasiness, less as to attempts at disorder which these misguided men may resort to—the authorities, this time, taken ample precautions to a recurrence of the dreadful scenes which Lyons was the theatre in 1831—then to the effect the existence of such a combination may have upon the manufacturing districts.
Liverpool Feb. 18.
The Shell Comedy ended, as most comedies do, in a hearty shaking of hands, plenty of smiles, and in the reconciliation of all the parties concerned. It is singular that after the motion of Thursday, which was carried by the united vote of Lord Althorp and Mr. O'Connell, the next morning honoutrably accepted. The Noble Lord and Mr. Hill both sided with Mr. Vill in the most ample manner, and the affair ended.
