 Ordered, that the joint committee appointed to investigate the causes of the erroneous estimates made by the president and directors of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, and also of the proceedings of other corporations relative to the Internal Improvements, be authorized to cause five hundred copies of the testimony which has not been printed, to be printed for the use of the House, together with their report.

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.
