LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND

House of Delegates.

MONDAY, March 16th, 1835.

Mr. Roberts, of Queen Anne's, presented petition of Mary Harvey, of Queen Anne county, praying to be placed on the pension list of said county.

Mr. Duvall presented a petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for the passage of an act authorizing the survey of Frederick county, to record alphabetically, all original land certificates, in said county.

And Mr. Annan presented a petition of sundry citizens of Emmittsburg, Taneytown, Westminster, in Frederick county, praying from the state, to complete the Northern Pike of Frederick.

Mr. Teackle, from the committee on corporations, made a favourable report upon the bill reported by him, entitled, an act to establish a Bank of the State of Maryland, and to provide the assent of the state to the provisions of a bill in congress to create a national currency and provide for the custody, transmission and disbursement of the monies of the U. States.

The bill reported by Mr. Annan, entitled, additional supplement to the act, for the recovery of small debts out of court.

And, the bill reported by Mr. Jones of Somerset county, a further supplement to the act, concerning crimes and punishments.

Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill reported by Mr. Jones, of Somerset, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, entitled, an act to repeal the second and third sections of the act of assembly, of 1715, ch. 81.

The bill reported by Mr. Cushing to repeal the removal of indictments found in Baltimore City Court.

And, the bill reported by Mr. Adams, of an act supplementary to an act relating to taking superedeas, and making valid the same.

Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill reported by Mr. Jones of Baltimore, chairman of the committee on coloured population, for the benefit of Anne Arundel, Benjamin Barnett, and Fanny Barnett—also.

The bill reported by him, to authorize the Rev. George L. Mackenheimer of Prince George's county, to bring two female slaves into the State.

The bill reported by Mr. Merrick, chairman of the committee on ways and means, entitled, an additional supplement to an act to regulate the issuing licenses to traders, keepers of ordinaries and others, passed December session, 1827, ch. 117.

Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Jones of Balt. for the incorporation of the Old Town Lyceum, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, amended, and passed.

The bill reported by Mr. Jones, of Somerset, chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, entitled, an act to prevent the registers of wills from charging or receiving any allowance, for stating the annual accounts of guardians, was taken up for consideration.

The said bill was then read the second time and rejected.

The bill reported by Mr. Sutton, chairman of the committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment, entitled, an act for the relief of sundry poor persons in the several counties therein mentioned.

The bill reported by Mr. Johns, chairman of the committee on divorces, to divorce Mary Baldwin of Baltimore county, from her husband James Baldwin.

Also, the bill reported by him to divorce Mary E. Nugent of Baltimore city, from her husband Arthur Nugent.

Were severally taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed.

TUESDAY, March 17th, 1835.

Mr. Larrimore, presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Queen Anne's and Talbot counties, praying the passage of an act to preserve the fish, oysters, and terrapin in the river.

Mr. Brewer, presented a petition of Dennis Boyd, of Anne Arundel county, praying an extension of time for payment of his debt due to the state, and for a remission of 4 per cent interest on said debt.

Mr. Pratt, presented a memorial of George Calvert, executor and trustee of Thomas Crumplin, counter to the memorial of Elizabeth Davis, praying a special act for relief.

Which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Ely, submitted the following resolution. Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That His Excellency the Governor procure a sword, with suitable device and ornaments, and present it in the name of this State, to Captain Jacob Schmuck, of the United States Army, as a testimony of his high esteem for his native state, of his distinguished and gallant services to his country, on the north western frontier, during the late war with Great Britain.

Which was read the first and second time by special order, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Johns, chairman of the committee on divorces, made unfavorable reports upon the following petitions.

The petition of Sally Howard and Joseph Howard, also, the petition of Sarah Satterfield, of Caroline county.

Also, the petition of James Gallion, also, the petition of Jacob Easterday, of Washington county.

Also, the petition of John Frazier, of Washington county.

Also, the petition of Sarah Richards, of the city of Baltimore.

Also, the petition of Eliza Vanhorn, and the petition of Sarah Hall, of Frederick county, severally praying to be divorced.

Which were severally read the first and second time by special order, and severally concurred in.

On motion of Mr. Wharton, Ordered, That the thanks of this Assembly be unanimously tendered to the honorable William J. Whistone, for his dignity, impartiality, and ability, with which he has presided over its deliberations, during the present session.

The house then adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, March 18th, 1835.

Mr. Welch obtained leave to bring in a bill, relating to appeals, writs of error, and stay of execution.

Mr. Iglehart, chairman of the select committee, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Anne-Arundel county, praying an alteration in the law relating to primary schools in said county.

Which was twice read and concurred in.

Mr. Iglehart moved that said report be entered at length upon the journal and printed; Determined in the negative.

Mr. Annan, chairman of the select committee, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for a division and erection of two counties out of Frederick county.

Which was twice read and concurred in.

Mr. Iglehart presented a petition of Artridge Foggitt, of Anne-Arundel county, praying an act to authorize her to draw on the treasurer for the balance of pension due her husband, Richard Foggitt, a revolutionary soldier, at the time of his death.

Mr. Iglehart also presented a petition of Wm. Jenkins, of Anne-Arundel county, praying further time to complete his collections.
